The God of Everywhere

1 Kings 20:1-30

I. THE BULLY—Ben-Hadad, King of Syria

- A. <u>The Numbers</u> (Ps 20:7 & 68:17)—the odds were *not* in Israel's favor.
 - **1. Size**—Israel's army was completely outnumbered. (17.5 to 1)
 - 2. Resources—The Arameans had superior military equipment
- **B.** <u>The Attitude</u> (Jer 9:23-24; Is 40:15, 22)—completely arrogant and intimidating
 - **1. Looking for Trouble** (vs. 5-7)—wants a fight
 - **2. Making Threats** (v. 10)—verbal, psychological intimidation
 - **3. Overconfident** (v. 12, 16)—trusting in his superior army, considers himself invincible

II. THE VICTIM—Ahab, King of Israel

- A. <u>Immediately Seeks to Appease</u> (v. 4)—acquiesces to the demands until they get too ridiculous
- **B.** Secondarily Seeks Counsel (v. 7-8)
 - 1. Summons the Elders—to gain moral support for his cause.
 - 2. Does Not Seek the LORD—He is a practical atheist.
- **C.** Finally Willing to Fight (v. 9-11)

III. THE RESCUE

- A. The LORD Sends A Prophet. (v. 13)
 - **1. The LORD initiates.** He intervenes for His own reasons.
 - 2. The prophet is not named. (v. 13, 22, 35)
 - a. Elijah is not the only prophet of the LORD.
 - b. God' authority is important, not the messenger's prowess.
 - We must listen to the LORD regardless of the <u>messenger</u>.
 - Sometimes the LORD's work calls for an <u>anonymous</u> servant.

- B. <u>The LORD Empowers Israel's Army</u>. (vs. 19-21, 29; Josh 10:8-10) —uses their effort
 - 1. God often uses what we already have.
 - **2. God uses the weak to showcase His strength.** (1 Cor 1:27-29)
- **C.** The LORD Fights Independently for Israel. (v. 30; Josh 6:20 & 10:11)—independent of their efforts
- IV. THE POINT: A FAULTY WORLDVIEW CHALLENGED (vs. 23-25, 28)
 - **A.** To Remind His People Who He Is (vs. 13, 28)
 - 1. God's people should not function like <u>practical atheists</u>.
 - a. When we are intimidated and afraid, we tend to compromise in ways that are not healthy or wise. (v. 4)
 - b. The battle is not determined by our strength or resources but by the presence of God. (1 Sam 17:45-47; Zec 4:6)
 - **2.** We are <u>supposed to</u> call upon our God when we are in trouble. (Ps 18:3-6, 17; 55:16-18 & 90:15)
 - a. Our response to crises reveals what we believe about God.
 - b. God expects and invites us to cry out to Him for help.
 - **B.** To Show His Glory to the Nations (v. 28; Ps 96:3-5)
 - 1. Heathen nations had geographically limited deities. (v. 23)
 - 2. The LORD is Almighty everywhere.
 - **a.** There is <u>nowhere</u> that He does not own everything. (Ps 139:7-10; Is 66:1-2; Jer 23:23-24)
 - **b.** There is <u>nothing</u> that is too difficult for Him. (Jer 32:17; Rom 8:38-39)
