The Glory of Heaven, Pt. 4 Revelation 22:3-5 *Study Notes for October 13, 2013*

II. The Glory of Heaven, Select.

- 1. As Seen in the Fact that That which is Most Important to us is in Heaven, Select.

a. A Surprising Description/Emphasis

1. Christ as He is Today, Rev. 1:12-17

2. Christ as He is Referenced in Revelation, Select.

From Rev. 1-19:7, Christ as "the Lamb" is mentioned 21 times!!! And when we get to the descriptions of the New Heavens and New Earth, again it is "the Lamb" by which Christ is referenced no less than 7 times (Rev. 19:7, 9; 21:9, 14, 22, 23; 22:1, 3)!!!

Why is it that Christ as "the Lamb" is so prominent in the New Heavens and the New Earth? Why is this facet being stressed here? To answer this we have to go back in Redemptive History...

The Role that a "Lamb" Played in OT Worship, Select.

In the NT, the Shadow is Replaced with Substance- Heb. 9:11-14!

- b. In light of all of this, we see the significance of the "Lamb of God" as referenced in Rev. 22:3- and thus the Glory of Heaven! In the New Heavens and the New Earth, Christ will be identified not only by who He is, but also by what He did for us!
- 5. As Seen in our Place in Heaven, Rev. 22:3-5.
 - a. To understand this, let's review...

b. Our Place/Role in Glory: bondservants!

Debt-Slavery vs. Bond-Slavery

That clearly is the connotation in the text before us. For the rest of eternity we will be the property and so the possession of God! Now if you think this is demeaning, you are wrong. Think of it: there are only two positions a person can hold: (1) They can be the slave of Satan- who is a despotic monster who does not care about his servants. Or, (2) They can be a servant purchased by Christ out of love on whom He has placed His name and so has made them to be a "bond-slave" of God! The former is a position of shame and indignity; the latter is a position of honor, glory, praise!

c. Our Activity in Heaven: Co-reigning toward what end?

John 17:3

C. H. Spurgeon put it this way, "Who dare despise those foundations of chrysolite and chrysoprasus and jacinth? Who shall speak lightly of streets of glassy gold and gates of pearl? We would not forget that we shall see angels, and seraphim, and cherubim; nor would we fail to remember that we shall see apostles, martyrs, and confessors, together with those whom we have walked with and communed with in our Lord while here below. We shall assuredly behold those of our departed kindred who sleep in Jesus... But still, for all this, the main thought which we now have of heaven, and certainly the main fullness of it when we shall come there, is just this: we shall see Jesus." (*The Metropolitan Tabernacle Pulpit*, Vol. 14, Sermon #824, p. 436)

Samuel Rutherford inspired the following lines taken from *Red Trinity Hymnal* #546, "The bride eyes not her garment, but her dear bride-groom's face; I will not gaze at glory, but on my King of grace; not at the crown He gifteth, but on His pierced hand: the Lamb is all the glory of Emmanuel's land."
