Sermon Text: Colossians 1:13-23 Christian World and Life View

## Because Christ has universal dominion, we yield Him universal obedience.

- 1) Christ created all things, giving them definition and purpose (1:15-16).
  - a) "all things"—refers to all that is not God, material and immaterial
  - b) "in Him"—definition
  - c) "through Him"—agency
  - d) "for Him"—purpose
  - e) Application:
    - i) We truly know anything only as we know it in its relation to Christ.
    - ii) We obediently use anything only as we use it for the glory of Christ.
- 2) Christ sustains all things, giving them stability and coherence (1:17).
  - a) "in Him all things hold together"
    - i) Stability
    - ii) Coherence
  - b) **Application**:
    - i) Christ is transcendently immanent to the world and to your life.
      - (1) Not deism (transcendence without immanence)
      - (2) Not pantheism (immanence without transcendence)
    - ii) You can enjoy confident peace, thanking Christ Jesus in all things.
- 3) Christ reconciles all things, restoring them to God (1:19-23).
  - a) "the fulness of God" (v. 19)—The Trinity's love for creation embodied in Christ Jesus
  - b) "to reconcile to Himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven" (v. 20a)
    - i) not universal salvation (cf. 2:15 "He disarmed the rulers and authorities and put them to open shame, by triumphing over them in Him.")
    - ii) universal pacification—the whole creation under fallen man is a battlefield of man's rebellion against God; the violence of man's rebellion is reflected in the abuse and conflict of the created order; only in Christ, the new humanity, is creation pacified under God's righteous rule
  - c) "making peace by the blood of His cross" (v. 20b)—Christ's sacrificial death is the means of restoring humanity and all things under God's righteous rule
  - d) "you . . . He has now reconciled" (vv. 21, 22)—the transformation has already begun with "you," the church
  - e) **Application**:
    - i) Continue in the faith, stable and steadfast, not shifting from the hope of the gospel (v. 23).
    - ii) Minister the gospel wherever you are.
    - iii) Christianity is a public faith.
