| I.   | LO                   | VELONG   |
|      | A.                   | Literally this verb means long or slow to anger, primarily with regard to people                     |
|      | B.                   | This aspect of agape love is difficult because it is our that reveal what we really are              |
|      | C.                   | Agape love does not; the Greeks saw longsuffering as weakness, a negative trait                      |
|      | D.                   | is the model for this trait: He is slow to anger; His longsuffering gives opportunity for repentance |

|      |                      | A better translation might be, "love kind"; Paul took a common adjective and invented a verb         |
|      | B.                   | Perhaps the best translation is, "love "; Rom.3 teaches that this trait is not normal for humans     |
|      | C.                   | Again, God is the ultimate illustration of care: our flows from the kindness or care of God          |
|      | D.                   | Perhaps the best human illustration of this care is found in Jesus' story of the                     |
|      |                      | 1) He was to the feelings & needs of the beaten, broken man he encountered on the road               |
|      |                      | 2) He cared enough to be: often when we are called to care, it will seem to be by chance             |
|      |                      | 3) We must also suspend and meet needs even when we think a person is wrong                          |

|      | C.                   | The 8 negatives included in this description of agape no doubt focus on the carnal                   |
|      | D.                   | At its worst, jealousy says: ""If I can't have what they have, then I don't want to have it either." |
