Step 8: Faith and Repentance

Why Do We Believe?

What is "Faith"? *Why* do we believe? How did Belief and Faith come to you? Is believing simply a Choice or a Decision- or is there more to it? The Issue of Faith is so central to the Christian Message that the Bible refers to Christianity as the "Christian Faith". And the Bible teaches that Salvation is totally *dependent* on Faith and yet it also tells us that lost people are pre-disposed to NOT believe. So, how is that dilemma resolved? *From where* does Faith come; and *to whom* does Faith come? Does *everybody* already have the ability to believe or is Belief a Gift? And if Faith is a Gift- why does God judge people to whom He has not given it?

As you can see, there are many Questions about Faith. And they all deserve an Answer. And we can thank God- that He has answered all of them in His Word. But we must take heed to ourselves because the Answers may surprise us. And if we are not careful, they may even offend us.

The closest thing we have in the Bible to a definition about just what Faith is- is found in **Hebrews 11:1&6** where the unknown writer of the **Epistle to the Hebrews** was "moved" by God the Holy Spirit to write:

Hebrews 11:1-3&6

1 Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. 2 For by it the men of old gained approval.

3 By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible.

6 And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.

Now **Hebrews 11** is NOT merely another part of the Bible. What this writer was "moved" by God the Holy Spirit to write here has to do with our lives in the 21st Century. Now just a few verses back- in **Hebrews 10:34-** this writer said that some of the Christians of this small Church in what is now called, "Asia Minor" in the last third of the 1st Century (around 68AD) were imprisoned. And the other believers made the hard decision to identify with them and risk their own property and their lives. And verse 34 tells what happened.

For you showed sympathy to the prisoners and accepted joyfully the seizure of your property, knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one.

And this is the kind of life that the entire **Epistle of Hebrews** is trying to produce in us- a life that looks at the high price of Love (like the seizure of our property or some other kind of abuse or calamity as we can read in **Hebrews 13:3-6,13**), and then accepts that possibility-*joyfully*- and does what Love demands- no matter what. That's the "Abundant Life" that **Hebrews** is aiming at: all the glorious Truths about Jesus that we can see in this Epistle such as:

- ✓ Giving Himself once for all as a final Sacrifice for our sins (Hebrews 9:14)
- ✓ Perfecting us for all time by a single Offering (**Hebrews 10:14**)
- ✓ Giving us a clean conscience by His Own Blood (Hebrews 9:14; 10:22)
- ✓ Being our sympathetic High Priest before God (Hebrews 4:14-16)
- ✓ Interceding for us day after day in Heaven (**Hebrews 7:25**)

- ✓ Putting His Laws in our minds and writing them on our hearts and being our God (Hebrews 8:10),
- ✓ Remembering our Sins no more (Hebrews 8:12),
- ✓ Promising never to leave us or forsake us (**Hebrews 13:5&6**)

And all these great Truths are aimed at making us into this kind of people:

- > Who risk property and life in order to bring the Love of God to others.
- > Who do not look for comforts and ease and security as a necessary thing in life.
- > Who are free from the American assumptions of style and safety and wealth and leisure.
- Who know there is one life to live and only what's done in the Name of Christ and for His Glory and for the eternal good of others will count in the end.

And what **Hebrews 10:34** makes clear is that the way that such a life comes about in our lives is through an unshakable Hope in God that is beyond anything in this life.

(You) accepted joyfully the seizure of your property, knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one.

And so, the Power to be joyfully sacrificial in the path of Love is "knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one." beyond the grave. And if we don't live by this great Confidence that is brought about by this great Hope- we u will be continually thinking about how much we are losing out every time we make a sacrifice for others. But if this life is a brief preparation for eternal Joy- if in this life you and I can reach a place in Jesus Christ where we understand and know that we have a "better possession and a lasting one" in Heaven- then we will be free to risk our lives and our possessions on behalf of others in this world because, as Paul said in Romans 8:18:

For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worthy to be compared with the glory that is to be revealed to us.

So, the entire **Book of Hebrews** was written to give us an eternal and abiding Hope that transcends anything that this evil world has to offer. And this abiding Hope is the Foundation of a Life of radical, risk-taking, and sacrificial Love.

What more could the writer say than he has already said to help us have this Hope so that we live out this radical Love? The writer has surely written plenty- but he isn't finished. And now he writes Chapter 11 to give us even more:

In **Hebrews 11**- the writer gives us several real- life examples of real people who actually laid hold on the future reward of Joy with God to such an extent that it not only revolutionized their lives then- but it also makes a great difference in our lives 21 centuries later if we would believe.

That's what **Chapter 11** is all about. It is meant to deepen our Confidence in God's Promises to the extent that we will turn from the fleeting pleasures of Sin and live out the radical kind of Love that comes from having our Hope in God.

Now like all things that are true about God- the writer of **Hebrews** was not the only one who understood this. The Apostle Paul also wrote about what this great Hope would produce is those who had it- so let's read what he wrote about this by looking at **Colossians 1:4&5**:

4 since we heard of your faith in Christ Jesus and the love which you have for all the saints; 5 because of the hope laid up for you in heaven, of which you previously heard in the word of truth, the gospel

Now notice here that verse 5 begins with the word, "Because", which also means "for" or "due to". So, what Paul is saying here is that "because" or "due to" the fact that the people of the Church at Colosse had laid hold on this great Hope in Heaven- they were able and willing to exercise their Faith and Love toward the people who were struggling against Sin and Persecution.

And what was it that built up that kind of Faith that promoted this kind of sacrificial Love and Good Works? Paul tells us here that the people of this Church had heard the Word of God preached through the Gospel even as you and I are hearing it right this minute.

Romans 10:17

... faith comes from hearing, and hearing by the word of Christ.

So, hearing about the great and mighty Promises of God that God has made to us through the preaching and teaching of the Word of God and believing that those great and mighty Promises are true-*emboldens* us to take hold of this great transcendent Hope. And it is this Hope that brings about radical, risk taking, and sacrificial Love.

So, **Hebrews 11** begins with a definition of Faith that links it with Hope and then goes on to show how this Hope gave Power for all kinds of radical Obedience by people all throughout the Bible. So, I want to read **Hebrews 11:1-3** again together:

1 Now faith is the assurance of *things* hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

² For by it the men of old gained approval.

³ By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible.

So, the first very important thing that we can do today is to forget all the nonsense that we have been taught about what Faith is; and what Faith does; and look at what God's Word says about Faith- so that we may lay hold on eternal Life.

The writer of **Hebrews** is telling us by these inspired and inerrant and infallible Words that the Power to sacrifice in the Cause of Love; and the Power to joyfully accept the seizure of our property- and even the loss of our lives, which we saw in **Hebrews 10:34**, is something that the Holy Spirit calls "Faith."

That is what Faith is- the Power to willingly and joyfully and sacrificially accept the seizure of our property and even the loss of our lives because we *know*- we don't guess or wonder- we *know* through the hearing of the Word of God preached about the great and mighty Promises of God and we believe that God's Word is true and that hearing mixed with believing produces a great and enduring Hope in us that we have an abiding and a lasting Possession in

Heaven- that God gave to us; that cannot be altered; and that cannot be diminished; and that cannot ever be taken away from us. And this Hope *emboldens* us to act with a radical Love that the world does not know; and that the world does not possess.

The writer says here in **Hebrews 11:1** that Faith is the "assurance of *things* hoped for" - that word, "assurance"- remember that word? It is the very *same* word that he used back in **Hebrews 10:34** to tells us about a "Possession" in Heaven that was both "better" than anything else on this earth and "better" than anything that was promised under the Old Covenant; and it was also "lasting"- meaning that it is eternal. This is what the song writer meant when he said,

"I have a home in Glory Land that outshines the Sun"

So, the writer tells us here in **Hebrews 11:1** that Faith is the Confidence that **"you have a better possession and a lasting one"** or in other words, Faith is the Confidence that we believe that what God's Word promises us in Heaven is a far better and a far more abiding Possession than anything that this earth could ever hope to give.

Now there's the link between the Life of the sacrificial kind of Love that **Hebrews 10:34** describes and the Hall of Fame in Chapter 11. Chapter 11 is a catalogue of people who illustrate that this kind of Faith - the "Assurance" or the "Confidence" of things hoped for - really *does* make a difference in human lives.

So, the first task that we have in this new chapter is to understand more exactly what Faith is. That's what verse 1 gives us - a *twofold* definition of Faith. So, let's look at both parts, one at a time. The Holy Spirit moved upon the writer to write that Faith is:

- 1. The Assurance of things hoped for
- 2. The Conviction of things not seen.

Now there is more here than meets the eye at first. The Greek word for "assurance" in the first definition ("the assurance of things hoped for") and the word for "conviction" in the second definition ("the conviction of things not seen"), are very unusual Greek words that are very difficult to translate into English. But if we are

to understand what the writer is telling us- we are going to have to struggle with this for a moment.

These two words **"assurance"** and **"conviction"** are, in fact, very serious and important translations. And the importance is not merely academic. So, in order to see just how important all of this is just ask yourself these four simple questions:

- 1. Do you have Faith?
- 2. How do you *know* that you have Faith?
- 3. What exactly is Faith- so that you may know if you have it?
- 4. What hangs in the balance on whether you have Faith or not?

So, we can see that these Questions are *very* practical and *very* relevant to our lives. So, let's get into this and I want to start with the *second* definition of Faith that the writer of **Hebrews** describes for us first:

Faith is the conviction of things not seen."

Now the Greek word that was translated here as, "**conviction**" in **Hebrews 11:1-** is not used anywhere else in the entire New Testament. But *outside* the New Testament- in other ancient Greek literature, the normal use of this word throughout the world back in the 1st Century would be to talk about "Proof" or "Argument" or "Conviction" - something that is very objective. In other words, this Greek word would have to do with objective facts about how the world really is- rather than how a person might subjectively *feel* about the world. And that is how this particular Greek word would have normally been used in literature other than the Bible.

So, what about the meaning here in verse 1? Most modern translations of the Bible don't use the old word, "Proof" or "Evidence" like the KJV does because it doesn't seem to make sense to them. How can Faith *be* "Evidence" or "Proof"? Faith actually *needs* Evidence, doesn't it?

And in order to try to figure this Mystery out- let's look at the illustration of this definition of Faith that we find in **Hebrews 11:3** because verse 3 is directly related to this definition of Faith in verse 1 as "the conviction of things not seen." **Hebrews 11:3** says:

By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God, so that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible.

Now I hope you can see the connection here. The end of verse 1 says that **"Faith is the conviction of things not seen,"** and then verse 3 says that Faith understands that the worlds – in other words- the physical universe that is seen- was made out of what is *not* seen - or in other words- the Word of God. So, verse 3 is a specific illustration which was given to us by the Holy Spirit to help us to

understand just what the writer meant when he wrote verse 1.

So, here's the question:

How do we know that God made the world out of nothing that is seen?

Not only were we not there when Creation occurred- but even if we *had* been there- we would not have been able to actually "see" the Act of Creation, because you can't see the Word of God until that Word is written down. So how in the world can we "know" or "understand" that the worlds were made by the Word of God? How can we know **"that what is seen was not made out of things which are visible"**- namely the Word of God?

And verse 3 answers that question: "by" or "through" Faith.

By faith we understand that the worlds were prepared by the word of God

Now this starts to sound a little more understandable. Because if it is true that **"Faith is the conviction of things not seen,"** then it might make sense to say, "By faith (or by this conviction) we understand that the worlds were made or prepared by the Word of God."

So, the crucial question is this: Precisely how is Faith the "**conviction**" of things unseen, namely, that God created the worlds by His Word? And I take my clue from the only other place in the New Testament where God's invisible Attributes are said to be "**clearly seen**" by Man, namely, **Romans 1:20**- so let's read that verse together:

For since the creation of the world His invisible attributes, His eternal power and divine nature, have been clearly seen, being understood through what has been made, so that they are without excuse.

Now what is interesting is that the word "understood" that Paul used here in **Romans** 1:20 is the very *same* word that the writer of **Hebrews** used in **Hebrews** 11:3:

By Faith we <u>understand</u> that the worlds were prepared by the Word of God.

So there in Romans 1:20 it says that,

"We understand the invisible Attributes of God by what has been made."

And here in Hebrews 11:3 it says that,

"We understand the invisible Word of God behind Creation- by Faith."

So, **Romans 1:20** seems to say that the "Conviction" that Faith gives us- that God did indeed make the Universe- is the very things themselves that have been made. In other words-the "Conviction" that things have obviously been made clearly points to the indisputable fact that there *must* be a Maker. And so, **Hebrews 11:3** seems to say that the "Conviction" that God made the Universe- is what Faith is.

Now think about that for just a moment. What should we conclude from this? Well, here's what I conclude from all this. Faith - at least in part - is the spiritual "seeing" or the spiritual "perceiving" of the Fingerprints of God on the things that God has made. So, the Fingerprints of God on the things that God has Created- the order of the Universe; the beauty of Creation; the vastness and greatness of Creation; the undeniable complexity of Creation (the "irreducible complexity" (as Michael Behe says, in his book, *Darwin's Black Box*) – all of those things are the "conviction" that God did indeed make the worlds.

But does that then mean that our spiritual "seeing" or our spiritual "perceiving" of those Fingerprints is a kind of "conviction". Yes exactly. Because it's just the other side of the coin.

In other words- if you ask me, "How do you know that Focus on the Family has a headquarters located in Colorado Springs," I could say- "Well I just believe it is" and leave it at that. But I won't say that. What I will say is "I believe that because I saw it myself when Rhonda and I went there a few years ago". So, my "seeing" is the "Conviction" that it is there.

And I think that is the way that Faith is the "Conviction" of things that are not seen. So, for example, we all look at the very same Fingerprints of God. And some people are blessed to "see"; and believe- while others do not see; and they do not believe. And those who do see have the Conviction- or the Testimony- in themselves. But how can that be?

Here is an analogy at the physical level. A few years ago, one of the fads going around America was hidden 3-D images. These are pieces of art that, on one level, are one thing, but at another level are something quite different. At first glance all you see is the surface presentation. But if you let your eyes focus more deeply, or more distantly, you may see a train or a boxing kangaroo or a globe not only appearing, but actually standing up off from the page.

Now some people stare at these pages for several minutes and see absolutely nothing but color and chaos. But others almost immediately see the head of Beethoven or a lamb. So, if

someone asks, "*How do you know a lamb is there?*" the answer is, "*Because I see it.*" So, your seeing is the conviction. They may not see what you see- but that won't change anything in your mind- because you *do* see.

Now this is what it is like for some to look at God's Creation. Some, like the poor pathetic atheists can stare at a mountain or a galaxy or the eyes of a child their entire life- time and yet see absolutely nothing but random accidents and evolution.

But others, who may very well not be as intellectually astute as the atheist, have a much deeper "view" and when they look at Creation- they "see" God's Fingerprints come into clear focus. And by "seeing" God's Fingerprints- these people know without any doubt at all- that God Almighty created all things.

But just what is the conviction that these people can offer? Nothing other than they can see it. It is as clear to them as the nose on their face and no one can talk them out of it. Why? Because they actually see it- they perceive it- God has graciously shown it to them and the seeing of it is the conviction. That is what the writer of **Hebrews** is talking about here.

And this tells us that Faith or the ability to believe; the Assurance of things hoped for; and the Conviction of things NOT seen- is a wondrous Gift of God. Now, at this point, some might ask, *"But should that really be called, 'Faith?'"* Didn't Paul say in **2 Corinthians 5:7:**

For we walk by faith and not by sight?

So, if what Paul said is true- then how can Faith be "sight"? Well, this is an example of how we can get off- base very fast- unless we put the Scriptures into their proper context. What the Apostle Paul meant when he wrote this in **2Corinthians 5** is that Christ is not present *physically* on earth for us to see with our *physical* eyes- but is in Heaven. That is the context of what Paul meant when he wrote that particular verse. Paul did not mean that there is never any spiritual perception of God's Reality- because there is all the time. But Paul also didn't mean that we should never see things.

So, when the writer says in Hebrews 11:1:

Faith is the conviction of things not seen.

And then the writer illustrates what he meant by that in verse 3 when he says that,

we understand through Faith that God created the world.

He is trying to teach us that Faith is NOT simply a blind and uninformed responding Act of the soul- but true Faith is a "grasping" or a "perceiving" or an "understanding" Act. The writer of **Hebrews** is telling us here that Faith is a spiritual Act that can actually "see" the Fingerprints of God.

Now this does not mean that we can "believe" things into existence or "speak" things into existence as some cults teach. And this also does not mean that we can actually *cause* things to be true- simply because we believe them strongly enough- so that through our belief- things are actually created or things come into existence. No, not at all- that is a *perversion* of Faith. That would be us trying to stand in the place of God and is blasphemy.

We need to know, dear friends, and with all the false Teaching that is out there today trying to deify Man- we all need to be reminded that God alone is the Creator. And God alone has the Power and the Authority to create things that are seen out of nothing. We humans are a *part* of God's glorious Creation. And that fact makes us to be the *created*- NOT the Creator.

We don't create *anything*. We have NOT been given that kind of Power or that kind of Authority- even after we are saved. We do not have the Ability to originate Life; or originate Healing; or originate Salvation; or originate financial Prosperity; or originate an end to Disease or Poverty or Injustice. Only God originates those things in His Capacity as the sovereign Lord and Creator.

God has never authorized anyone to try to "build up their Faith" to the point where we become "God" in the sense that we can now order Creation around; or cause things to appear out of nothing; or cause things to be true that were not true. That kind of Divine Power and that kind of Divine Authority rests only with the three Persons of the Godhead.

Now it is true that we are commanded to be "like" Jesus- but only in the sense that we are to be gentle and kind and holy and loving and forgiving; and that we struggle against Sin; and against the lusts of our flesh; and against temptation; and against the ways of the pagan world- so that we may obey and follow God's Word and be found faithful.

But we are not to be "like" Jesus in the sense that we are now Deity- and as Deity we can now command the Universe; and create healing; and call things into existence by the "power of our spoken word". That is ungodly blasphemy for anyone to say or to teach that- because only God can do that. That is not Faith, dear friends, that is not an example of us rising up in our most holy Faith and "taking charge" over the devil. No, that kind of stuff is nothing more than us trying to sit in God's Throne and be God. And the first person who ever taught that- was the serpent back in the Garden.

And the fact that you can hear that very Theology taught today on what is supposed to be Christian TV or radio- is testimony of how far we have fallen; and how far removed from biblical Christianity we have gone. And it is proof that the ancient Heresies, that the Christian Church confronted and denounced hundreds of years ago, are making a huge comeback in our day to fill the void- because, to a large degree, God's people no longer know God's Word.

Authentic biblical Faith is the assurance of things hoped for and the conviction of things not seen. For example- **Psalms 19:1** says:

The heavens are telling of the glory of God; And their expanse is declaring the work of His hands.

So, you see, beloved, real Faith; true Faith; authentic Faith, is based on real and authentic Truth- not fantasy; and not superstition; and not psyching ourselves up so we can talk ourselves into believing something that isn't true. No, real Faith looks deeply at the world that God has made - and it looks right *through* Creation- so to speak - and by the Grace of God- true biblical Faith actually "sees" and "perceives" and "understands" the Glory of God as standing forth from all of Creation like the hidden image in those 3-D drawings.

Now that leaves us just a few minutes to focus on the *other* part of the definition of faith in verse 1:

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for.

Now this part of **Hebrews 11:1** may well mean nothing more than that Faith is a deep Confidence that the Promises of God will come true so that we can bank on them. And that would be enough to free us from the Fears; and the Greed; and the Worldliness that block the flow of this radical, risk-taking, sacrificial Love. Because if we have a strong Conviction that God will care for us; and bring us to Glory; and fulfill all His Promises to us forever- then we will be free from self-Indulgence; and free to serve God and others. And if that is all that the writer of **Hebrews** was trying to say here in the first part of verse 1- then that would certainly be enough.

But I really believe that this part of **Hebrews 11:1** means much more than that. The Greek word that was translated here as, "Conviction" can mean "Nature" or "Assurance" or "Reality" or "Essence" in other places. For example, in **Hebrews 1:3**, this very *same* word was translated as Jesus being:

... the exact representation of His (God's) nature.

And if *that* is what the writer meant here in **Hebrews 11:1**- then how should we respond to that? What could the "Assurance" or the "Nature" of **things hoped for** mean?

Well, it *could* mean that Faith actually *apprehends* the Goodness and the Sweetness of what God Promises to us so clearly; and so powerfully that this Goodness and this Sweetness are substantially present in Faith. In other words, true, genuine, biblical Faith grasps – or it literally "lays hold of" - God's Preciousness so firmly- that in the Faith itself there is the Assurance of that Goodness and that Sweetness that has been promised to us.

In other words, Faith itself doesn't *create* what we hope for - that would be a mere mind game. No, Faith is a spiritual "apprehending" or a spiritual "perceiving" or a spiritual "tasting" or a spiritual "sensing" of the Beauty and the Sweetness and the Preciousness and the Goodness and the Majesty of what God promises - *especially* His Own Fellowship, and the enjoyment of His Own Presence.

You see, brothers and sisters, Faith does not just feel confident that all of this is coming someday down the road. True Faith has actually "laid hold of"; and "perceived"; and "tasted" that all of this is real. And this means that inherent inside the DNA of real and true Faith is the "Assurance" or the "Nature" of what is hoped for. In other words, Faith's enjoyment of the Promise of God is a kind of substantial "down payment" of the Reality that is sure to come.

And this is what happens when the Gospel is preached rightly, fully, and fearlessly. It is what is happening right now for many of you listening to this Teaching. The Word of God is spoken –it is broken open like sweet bread and poured out like refreshing water. And the spiritual taste of your heart is awakened, and you know that there is more here than the mere opinion of a foolish man.

So, in summary then, true and real and genuine Faith is a kind of spiritual "tasting" of what God has promised so that we feel a deep, substantial Assurance of things hoped for; and real and true and genuine Faith is a kind of spiritual "seeing" of the invisible Fingerprints of God in the things that He has made.

And by the one- we know God's Power and Wisdom to *make* us; and by the other- we know God's Goodness and Grace to *save* us.

So, I join with King David and agree with **Psalm 34:8** and say to you today:

O taste and see that the Lord is good; How blessed is the man who takes refuge in Him!

Now I began by asking why this Chapter (**Hebrews 11**) is in the Bible; and what this particular Chapter has to do with our lives today. And the Answer that I gave you was that **Hebrews 11** is in the Bible to help us become the kind of people that the writer described six verses earlier in **Hebrews 10:34** when he said:

For you showed sympathy to the prisoners and accepted joyfully the seizure of your property, knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one.

Now look closely at what this verse says because I truly believe that **Hebrews 10:34** is one of the greatest verses in the entire Bible- because this verse explains in great detail what real Christian Faith is all about. These people who were in this small little Church in Asia Minor in the first century were Christians who "accepted joyfully the seizure (or the confiscation) of your property" in the Service of Jesus and in the Cause of radical and selfless Love.

In other words- these people were radically free from the love of this present world; and the material possessions of this world; and the values that drive most of what passes for success in America. They were free from this bondage because **Hebrews 10:34** says that they knew, **"that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one."** And that's where Chapter 11 picks up. **Hebrews 11:1** says:

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

In other words, the "knowledge" of **Hebrews 10:34** ("they knew they had a better Possession and a lasting one") is now called, "Faith." And so, in this Chapter- the writer gives us an entire Chapter of real- life examples of this radicalizing Faith that was alive and vibrant and obvious in the lives of the people of that Church.

So, the main point of the 11th Chapter of **Hebrews** is to flesh out and demonstrate more real live accounts of Faith- so that by hearing and by believing these accounts- we would do two things:

- 1. We would imitate the Faith that these people had
- 2. We would inherit the Promises of God.

Now keep in mind that this is not the first time that this writer called these people and us to both imitate and inherit something. Way back in **Hebrews 6**- the writer of this Epistle described the very *same* pattern of imitation and inheritance. Turn and read with me **Hebrews 6**:11&12:

11 And we desire that each one of you show the same diligence so as to realize the full assurance of hope until the end,

12 so that you will not be sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises.

Now did you see here that the writer says that he desires that every single person who serves Jesus Christ will show the very *same* Diligence to what?- the full assurance of Hope.

How long? "Until the end." So, firm; steadfast; unmovable; without being lukewarm; without falling away; all the way unto the very end. And then look at verse 12- so that we will not be sluggish or lazy or slothful and so that we won't neglect so great a Salvation but that we will be followers of those people who, "through faith and patience" actually inherited the Promises of God!

So, the writer doesn't want us to follow those people who open their Bibles on Sunday and then live just like the lost pagan world all week long. No, he wants us to follow or imitate those people who through Faith and Patience, actually got what they believed in; they actually received Heaven- they made it; they actually walk on streets of gold right now. These are the people that the writer wants us to imitate.

So, I ask you today? Who do you imitate? Who do you follow? Whose example do you pattern your life after? Some movie star? Some sports star? Some music star? Some Politician? Who do you know that has lived such a life of radical, selfless Love- who was genuinely willing to lose everything with Joy? Someone, whose life is worthy that you want to imitate them?

And I say to you that this is the main point of **Hebrews 11.** This is why this Chapter is in the Bible- to give all of us more examples of "those who through faith and patience inherit the promises" so that we can imitate *their* Faith; so we can walk like they walked; so we may hope like they hoped. So, we can believe like they believed. And so, we could do what they did; and live our lives- like those people lived their lives- so that we may join them in the very same eternal Inheritance.

And if you are wondering whether you should only look at Old Testament saints in this way for encouragement and imitation, **Hebrews 13:7** says no, you should also look at those who taught you the Word of God and be inspired by *their* faith too. **Hebrews 13:7** says:

Remember those who led you, who spoke the word of God to you; and considering the result of their conduct, imitate their faith.

So, this is a real big issue here in the book of **Hebrews**. So, I beg you- don't let Hollywood or Madison Avenue or Wall Street or the worldly music Industry provide heroes for you. Get some godly heroes who actually serve God- and follow them- imitate their Faith. Begin to investigate and read and study Church History. Find out about people who rejoiced as they died; people who sang hymns as they burned; people who gave God glory for the privilege of dying for Jesus Christ- without complaining and murmuring. And go out and find people today who are so filled with joy and laughter and peace and love that they run from Sin; they abstain from the very appearance of Evil; they would rather die than hurt God's heart.

Read a biography about some great Missionary- rather than some self- absorbed prima donna. Do research about some great Christian businessmen. Get to know some great womenwho poured their lives into their husbands and their children and their Church and their community for the sake of Christ. Come to know and understand their Faith; become familiar with their Testimony; get acquainted with their love of life in Jesus Christ and their passion for Truth; and their to love God above all else. That's the point of **Hebrews 11**.

Now we could take **Hebrews 10:35&36** and say that this passage expresses what is at stake as we read Chapter 11. Because in those two verses- the writer pleads with us by saying:

35 Therefore, do not throw away your confidence, which has a great reward.

36 For you have need of endurance, so that when you have done the will of God, you may receive what was promised.

I ask you to notice the three-step pattern that the writer shows us here:

- 1. Enduring Confidence in God
- 2. Doing the Will of God in the Power of that Confidence
- 3. Receiving what is Promised

So, what I feel compelled to stress to you as we take another step in our examination of what Faith is- the great Need that we have for our Endurance or Patience, as verse 36 says: **"You have need of endurance**"- which empowers us to endure with Joy and Confidence- whatever confronts us - until we see the Promise of God shining through.

A few years ago- I was on the phone with a brother pastor up in Charlotte, North Carolina. And this man was at the Christian and Missionary Alliance annual meeting. My friend was one of the speakers, and we had a chance for a brief conversation. We talked about the perils of doctrinal weakness spreading in an evangelicalism that defines itself increasingly in terms of methods and relationships rather than by Divine Truth.

And at one point in the conversation, he said something very crucial, and then later repeated it in his message to the Alliance. He said that many people in the modern Church don't realize how vulnerable and how perilous the life of Faith really is.

And what he meant was that we dare not take for granted the faithfulness of our Churches or our denominations or our schools or our families - or even of our own hearts, as if vigilance and conscious Endurance were not continually necessary. Because without earnest attention to Truth and Faith- everything else decays- including our own personal walk with God.

So, with renewed concern for my own Faith, and the Faith of our Church and the Faith of your soul and your family I say to you in the words of **Hebrews 10:36**, "We have need of this endurance." Oh, how clearly I saw this great need recently

when I attended the wake of a Pastor, who had suddenly contracted lung cancer and was dead in two weeks. How I see this need when I talk to people on the telephone or in my office- sometimes with tears- who have lost their Joy; and who have lost their Hope; and their Passion; and who really don't know if they can press on in the Ministry. Yes, my friends, the issue of patient Endurance, and Perseverance for the long haul, and staying alive, and thriving and being renewed day after day, and finding the Strength to finish the Race - this is a huge issue for all of us. And there is no resting on past experiences. There is no casual coasting. Because today's zeal can easily become tomorrow's doubt and boredom. And today's sense of spiritual numbness and agony can become tomorrow's ecstasy and power.

And so, that is why our good God gave us **Hebrews 11**. It is in *this* Chapter, that we are given example after example of true abiding and enduring Faith in the lives of real human beings so that we will be able to actually do what **Hebrews 6:12** says to us and that we will be, "**imitators (or followers) of those who through faith and patience** (longsuffering, endurance) **inherit the promises.**"

Now to make the connection between our previous text and today's, you may remember that I did not say a word about **Hebrews 11:2** in the previous section of our Study. And that's because I was saving it for today. Because verse 2 makes a perfect bridge to today's text. So, let's read **Hebrews 11: 1&2** again:

1 Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen. 2 For by it the men of old gained approval.

Now by reading these two verses- we see that true genuine and biblical Faith is two things, as verse one says.

- 1. It's being sure of God's Promises that they are worth putting our hope in ("the assurance of things hoped for").
- 2. It's being sure that the invisible God and His Hand in Creation do in fact exist ("the conviction of things not seen") which we saw illustrated in verse 3.
- ... and once again, I want to remind you that this kind of Faith is a Gift from God. And then the writer said this in verse 2:

For by it the men of old gained approval.

In other words, the writer is saying, "We see this because it's played out in the lives of the Old Testament saints: "For by it (=by this kind of Faith) the men of old- the men of old gained approval or in other words, by this Faith the men of old pleased God or in other words they brought God the Glory that He deserves)."

So, the lives of the Old Testament saints are portraits for us- they are very vivid and colorful illustrations of this kind of Faith. Now keep in mind that these people don't *prove* that Faith is what verse 1 says it is- no, they simply *illustrate* it. In fact, the writer doesn't even try to prove that this is what Faith is at all. No, the writer sees Faith as one of the most basic Assumptions of the nature of Reality. And his whole interpretation of the Old Testament hangs on this. Let me show you what I mean by that.

The first two Old Testament illustrations that the writer gives of the truth of verse 2 (that the men of old gained God's approval by Faith) are Abel, the second son of Adam and Eve, and Enoch, the seventh generation after Adam, mentioned in **Genesis 5**. And he said this in verse 4:

By faith Abel offered to God a better sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained the testimony that he was righteous, God testifying about his gifts, and through faith, though he is dead, he still speaks.

Now this verse and those that come after are usually used to describe the great and mighty Exploits that these men of old did. And the usual purpose of preaching from **Hebrews 11** is to excite the Church so that we will copy what they did. But that purpose of preaching completely misses the entire point that the writer is telling us here. And the reason that I know that to be true is by going back to the Greek- the language that the writer actually wrote this Epistle in and looking at what this man actually said. The writer is not talking about what all these men did for God in this Chapter- no, the writer is talking about what God did for all these men. This Chapter is not about the great exploits of these men- this Chapter is about the greatness of God in giving these men the kind of selfless, sacrificing Faith that allowed them the ability to believe and trust God for Salvation.

You see, the Faith that these men demonstrated in this Chapter is the evidence; or the proof of that kind of Faith and Love that the writer told us about way back in **Hebrews 10:34**. So go with me as we uncover just what the writer is talking about in this Chapter.

First of all- you need to know that the very same Greek word that is used in verse 2 to say "approval" is the same word used here in verse 4 to say the word, "witness" and the word, "testifying".

By faith Abel offered to God a better sacrifice than Cain, through which he obtained the testimony that he was righteous, (there's God's approval- Abel "obtained the testimony"- the word here is the very same word as "approval" in verse 2), God testifying (the word, "testifying" here is also the very same word again) about his gifts: and through faith- (by the good report or the right standing that Able obtained with God through Faith) though [Abel] is dead, he still speaks.

So, what the writer focuses on with Abel is that God approved Abel's offering. And in that approval- God counted Abel as being "Righteous" or "Just". Now please listen to this because this is very important.

The writer tells us very clearly here that the key to Abel being approved by God to the point that God counted Abel as being Righteous- was that Abel made his offering "by Faith" and not through the action of his offering. So, Abel was not accepted by God because he gave an Offering- but because he trusted in God by Faith. So, you see, beloved, this Faith that the writer of **Hebrews** describes here is not just the Faith to be healed; or the Faith to get more of this world's goods.

Now this is not the kind of Faith that we trust in- when we step on the brake pedal. We didn't see who made the car, but we believe; we trust; we hope- that when we mash the brake pedal with our foot- the car will stop. That is an earthly, human initiated kind of Faith. But that kind of Faith will never forgive a single Sin or save a single soul.

The kind of Faith that made Abel acceptable to God- is a supernatural "saving Faith"- the kind of miraculous Faith that does not originate from ourselves. The Bible teaches that this kind of Faith is a gift of God. And this Gift of Faith allows wretched, fallen sinners to trust in the living God for Salvation.

So, you can see that it is not *what* we "do" that matters so much to God- but rather, *how and why we do what we do.* So, the question for us today is this:

Do our actions accurately express "the conviction of things hoped for"?

Now in verse 5, the writer gives Enoch as another example of the Principle of verse 2 (that the men of old gained God's approval by Faith) - so let's read verse 5 together:

By faith Enoch was taken up so that he would not see death; AND HE WAS NOT FOUND BECAUSE GOD TOOK HIM UP; for he obtained the witness that before his being taken up he was pleasing to God.

So, before Enoch was taken up into Heaven- Enoch had obtained the witness; in other words, he had gained approval through Faith- using the language from verse 2.

But how did Enoch obtain this "witness" or how did he gain approval"? Enoch obtained this right standing with God the very same way that all the men of old gained approval- by and through this wondrous Gift of Faith- and NOT by something that they did for themselves. So, what the writer is telling us here is that way before Enoch was ever taken into Heaven- Enoch was justified by Faith.

Now what will help us in our journey through **Hebrews** is to remember that this Book was not originally written to Gentile believers. This Epistle was written to Jewish people who fully understood the Law and who, up until the writing of this Book, were all trying very hard to keep the Law so that they could earn God's Favor.

So, the writer is telling these Jews that God's Salvation was never obtained by anyone through human effort or through human actions- not even under the Old Covenant. But Salvation- from the very beginning- was *always* obtained by everyone the very same way- by Grace alone through Faith alone.

And then the writer goes about to prove to these Jewish people how that all of their Old Testament heroes that they had been taught about all their lives- were all made righteous; they all gained approval; they all had this holy witness; they were all saved and justified and pleased God- not by what *they* did- but by this marvelous Faith that is the assurance of things hoped for and the conviction of things not seen!

So, the writer says that BEFORE he was taken up into Heaven- Enoch was "pleasing to God." Or in other words, Enoch was made to be pleasing in God's sight by this Gift of Faith.

Now two times in **Genesis 5** (verses 22 and 24) Moses says that Enoch **"walked with God."** And this is why the writer of **Hebrews** says here that Enoch pleased God. So, the writer makes his point here that "by faith" Enoch was blessed by God with translation into Heaven.

Now the writer is fully aware of the problem he has created by saying this. He has chosen two Old Testament saints to illustrate his Principle from verse 2 - that the men of old gained approval or in other words they were justified before God by Faith and not by their actions - when in fact- in neither of these Old Testament stories is the word, "Faith" ever actually mentioned.

But this is not a slip-up. The writer knows exactly what he is doing. And if we are willing to follow him today- we will see just how profound his insight really is.

The writer is not arguing here about the *nature* of Faith from these Old Testament texts. He is not saying: "*Because I find Faith mentioned in these stories, therefore Faith must be the way they pleased God*". No, his argument is just the opposite. The writer sees Faith in these stories- not because it is mentioned- but because these men did, in fact, please God. And the writer knows a very simple but profound Law of God that we all need to remember: that there is absolutely no way for sinful human beings to ever please God at all in any way other than by Faith.

All of our human efforts put together as we try to do for God always and in all ways falls short of perfection. Our human actions to try to make ourselves holy and righteous in God's Sight always come short of God's one single Standard. So, it isn't that *some* people please God by what they do and others don't. No, no one can please God by human initiated actionsbecause all of our actions are frail and weak and they all fall short of God's perfect Standard.

And you have to understand this, beloved. No man- not one single human being on earth that is born of woman except the one Man- Jesus Christ- has ever or will ever please God fully by what He does. Everybody else must please God "by Faith"- in Jesus and in His finished Work- or else God is not pleased- AT ALL- no matter how "great" our Works/Deeds might be.

Human beings please God "by Faith"- by trusting in Who Jesus is; and what Jesus has already done for us- or else God is not pleased- AT ALL. And as we trust- (and are saved) we then *respond* in Love to Who Jesus is and what Jesus has already done- with a frail, weak, inconsistent, and imperfect Striving to obey what the Scriptures teach.

And that is why the writer makes his point to his Jewish readers in verse 6. So, let's read that verse again together:

And without faith it is impossible to please *Him*, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and *that* He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.

Now look closely at verse 6. And as you do- catch the flow of verse 5 again. Verse 5 ends by saying that Enoch, "obtained the witness that <u>before</u> his being taken up he was pleasing to God"- which is simply another way of saying that Enoch "walked with God" (Genesis 5:24). And then, Hebrews 11:6 picks up this fact of Enoch's pleasing God and argues like this:

"And without faith it is impossible to please Him."

... so, verse 5 and 6 are one single thought and NOT separate thoughts. Verse 6 is *completing* verse 5.

And that is *why* the writer sees Faith in the lives of Abel and Enoch- even though Moses didn't specifically mention it back in **Genesis**. The Bible says that both of them pleased God – Abel, in his "**better sacrifice** " and Enoch, in his "walking with God." And so, the writer concludes in **Hebrews 11:6** that the Sacrifice of Abel; and the Fellowship that Enoch had with God-*must* have been "by Faith". Why did he conclude that? Because in verse 6 he said,

"without faith it is impossible to please God."

... and both men did please God.

Now this shows us two very important aspects about the Bible. First of all, this shows us what is called the "*Logic of Scripture*". Isaiah 55:8&9 says:

8 "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, Nor are your ways My ways," declares the Lord.

9 "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, So are My ways higher than your ways And My thoughts than your thoughts.

We must understand, beloved, that human logic is weak, frail, finite, and fallen- even after we are saved. And that is why God gave us the Bible. Our ability to think and ponder and use logic or to reason with something- is *lower* than God's. But it is also much *different* from God's. And so, we have to learn God's Logic; and we have to learn God's Way of thinking. And the only way to do that- is by learning the "Logic of Scripture".

So, as you spend time with God in His Word- you learn that God doesn't see things like we do. So, we must learn *how* God sees things by learning the flow and the pattern and the

reasoning of God's Logic through *how* He does; and *why* He does- through Scripture. So that, we do not commit the Sin of trying to make God fit into our human fallen logic.

And secondly, this Passage also speaks about another area of the Bible in that what the New Testament writers say in the 21 New Testament Epistles- is the *result* of them being filled with the Holy Spirit on the Day of Pentecost. And so, the Revelation from God that the Apostles received- is the *final, full*, and *completed* Revelation of God to Man. So, we understand what the Old Testament means by looking at the Old Testament- "*through the lens*"- of the New Testament. In other words, what the New Testament Apostles wrote- is the correct interpretation of the Old Testament writings.

So, for example, when the writer of **Hebrews** tells us that Abel and Enoch and all the rest obtained God's Favor "by Faith" and NOT by what they did- we know that this is the missing piece that Moses and the Prophets did not fully understand when they wrote their Revelation in the Old Testament.

Oh, how I pray that you will all respect, and cultivate in your own God-given minds, the "Logic of Scripture". If someone had shown me as a youth that the Bible *reasons* rather than just *asserting*, it would not have taken me till I was much older to begin to discover so many of the riches of God's Word. So, this is basic reasoning. And I would say that an average 8 or 9 year- old child can understand this.

So, there are two statements that the writer makes here based on all that we have learned so far:

Statement #1: "*Without Faith it is impossible to please God*" - or positively, "*Only with Faith will our effort at Obedience be pleasing to God*."

Statement #2: "Enoch pleased God". So, what's the Conclusion? **Conclusion:** Enoch had Faith. Or: it was "by Faith" that Enoch "walked with God" and was "taken up to Heaven". This is how the writer arrives at the Statement of verse 2:

For by it [faith] the men of old gained [God's] approval.

But we are still not at the bottom of things yet. The Argument is still not resting on the deepest Truth about this Passage. Yes, Enoch pleased God. Yes, without Faith we cannot please God. Yes, Enoch (and Abel), therefore, had Faith, and acted by Faith - illustrating the Principle of verse 2. But where does this premise - this statement - come from: "without faith it is impossible to please God"? What's the *basis* for that Claim? What's the Bottom of it? What is the Foundation?

And the writer gives his Answer in the last part of verse 6. First, he makes the claim: "Without faith it is impossible to please [God]." Then he gives the Foundation. Here's the Bottom of it all: You can't please God without Faith,

... for (because) he who comes to God must believe that He is and *that* He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.

... so, it is because of this Truth that we know that only "by Faith" can we please God.

So, there are actually two parts to Faith in this verse which shows us *why* it pleases God. And beyond this- the writer doesn't go. He rests his case here. This is the bottom of it all.

First, he says that true genuine Faith believes that God exists. Second, he says that this kind of Faith believes that God is the Rewarder of those who seek Him. And the writer concludes then that because Faith is both of these two things: therefore, "Faith pleases God".

Now ponder this with me for a moment and you will get to know your God more deeply, perhaps, than you have ever known Him. That's why this verse is here; so that we will know God. The writer does not say *why* God is pleased by these two aspects of Faith. He just says that God IS pleased by these two aspects. So, there must be something about the very Nature of God that makes this point obvious. It does not need an Argument or additional Proof. It belongs to the very Essence of what it means to be God- that God should be pleased by these two things. So, let's put them in our own words. God is pleased with us when two things about Him are reflected in our relation to Him:

- 1. We fully trust/accept/believe/hope that God is Real
- 2. We fully trust/accept/believe/hope that God is Rewarding.

... and behind these two Assertions about God are two great facts:

1. God exists absolutely. God did not come into being and will never go out of being. He is not *becoming* or *growing* or *changing*. He said in **Exodus 3:14**, **"I am who I am"**. That is God's Name. God absolutely is. Therefore, God is pleased when His absolute Existence is known and embraced by us. God is pleased when WHO He is- is reflected in our lives.

2. Behind the Assertion that God is Rewarding is the fact that **God is so Full and so completely Self-sufficient that He overflows.** Rather than needing our Service- God is like a never-ending Spring of Life and Energy and Joy and Beauty and Goodness and Power. Therefore, it pleases God when we come to Him in a way that affirms this; and delights in it. In other words, God is honored when we come to Him as knowing that He is a Rewarder.

And the writer of **Hebrews** simply asserts here that this is what Faith does. True Faith rises up to God with the complete Confidence that God is. But then Faith also comes with the Confidence that God is a generous Rewarder. So, the writer is not arguing that Faith is this way because he finds it defined in the Old Testament stories. So, he is saying that given the absolute Reality of God's Being and God's Fullness- this is what Faith *has* to be. So, this is the End of his Argument. This is the Bottom of his Reasoning.

Now we could say it like this: what pleases God is that our hearts and minds display God's Being and Beauty; that we display God's Existence and His Excellence; that we display how real God is; and how rewarding He is. And that is what pleases God- because coming to God like that- is what Faith is.

And that brings us back to verse 1. Notice how the two parts of verse 6 correspond to the two parts of verse 1. Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

... and now look again at verse 6:

And without faith it is impossible to please *Him*, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and *that* He is a rewarder of those who seek Him.

So, the "Conviction" of things "not seen" in verse 1 corresponds to Faith's belief that God is; and that He exists in verse 6. And the "Assurance" of things "hoped for" in verse 1 corresponds to Faith's belief that God is the Rewarder of those who seek him in verse 6. So, true genuine Biblical Faith has at least these two components:

1) The Conviction of those who believe that there is a great unseen God, Who exists absolutely; and Who does not depend on us in the least. And the other is the Assurance that this great unseen God is a God of Love and Bounty and free and sovereign Grace for all who seek Him in Truth.

Now I began this section by saying that in our day- the "life of Faith" is vulnerable and perilous. Schools, denominations, churches, families, and souls are vulnerable to the subtle encroachments of the World and Sin and Error and satan. And that means that vigilance and endurance are crucial for your soul and your family and our church and our Christian schools.

And what we have seen here in **Hebrews** now is that the *nature* of Faith; and the *vitality* of Faith is rooted in what *God* is like- and NOT what *we* are like. So, you don't find out what Christian Faith is- by consulting your own "felt needs". You find out by consulting the Nature of God in the Bible. Therefore, if you would have your Faith to be strong; and your soul to be strong; and your family to be strong; and your church to be strong; and your denomination and schools to be strong; and your nation to be strong- then know your God. And know your God by knowing the Scriptures!

Because the more you know what God is like- the more conformed to His Greatness will be your Faith. You will be more and more assured of things hoped for and more and more convinced of things unseen. And God's Existence and Fullness will be wonderfully displayed in your life.

The Faith of Abraham, Noah, and Sarah.

Now let's open our Bibles and read Hebrews 11:7-12 together:

⁷ By faith Noah, being warned *by God* about things not yet seen, in reverence prepared an ark for the salvation of his household, by which he condemned the world, and became an heir of the righteousness which is according to faith.

⁸ By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed by going out to a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing where he was going.

⁹ By faith he lived as an alien in the land of promise, as in a foreign *land*, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, fellow heirs of the same promise;

 10 for he was looking for the city which has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.

 11 By faith even Sarah herself received ability to conceive, even beyond the proper time of life, since she considered Him faithful who had promised.

¹² Therefore there was born even of one man, and him as good as dead at that, *as many descendants AS THE STARS OF HEAVEN IN NUMBER, AND INNUMERABLE AS THE SAND WHICH IS BY THE SEASHORE.*

Now here in these six verses- we have four real and living examples of how genuine Faith lives:

- 1. Noah trusts God; and builds an Ark for the Salvation of his household.
- 2. Abraham trusts God; and leaves his own homeland for an unknown place that God had promised to him.
- 3. Abraham trusts God; and lives in tents instead of building a city with permanent foundations.
- 4. Sarah trusts God; and conceives when she is barren and way past the normal age of childbearing.

Now make sure that you don't slip into a mentality here that is common among modern Christians - namely, the mentality that *assumes* (without even thinking about it) that the Faith spoken of here in these verses has nothing to do with personal Salvation - that this Faith is a kind of "add-on" to basic Christianity - that we were saved by an Act of Faith that is somehow *different* from what's being talked about right here.

In other words, many Christians think today that "Saving Faith" is only a single Act (like asking Jesus into your heart) and that everything else that happens in the Christian life is something "added on" to that Salvation. And it is "added on" for our Benefit or "for the sake of" our Maturity- but that it isn't really relevant to our Salvation. And I'm trying to tell you that this isn't true.

So, I plead with you today to resist the temptation to fall into that kind of mentality. You see, beloved, "Saving Faith"- that God given kind of Faith that allows fallen Man to believe- is not merely a single Act of trusting in Jesus" one time. No, "Saving Faith" trusts in Jesus- so that we will be supernaturally transformed- so that we will *go on* trusting Jesus for the remainder of our lives.

You see, true, genuine "Saving Faith" *always* produces an entire "life of Faith". And that kind of a "life of Faith" is what this entire chapter is trying to teach us. In other words-genuinely saved people don't just "pray a prayer" one time. We don't trust in Jesus- one time. So, the Bible doesn't teach about lost people walking an aisle; or raising their hand; or "going down front" and then they have their ticket punched; and now they're free to go and do and live anyway they choose.

No, the people who do that- are simply deceived into thinking they are saved. Truly born- again souls believe in Jesus- so that they may *go on* believing in Jesus throughout their lives. And you can see that very clearly if you look at the verse that leads into the chapter, **Hebrews 10:39**- so let's read that verse together:

But we are not of those who shrink back to destruction, but of those who have faith to the preserving of the soul.

Do you see what is at stake here? The Bible says here that every single human being in every Church will either shrink back to complete Destruction- or we will press on in Faith to preserve the soul. And the way that the Greek actually phrases this verse is in the sense of believing that is *ongoing*- and *not* a onetime Event.

So, "Saving Faith"- the kind of Faith that the writer illustrates here and in Chapter 11- is all about us *persevering*. It is all about truly born- again souls continuing to believe until we finish our Course in this Life and enter into Heaven.

So, since true "Saving Faith" always promotes Perseverance- that shows us that not all Faith is saving Faith. For example, when you step on the gas pedal of the car- you "believe" and "trust" that the car will go forward. And that is type of Faith. You may not even know anything about a car- but you *believe* that the car will go forward. You believe that if you take medicine you will feel better. And that is a kind of Faith that everybody has- saved or lost.

And this kind or this type of Faith operates in the life of lost people the very same way that "human will" or "choices" or "decisions" operate in the life of lost people- only on a *horizontal* level. In other words, human beings dealing with natural things on an earthly level.

But the Fall of Adam was so radically damaging- that every human born after the Falllost their ability and their desire to choose or to exercise Faith on a *vertical* level- toward God or the things of God- unless God supernaturally intervenes on behalf of that individual first. Please look with me at **1Corinthians 2:14** that says:

But a natural man does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually appraised.

So, for example- lost people can exercise their own "will" all day long- but only as long as those choices pertain *horizontally* to this life; and to those things that please themselves; or that advances themselves. But lost people can't make those kinds of choices about things that are vertical or that are heavenly.

So, for any lost person to suddenly choose to believe in and trust in Jesus; for any lost person to suddenly make a decision to repent and trust in Jesus- takes a sovereign Act of God-moving upon the heart and mind of that lost person first- to give that person both the desire to repent and be saved; and the power to do so- or

else he would never believe and be saved.

So, in order for any lost person to be saved- requires what is called "Saving Faith" or the "Gift of Faith" that **Ephesians 2:8&9** talks about. So, please read **Ephesians 2:8&9** with me:

8 For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God;

9 not as a result of works, so that no one may boast.

Now this is a very familiar passage that people quote all the time. But I want to take the time here to go deep into this verse and tear it apart and put it back together so we can see what God is really saying.

The Apostle Paul is teaching here that the kind of Faith that saves- does not originate from inside of ourselves. And that means that nobody can simply rub the two sticks of your own free will and your own desires together to produce this kind of Faith. And you can go down as deep as you want to inside the heart and soul of any lost individual- and you will never find this kind of Faith lying there. And that is true because the Bible says right here that this kind of Faith does not originate from any of us. This kind Faith- this Gift of Faith- this Saving Faith must be granted to us; it must be given to us- by a gracious Act of a sovereign God. This kind of Faith

originates from Heaven. And Paul says here that this Saving Faith is a Gift of God. And it is, in fact, a miracle.

So, the Bible teaches that this powerful Saving Faith comes down from God as a merciful Gift to unworthy sinners. And this Faith produces in us the both the Desire to *want* God; and this Saving Faith, that is a Gift from God, also produces in us the Power or the Ability to press onward and upward to Jesus- no matter what the Cost.

And then **Hebrews 10:39** says that those who have received within themselves this savings faith *do not* shrink back to Destruction- but they constantly and continuously press onward and upward always believing; always hoping; always trusting in Jesus- with the very same Faith that saved their souls in the first place. And those who are given this Faith- will keep on believing all the way to Glory.

So, those people who only have an *intellectual* curiosity about Jesus; or those who have some kind of an *emotional* tie to Jesus- will not persevere to the end. They may get all excited about Jesus for a while. And they may make the most noise and create the most enthusiasm for a while. But because what they have- is not true "Saving Faith"- these people will not remain faithful long term. They will not stay true until the end. And they will not *go on* with Jesus. The Bible says that these people will shrink back to eternal Destruction.

But even though those who have been truly born from above may get discouraged at times; and while they may become disillusioned with people; or with Church in general; and even though genuinely saved people may even want to throw their hands up and quit- they don't quit; they don't stop; they don't turn back. In fact, the Bible teaches that they can't ultimately turn away from Jesus- precisely because God will not allow them.

So, the difference between saved people and lost people; or people who are deceived into thinking they are saved- is that truly born- again regenerate people don't quit- they press on; they never stop. In fact, they *can't* stop because the very same Faith that saved these people in the beginning *keeps* them saved by the very Power of Jesus Christ.

But those who simply go to Church but who have not been truly born of God will not continue on through their trials or through their Sufferings- and they will surly faint and shrink back to utter Destruction.

In other words, the Evidence of genuine, authentic "Saving Faith" is not the hype; or the shout; or the jump- it is in the pressing on; the continuing on; the Perseverance. The kind of Heaven- sent supernatural Faith that saves from eternal Destruction- is the same Faith that empowers us to live for Jesus- day by day. And that is what Chapter 11 of **Hebrews** is meant to illustrate.

So, just what does this "Saving Faith" look like? **Hebrews 11:1** defines the Faith that saves and that presses on to preserve the soul as being:

The assurance of things hoped for and the conviction of things not seen.

So, the kind of Faith that saves from Destruction and preserves the soul is "future oriented". This kind of Faith doesn't simply look back to what God did in the Past- but it mainly looks forward to what God promises to do in the Future. So, this kind of Faith gains a lot of its Confidence from God's past Faithfulness- sure it does- but what it *believes* and *trusts in* and *hopes in*- is mainly the Promises of the Future.

So, this is not an "add-on, or second-stage, or super- duper Faith that seeks to display an open show of Glory. No, this kind of Faith is a "basic, ever-growing, always pressing onward and upward; ordinary; normal *saving* and *keeping* Faith".

So, let's take our four examples of living "by Faith" - the kind of faithful living that leads *away* from Destruction and into Salvation that we see in **Hebrews 10:39**. And then let's look at four things that are always true of this life of Faith. And in looking at this-let's see if we can do these two things:

- 1. Let us all listen to what this passage of inspired; God exhaled Scripture teaches us about the life of this kind of supernatural Saving Faith that we are all called to live
- 2. Apply what it teaches to our own lives and our own circumstances.

Now there are at least four things that are always true about the Life of Faith:

- 1. There is always a promised Work of God
- 2. There is first an inner Response to this Faith
- 3. Based upon the inner Response- there is an External Response
- 4. The Life of Faith enjoys *some* Reward now- but that immediate Reward is not *all* the Reward and it is not even *most* of the Reward

So, let's take them one at a time as they show up in these Biblical examples.

1. There is Always a Promised Work of God.

God speaks and promises that, at some point in the Future, He will do something wonderful. And what God promised- is the Object of our Faith. We trust God, that what He says will come to pass- and that it will, in fact, happen. And so, we believe that God will do what He said He will do. So, in reality- Faith is simply believing that God is not a liar; and that what He promised- He will do.

I remember speaking to a Muslim Iman several years ago about this very subject. I told this man that I would convert to Islam in a second- if he could show me that Allah would keep his promises. I told him that the Qur'an says that Allah is holy and that I am a sinner. And that is the very same thing that the Bible teaches. But, unlike the Qur'an - the Bible goes on to teach that if I trust in Jesus- then Jesus will save me to the uttermost. That is the Promise of the God of the Bible to all who believe: that if we will put all our Trust in Jesus Christ and in His finished Work- God will save us; and God will keep us saved- all the way to Heaven.

So, I asked this man, who was highly trained in the Qur'an, if I put all my Hope and Trust in Allah- would Allah save me; and then would Allah keep me all the way to Heaven? And, of course, the Iman could *not* tell me, "*Yes*!" Because in Islam- like all false religions- Salvation is not about God keeping His Promises. It is not about God doing *for* us- what we *cannot* do for ourselves. No, to those deceived by Islam or any other false religion- Salvation is all about what Man can do for himself and for God.

So, I asked this man a question. If Allah is not powerful enough to save me in the first place; and if Allah is not strong enough to keep me saved- then why in the world would I ever put my Trust in him? Why should I trust in a god, who cannot keep his promises? And his answer was- that he just stood there in silence.

But I say to you today that the one true living God of the Holy Bible- the Father of Jesus Christ- absolutely *does* keep His Promises. And the one true living God has *proven* Himself to be worthy of my Trust. You see, beloved, I trust God- not because I'm brave; or because I'm somebody special. No, I trust in God because God has proven Himself worthy of my Trust.

And Jesus made many, many Promises. And Jesus stands by every single one of them. And those who put their Trust in Him shall never be ashamed. The God of the Bible does what He says He will do. Let's read **Hebrews 11:7-9**:

⁷ By faith Noah, being warned *by God* about things not yet seen, in reverence prepared an ark for the salvation of his household, by which he condemned the world, and became an heir of the righteousness which is according to faith.

⁸ By faith Abraham, when he was called, obeyed by going out to a place which he was to receive for an inheritance; and he went out, not knowing where he was going.

⁹ By faith he lived as an alien in the land of promise, as in a foreign *land*, dwelling in tents with Isaac and Jacob, fellow heirs of the same promise;

Notice that verse 7 says that Noah was "warned by God about things not yet seen," namely, the Flood that was coming. Verse 8 says that Abraham was "called" by God to leave his homeland. Verse 9b says that Abraham and Isaac and Jacob were fellow-heirs of a "Promise" - so God had made a Promise about the land that they would inherit it someday, but not yet. Now look again at verse 11:

By faith even Sarah herself received ability to conceive, even beyond the proper time of life, since she considered Him faithful who had promised.

So, we see here that verse 11b says that Sarah regarded Him faithful **"Who had promised."** You see, God had promised. So, in every case the "Life of Faith" is *sustained* by the Word of God. God has spoken. And Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of Christ. So, this is the starting point: God.

So, God has spoken many promises to us in His Word. For example- God has promised in **Philippians 4:19:**

And my God will supply all your needs according to His riches in glory in Christ Jesus

... and in **Psalm 23:6** God has promised:

I will pursue you with Goodness and Mercy

... and in Hebrews 13:5&6 God has promised:

I will never leave you or forsake you so that you can say, 'The Lord is my helper, I will not fear, what can man do to me".

... and in John 15:5 Jesus – Who is God made flesh- has promised:

If you abide in Me, and My words abide in you- you will bear much fruit

In Isaiah 40:31 God has promised:

Wait on Me and you will renew your strength; you will mount up with wings like eagles, you will run and not grow weary, you will walk and not faint

In Luke 12:12 God has promised:

I will give you words that you need to speak

In James 1:5 God has promised:

I will give you wisdom for every new challenge

In Isaiah 41:10 God has promised: I will be with you and strengthen you and help you

In Psalm 32:8 God has promised:

I will instruct you and teach you in the way which you should go; I will counsel you with My eye upon you

So, all of God's Promises are made on the unalterable Fact of God's complete *inability* to lie. And all of God's Promises are based upon the Fact of God being Almighty- and totally *unable* to do anything that is contrary to His Will. And that has the effect of making every single Promise of God Sure and Certain and Steadfast and Reliable to you and me. And so, Faith latches on to the very Character and Nature of God and thus Faith trusts in God and in the Promises of God.

And God has acted in a very powerful and sovereign Way already in your life to bring you to Himself. And God has spoken Words that have been recorded in 66 Books that give a massive Foundation to your Life of Faith that you live every day.

And in God's Providence- He has seen fit to bring you *this* way- to *this* Church to be a part of *this* Ministry in *this* City; in *this* State; in *this* Nation; at this particular time of your life. So, we all have a great need to know just how this Faith manifests itself in us- right here and right now.

2. The Life of Faith Always Produces an Internal Response First

You see, there is an *outer* Response to this Faith, which we will see in a moment. But the *inner* Response comes *first*. And it is this *inner* Response that is the very *essence* of Faith.

So, the *outer* Response is simply the fruit of the *inner* Response. But without the *inner* Life of Faith- the *outer* Acts are mere human Performances, which Jesus calls, "Hypocrisy" and "White-washed Tombs" in **Matthew 23:27**.

Woe to you, scribes and Pharisees, hypocrites! For you are like whitewashed tombs which on the outside appear beautiful, but inside they are full of dead men's bones and all uncleanness. Now I want to show you a very good example of the *inner* Response to this holy, "Saving Faith". **Hebrews 11:7** says that Noah operated in **"reverence"**. Now, operating in "Reverence" means that Noah was operating in this holy Reverence as he built the Ark.

And the Reverence that moved Noah to build the Ark is an example of the *inner* Life of Faith: humbly bowing and trembling with Joy before the awesome Word of God.

Here's another example of the *inner* Response to this Faith. **Hebrews 11:8** describes Abraham's Faith as **"not knowing where he was going"**. In other words, Abraham's *inner* Response to this Faith was that he went out- **"not knowing where he was going"** when he set out. In other words, *part* of the *inner* Response of Faith is sometimes Perplexity and Uncertainty about the details about God's Call on our lives.

Here's another example. **Hebrews 11:10** says that the *reason* that Abraham lived in tents instead of building a permanent city was because he " **was looking for the city which has foundations, whose architect and builder is God.**" So, from this we can see that Faith focuses not on the present Reward and Prosperity, but on God; and what God has already promised to do. That is the basic Reality of true, genuine Faith- it fixes its gaze not on the negative circumstances; or the human risks; that we face right now- but Faith focuses on the Reality that God will build according to His Promises. How tragic that so many people today only see how hard things are right now and they never look ahead to see how wonderful it will be then.

And then finally, **Hebrews 11:11** says that Sarah " **considered Him faithful who had promised.**" Again, God is the focus. So, the *inner* "Life of Faith" is a riveting Focus on God. And Faith sees God as being utterly Faithful; utterly Dependable; and utterly Trustworthy.

So, here is what the "Life of Faith" means for you and me as we come to Christ in our day and in this place. It means a kind of trembling Reverence like Noah had- over the Greatness of God- through the Ministry of corporate Worship in this place. And this is not a simple thing. Because this Ministry focuses on Eternity; and on the Throne of God every day- in every word that we speak; and every action that we make- from this place. So, because that is true- anything that has to do with God so directly and so sacredly- calls for the profoundest Reverence in those who are here.

You see, we all come, like Abraham, with all kinds of Unknowns. Only God knows the Future of this Church and this City and this Ministry and us. So, we *all* come to a Place and to a Ministry where almost all the people are Unknowns; and all the expectations are varied; and the possibilities are endless; and the pitfalls are many; and the "god of this world" is deceitful. And so, we come like Abraham- knowing God's Call- but not knowing the details. And so, it will be with every major Act of Obedience you perform.

But we look not to ourselves in this Uncertainty- we look to the Faithfulness of God; and to the kind of thing that only God can build. Because, after all- the Battle belongs to the Lord. And so, Faith does not focus on all the Unknowns. Faith does not brood over how uncertain things are. Faith lifts up its eyes to a City, Whose Architect and Builder is God. And Faith sings the phrase,

"Ponder anew what the Almighty can do If with His Love He befriend thee."

...and Faith joins with Sarah and considers God to be faithful Who has promised.

3. The Internal Response to Faith Always Produces an External Response

But the Life of Faith also involves an *external* Response and not just an *internal* one. So, let's look at some powerful *external* Responses in the lives of these people.

Hebrews 11:7 says that Noah built an Ark. Okay, but *why* did he build the Ark? The Bible says that Noah built the Ark- "by Faith"- because he believed God. So, Noah, first, *internally* responded with godly Reverence. But then he also did something *externally*: he built an Ark. Just imagine the ridicule that Noah must have endured building a boat in the middle of the desert- preaching Righteousness for 120 years- and telling everybody that it was going to rain – when it had never rained before! So, why did he do it? Because Noah believed. Noah had Faith.

Here's another example of an *external* Response. **Hebrews 11:8-10** says that Abraham left a secure family and a home in Ur of the Chaldees- so he could wander like a nomad in the hot desert. Abraham chose to live in tents- rather than in a city- to demonstrate that he was looking for God's Act and God's Timing in his life. So, why didn't he just stay where he was? Because Faith moved him, first *internally*, and then it moved him *externally*. Now it doesn't say this- but I presume that after Sarah judged God to be Faithful- she got the diapers and the crib ready.

You see, dear friends, "Saving Faith" changes the way we live. Our life takes on a dimension that can only be explained by "**the assurance of things hoped for**."

You see, only God makes sense out of building an Ark in the desert. Only God makes sense of an Immigration to who-knows-where; and living in tents rather than building a city; and preparing for a child you are too old to bear. But that's the way of the "Life of Faith", isn't it? It doesn't make sense without God. But with God, it is utterly reasonable.

So, it is with us today. Some of us have left very secure houses and a successful business to come here. Some of us may have emigrated from many different cities and even states. Some of us have chosen to move here to this city with all of its unique challenges and opportunities. And I fully believe that God will grant to us the spiritual offspring that only God can produce. O, that God may grant the miracle of New Birth the way He granted the miraculous birth of Isaac!

4. The Life of Faith Enjoys some Reward Now- but that Immediate Reward is not ALL the Reward; and it is not even the BEST Reward

We must remember, beloved, that while Noah was physically saved with his family from the Flood- **Hebrews 11:7** says that Noah is only an "heir" of the Righteousness that is by Faith. In other words, Noah was still awaiting the full Blessing of Righteousness when he died.

Abraham found the Promised Land, and prospered immensely during his life- but Hebrews 11:10 says that he still lived in tents and only saw "by Faith" the "City Whose Architect and Builder is God". And Sarah did indeed have her miracle baby. But the countless seed mentioned in Hebrews 11:12 were far in the future for her.

So, from this we can see that Faith tastes the Blessing of God's Goodness now in this age. But it doesn't taste it *all*. And it doesn't even taste *most* of it-because there is so much more yet to come. And what is to come- is *exponentially* superior to anything that we have seen so far.

And this is the point of **Hebrews 11:39&40** which says:

39 And all these, having gained approval through their faith, did not receive what was promised,

40 because God had provided something better for us, so that apart from us they would not be made perfect.

The best way for us to understand this here in Mississippi is that:

We have a home in Glory Land that outshines the Sun!

So, however Good God has been to you so far; however many prayers God has answered; however sweet God has been to you here- *you ain't seen nothing yet*! What is over there- is so much greater than what is over here- that there is no way to explain it or compare it.

And so, we await the full ingathering of all God's people from all the nations of the world, so that the full Inheritance of God's Kingdom will come together; and God's Plan for us and this earth will be accomplished!

And so, it will be with us and our families as we labor together for God's Glory. We will be blessed in this place. And we will be a Blessing to each other. And we will have a *measure* of Joy. And we will see fruitful Ministry. And we will taste the Salvation of our God. And we will see a *measure* of the Glory of the Lord.

But it will all be, as Paul says, "through a mirror dimly." It will all be partial. Every Joy- will have its limits; Every Fruit- its bruise; Every Relationship- its disappointment; Every Service- its critic; And every Birth and Wedding- its nearby Funeral. All the Good that we will experience now- will pale by comparison to the greater Glory and the greater Joy that we will have when we stand before God on that day.

Hebrews 13:14 takes up the very thought of Abraham's Faith:

For here we do not have a lasting city...

So down here- everything breaks; everything ages; everything spoils; and everything rusts; and everything dies. Only God remains unchanged; and only God remains glorious. But I say to you that God makes all the difference!

So just what is this Faith? Read with me one of the greatest Passages in the Bible-**Hebrews 10:32-34:**

32 But remember the former days, when, after being enlightened, you endured a great conflict of sufferings,

33 partly by being made a public spectacle through reproaches and tribulations, and partly by becoming sharers with those who were so treated.

34 For you showed sympathy to the prisoners and accepted joyfully the seizure of your property, knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one.

So, Faith is being able to endure a "**great conflict of Sufferings**". Faith is being made a gazing stock by Reproaches and Persecutions and of becoming companions of those who are "**so**

treated". Faith is having Compassion and Mercy on those who are in bonds. And Faith is *joyfully* "accepting the seizure of your Property"!

Why? How do you say that this is Faith? Because of what verse 34 says. These people did all of this- they were willing to go through all of this- with Joy. Why? How? Because they knew:

... that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one

These people didn't guess or wonder or hope. But because they had the kind of Faith that was both Assurance and Conviction- and because they had the Faith that allowed them to know that what they had in Heaven awaiting them was exponentially greater than anything that they had here on earth- they could go through all that they went through- with Joy! And that is the kind of Faith I *want*, dear friends, because that is the kind of Faith I *need*.

That is the kind of Faith that moves upon a Self- centered people and that moves upon a Self- satisfied Church- first *internally*- and then *externally*. And this selfless Faith *inconveniences* these people to go; and to speak; and to move; and to do; and to leave their Comfort; and leave their Safety; and to leave their Security; and to leave their Possessions; and to be perplexed at times; and to endanger themselves; and risk it all! Why? So, the world may see Jesus! So, the world may hear from Jesus! And so, the world may know and love and follow and obey and value Jesus!

And so, that is what we are about here in this Church: The kind of Faith that allows us to *connect* with God; the Faith that allows us to *know* God; the Faith that allows us to *love* God; and to *follow* God; and the kind of radical Faith that allows us to see God as being *worth it all*; and the Faith that allows us to see the great Value in prizing God above all else; and to actively rejoice in the Supremacy of God in all things- so that God may be worshipped in the manner in which He is entitled to be worshipped; and so that our Joy may be full!

Now as you recall- **Hebrews 11** is a very popular Chapter among us today- because this is the Chapter that describes just what true genuine Faith is; and what it looks like; and what it does in those who have it. And the writer gives us many examples in this Chapter of real people who possessed- not just Faith- but the *gift* of Faith- or what is called "Saving Faith"- which is the *kind* of Faith that we all need in order to be saved.

Now we need to keep in mind that **Hebrews 11** is not a separate Book sitting off by itself. Most of the time when this chapter is read or studied- it is looked at as being separated from the rest of this Book. But that is the wrong way to look at **Hebrews 11**. **Hebrews 11** is the 11th Chapter in a 13 Chapter Book that makes absolutely no sense at all; and will be taken out of context; unless you tie this chapter in with the first 10 chapters that came before it; and the other two chapters that come after it- and then with the rest of the entire Bible.

The descriptions and the testimony and the great exploits of the people of **Hebrews 11** is based upon a small seemingly insignificant Passage found in **Hebrews 10: 32-34**- that I personally believe is one of the *greatest* passages in all the Bible. Because this is the passage that accurately describes just what Biblical Christianity really is- so let's read that passage again:

Heb 10:32-34

32 But remember the former days, when, after being enlightened, you endured a great conflict of sufferings,

33 partly by being made a public spectacle through reproaches and tribulations, and partly by becoming sharers with those who were so treated.

34 For you showed sympathy to the prisoners and accepted joyfully the seizure of your property, knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one.

Now just what kind of Faith is it; what kind of Power is it- that allows people to endure a great "conflict of Sufferings"; and allows them to be made a "public spectacle"- in both Reproaches and Tribulations? What kind of Faith is it that allows people to be willing to associate with those who are being persecuted- without fear? And what kind of Faith is it that allows people to lose all of their earthly possessions- with Joy? So, this is way beyond simply *enduring* Persecution. These people were able to suffer- with Joy!

The people of this small little Church were able to do all of this because of what the end of verse 34 says:

... knowing that you have for yourselves a better possession and a lasting one

These people were able to suffer with Joy because they *knew*- they didn't guess; they didn't wonder; they didn't hope; they *knew* that what they had in Heaven was infinitely better than anything that they had down here. They knew that what God had promised them in Heaven was more certain and more- sure and was more lasting and was more enduring than anything that they could ever have down here- up to and including their own lives. And this Knowledge based in this supernatural Faith empowered these people to not simply *endure* their Suffering- but to go through all of it- with Joy!

Now that is Faith! And this is the kind of Faith that the writer is describing to us here in **Hebrews 11.** So, this is Faith that is way beyond Hope. This is Faith that is both Assurance and Conviction. And now the writer goes through the people of the OT Scriptures- who these Jewish people would have been intimately aware of- the OT heroes who actually possessed this kind of radical dangerous Faith that is able to risk it all and lose it all- with Joy!

Now the words that I am going focus on today are "seek" and "desire." These are the elements of Faith that our writer wants us to grasp today. Another way of understanding what the writer is teaching us here in this Passage- is to see that this Passage is divided into two groups. For example, in verses 13-16 we are looking into the heart of those who live and die "in or by Faith". And in these verses- we are focusing on the *inner* Experience of Faith, rather than the *outward* Acts that come *from* having Faith. And then, in verses 17-19, we see that *outward* Demonstration as we watch Abraham act out Faith in an incredible demonstration of utter Confidence in the Promises of God against all human odds. Then we see Isaac, Jacob and Joseph at the end of their lives give expression to their Hope in the Promises of God- even in the face of death.

And there is a very powerful Statement about this great Faith that we need to know and keep in mind as we travel through the struggles of this life:

The Promises of God are <u>NOT</u> Mainly for this World

Let's look again at verses 13-16:

 13 All these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth.

¹⁴ For those who say such things make it clear that they are seeking a country of their own.

¹⁵ And indeed if they had been thinking of that *country* from which they went out, they would have had opportunity to return.

¹⁶ But as it is, they desire a better *country*, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He has prepared a city for them.

Now verse 13 says: "All these died in faith." Now the writer has just mentioned Abraham and Sarah, and earlier - in verse 9 - he mentioned Isaac and Jacob. So, now he is saying that all of those whom he has already mentioned- all died in a Way that accords or testifies that all these people absolutely had great Faith and were saved. But how do we know that? Because verse 13 says that these people did *not* receive the Promises that they had believed for in this life. So, even though they *believed for* those Promises- they never actually touched them- during this life. And that means that all these people died "in Faith".

And the Lesson that the writer wants us to get here, right off the bat, is that the Promises of God are NOT mainly for this world. Now some are- absolutely- but not *mainly*. And that is what this writer is teaching us here in the first part of **Hebrews 11:13:** that the majority of all the Promises of God are NOT going to be seen or touched or experienced or apprehended down here.

Most of the Promises of God have *nothing* to do with *this* Life- but they are for us- in the *next* Life. And that is why the Life over there is *infinitely* more important and *infinitely* more valuable than this Life down here. And the writer works this out for us.

And in the rest of verse 13- the writer says that the Promises of God are like a great friend or lover coming to meet you. And you see her in the distance; and your heart leaps up; and you greet her in the best way you can from a distance; and then you say to others, "I am waiting for her to come. That is what I want. This time and this place are incomplete without her. I don't really belong here; I belong with her."

So read verse again 13 with me:

All these died in faith, without receiving the promises, but having seen them and having welcomed them from a distance, and having confessed that they were strangers and exiles on the earth.

So, here we can see that the writer wants us to realize that the Patriarchs (Abraham, Isaac and Jacob) were what the Holy Spirit calls "Strangers and Exiles". And so is everyone else, who lives by this Faith. You see, we're not going to be down here very long- 60, 70, 80 years- tops. But we are going to live *eternally* over there.

Now many of us who have been saved for several years remember a whole lot of Preaching and Teaching about believers being "Strangers and Exiles" when we were first saved. But lately- we don't hear about that much anymore. And that is a real tragedy.

You see, as God's people become more oriented to the "here and now"; and as we are constantly being fed a diet of "physical healing"; and "financial prosperity"; and "material blessings" down here; and as we become more and more acclimated about what is going on "down here" in our Politics; and in our Culture; and with our Health; and our Money; and our Relationships- we begin to lose sight of the fact that as believers- we have been called to be "Strangers and Exiles" on this earth. And that means that we're not supposed to put down roots here- because we are just "passing through". We're not supposed to get entangled with the affairs of this life- because all those things cloud our vision of being over there.

Now the first thing that happens every time I mention this is a cry "But Brother Blairlook what is going on in our Culture! We need to stop the moral decline of our Nation and we can't afford to just focus on 'over there.'"

And that is a legitimate Concern- but please hear me out before you turn me off. First of all, I totally agree that as believers we are called to cry out against the Evil in our world. And we are to labor to do what we can to stop Evil from triumphing. That is taught in the Bible. And I believe that. And I endeavor with all my heart to practice that on a daily basis. So, I hope all of you heard me say that.

But we cannot and we must not make that kind of Statement and then stop as though we just solved the Problem- because we didn't. Yes, as individual citizens of the United States- we are supposed to do those things. But we are cautioned over and over in the Holy Bible not to make these things the *primary* Focus of our lives. Because we are more than just citizens of the United States- we are also "Strangers and Exiles"; and we are citizens of *another* Country; and we are looking for a City whose Architect and Builder is God. And that means that this world is not our home- because we are just "passing through".

And so that is why I say that the *primary* focus of the Church of Jesus Christ is *not* to elect more Republicans into Office. It is *not* to reduce the size and scope of the Federal Government. The primary Focus of the Christian Church is *not* to promote Capitalism; or to affect lower taxes; or campaign for sympathetic Supreme Court Nominees, who will fight for our Cause. That has *never* been the *primary* Focus of the Church.

Our primary Focus is already mandated in the Bible. And that primary Focus is to preach and teach the Gospel to every Creature. It is to know and to study and understand and love and enjoy God- through the Word of God. It is to herald the glorious Gospel to as many people as we can- every day- using every means available to us.

The Church is supposed to defend the Truth; and to cry out against those who would add anything to it; or take anything away from it. We are called to preach and teach the Word of God-*rightly and fully*- in Love- so that men may hear the Good News; believe the Good News; repent; and trust in Jesus- so that all their Sins can be forgiven. And then the terrible and frightening Wrath of God can be averted from them- forever.

That is the primary Focus and Agenda of the Christian Church- not to try to "rescue the lost pagan Culture." And that means that most of our time; and most of our energy; and most of our money; and most of our prayer time; and the overwhelming majority of our effort and mentality should be invested in that Gospel effort. Because, ultimately, nothing else matters. But we're not finished.

Because after facilitating the Preaching of the Gospel- we are to teach and hold accountable- all those who are already saved- so that they will obey all the things that Jesus said. So, we are to systematically teach the Word of God as it pertains to Science and Art and Music and History and Money and Sex and Marriage and Success and our view of the Origins of Life; and how we view other nations; and cultures- so that God's people may have a "Biblical World View" rather than the "pagan world view" of the lost world. And if we get through with that- then we are to train young men to be godly Fathers and Husbands. And we are to train young women to be godly Mothers and Wives. We are to facilitate women to escape the godless Feminist lifestyle that permeates our Culture; and to help encourage them to find Peace and Safety and Fulfillment in the arms of a loving and godly man. And we are to facilitate men to escape the tyranny of loving Pleasure and to escape the deceitfulness of Riches and to encourage them to live their lives- sacrificially- to provide and protect and teach and lead their own families.

And if we get through with that- we are to raise our own children in the Fear and the Nurture of the Lord- teaching and learning the Bible at home in daily devotions rather than getting so busy trying to keep up with the Jones' that we are too tired or too busy working to ever influence the fruit of our own bodies.

And if we get through with that- we are to pray and struggle and labor to live our lives in such a way that we stimulate one another to Love and to good Deeds; and to live in such a way that we do not cause unbelievers to blaspheme the Word of God; and to live in such a way that will make unbelieving Jews jealous of what we have in God; and to live in such a way to cause the lost world to ask, *"Show me your God!"*

And only after we get through doing all of those things should we then branch out and try to affect the pagan Culture for Good. So, I am not saying don't do it at all. But I am saying that if you try to reach out to the Culture before you preach the Gospel; or before you teach your own children; or before you affect change in your own home- your Priorities are all messed up- and you are out of balance.

Because the only way that a lasting and permanent change is going to be made in our Culture- is if more people get saved. That is why they act the way they do- they're lost. And that is why they vote the way they vote; and why they promote what they promote- they're not saved. But we have to believe and know that neither Politics nor Government nor Law nor Medicine nor Technology nor Finance can make that kind of change- only Jesus; only Jesus; only Jesus.

So, we may get all upset about what is going on in our Country- and we should. But we need to remind ourselves that nobody gets saved at a political convention- because that is not what Politics is for. Politics and Government was given to us by God. And they are necessary to live effectively in this life. But they do not and they cannot affect Salvation or even a spiritual Transformation. They do not have that kind of Power.

Remember dear friends- the greatest growth and the greatest demonstration of the Power of the Gospel throughout history has been under pagan Governments- that persecuted believers unmercifully. So, if anything is true- living our whole lives in unprecedented Wealth and Prosperity and Peace and Safety- doesn't really do anything except make us fat, dumb, happy, and unproductive.

God does NOT need the United States to succeed in His Plan to save all those He has chosen from before the Foundation of the world. The Church did just fine before the United States was ever begun. Now I hope our nation *does* succeed. I love my country; and I weep over its sins- but the Church is not the same things as the United States. The Church is separate from and superior to the Government of the Unite States- always has been and always will be. And the Church does not need anything that the Government has to offer in order to do what God told us to do. So, I think we all need to realize that right here in **Hebrews 11**- we are called to be "Strangers and Exiles"- not political activists. And we are told here that we have a home in Glory Land that outshines the Sun. And so, our focus and our attention needs to be primarily on that.

And we know this is true because, you see, even though Jesus has lived and died and risen again- He has not brought all the Promises of God to us down here. There is *infinitely* more to come to us after we die; and we are in Heaven- than what will be done down here. And so, like these people here in **Hebrews 11**- there are many things that we have been promised by God that we are yet to see and yet to receive.

Now what the coming of Jesus *has* done is to put the foundation of those Promises on a visible, demonstrable footing. For example- **2Corinthians 1:20** says:

For as many as are the promises of God, in Him they are yes; therefore also through Him is our Amen to the glory of God through us.

So, here we see that in Jesus Christ- all of the Promises of God are "*Yes!*" But even though the Promises of God are sure and certain and "*Yes!*" and we can rely on them and put our trust in them- most all of those Promises are *not* manifested down here on this earth. They are *not* manifested during our lifetime. And they will never be manifested while we are in this physical body.

The great and breathtaking Promises of God are mainly going to come to pass in the future- "over there" and not "down here". And so therefore- in that sense- even though we are in Jesus- we are still "Strangers" and we are still "Exiles"- we are "Sojourners and Pilgrims"-waiting and believing and trusting to see and inhabit a City- Whose Architect and Builder is God. Because this world is not our home- we are just passing through- just like the fathers and like the other Old Testament saints that the writer is talking about here.

Now here is the sequence of "Stranger and Exile" texts. And you need to be able to turn in your Bibles quickly with me to get all of this. Ready? Here goes. Turn to **Genesis 23:4.** In this verse- Abraham pleads with the sons of Heth for a grave for his wife- and he says:

"I am a stranger and a sojourner among you; give me a burial site among you that I may bury my dead out of my sight."

Now look at **Genesis 47:9.** In this verse- we read that at the end of his life, look what Jacob said to Pharaoh in Egypt,

... "The years of my sojourning are one hundred and thirty; few and unpleasant have been the years of my life, nor have they attained the years that my fathers lived during the days of their sojourning."

Now turn to **Psalm 39**. In this Psalm- King David looked back over these testimonies and included himself in the lineage of sojourners on the earth. Now look at what David wrote in verse 12:

"Hear my prayer, O Lord, and give ear to my cry; Do not be silent at my tears; For I am a stranger with You, A sojourner like all my fathers.

And over in the New Testament- please turn to **Philippians 3:20**. Here Paul says:

For our citizenship is in heaven, from which also we eagerly wait for a Savior, the Lord Jesus Christ;

And then over in **1Peter 2:11**, the Apostle Peter says:

Beloved, I urge you as aliens and strangers to abstain from fleshly lusts which wage war against the soul.

So, the point here is that the life of Faith is the life of an "Exile"; a "Sojourner"; a "Refugee"; and a "Stranger". The Promises of God are our *real* Home- and we have seen these Promises from afar; and we have greeted them; and we have tasted them; and they have made us restless and uneasy and uncomfortable with what we have down here. They have begun to shape our whole way of seeing and thinking and feeling. And they have colored all our values and all of our goals and all of our desires. And because of that- we have been put out of sync with *this* world because our Treasure does not exist anymore on this earth- our Treasure is in Heaven.

Now look back at **Hebrews 11** at how the writer argues for this life of Faith. Read verse 14 again with me:

For those who say such things make it clear that they are seeking a country of their own.

Now the writer says here that those who speak this way- in other words- those who refer to themselves as being Strangers and Exiles and as Sojourners and Pilgrims- those who do not consider this land to be their home- but who are living their lives with a deep longing to be over there- that those who say such things are actually declaring very plainly that they are seeking another country that cannot be found anywhere on this earth and in this Life.

And there is the key word that I mentioned to you at the beginning of this part of our journey- the word, "seeking." You see, dear friends, a Sojourner or a Pilgrim or a Stranger or an Exile living by Faith in God's Promises is "seeking" another Country. Look what Jesus Himself said about this in **Matthew 6:33**:

But seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be added to you.

So, a genuine Stranger and an Exile- is *not* settling in down here. Why? Because this world is not his home. He knows that he has a home in Glory Land that outshines the sun! And as a result of being a Stranger- he is unwilling to try to fit in with this world; he is unwilling to be conformed to this age. He is "seeking" the One he has greeted from afar. Now let's read **Hebrews 11:15** again:

And indeed if they had been thinking of that *country* from which they went out, they would have had opportunity to return.

Now here in verse 15- the writer argues that if the country the Patriarchs were seeking was on the earth and obtainable by human means- they would have gone after it. But they didn't. Verse 9 says that they lived in tents and refused to go back to Ur of the Chaldees. So, the writer says here:

if they had been thinking of that *country* from which they went out, they would have had opportunity to return.

But they didn't, did they? Well, why not? Well, verse 16 gives us the answer, and it is in this verse that we meet that other great word, "desire." Verse 16 says:

But as it is, they desire a better *country*, that is, a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God; for He has prepared a city for them.

So, you see, beloved, the life of Faith "seeks" a "country of its own" (verse 14) and this life of Faith "desires" a better country - a heavenly one (verse 16). This is what the writer is focusing on in these verses. He is not focusing here on the *outward acts* of Faith, but the *inward desires* of Faith.

You see, this kind of Faith considers this world and what it has to offer- but then this Faith considers the Promises of God and what they offer - and then this Faith "desires" the one over the other. The Bible says that Faith "seeks" another country. It sees the Promise of God from afar; and it is stunned by what it sees. And so, this Faith greets those Promises; and begins to confess those Promises. And then Faith makes sure that we stay here on earth as a Stranger and Sojourner as long as we are in this life. Now why is that? So, we can be at home in the next life.

And that is what we need to hear today about Faith. Faith sees the Promises that God offers- and Faith "desires" them. Now please dwell on that for a moment, dear friends. There are many people in the modern Church who water down what saving Faith is- by making it nothing more than a mere decision of human will with no change of what one "desires for" or "seeks after." But the point of *this* text is that living and dying by this kind of Faith means having *new* desires and seeking *new* satisfactions that *cannot* be found anywhere on this earth.

Verse 14 says that these people were seeking a different kind of country than this world offered. Verse 16 says that they were desiring something better than what earthly existence, as we know it, could offer them. And the writer says that they all did this- they all desired this; and they all sought after this- as a natural and normal response to having true genuine Faith.

So, as we look at how these people desired and sought after *these* things and *not* the things of this world- we need to remind ourselves that this is how we are to live our lives too.

You see, beloved, the people that this writer portrays for us right here in this passage have been so utterly gripped by God that nothing short of Heaven can satisfy them.

So, what is true Faith? Here is true Faith. Faith is *seeing* the Promises of God from afar; and so, *valuing* those Promises; and putting such a high premium on those Promises- that you experience a massive, radical change of Values- to the point that you honestly and earnestly and joyfully *desire* the Promises of God far above anything that this world has to offer.

Now here is another way to look at this Faith that the writer gives to us in this passage. Faith is a glad greeting of the Promises of God from a distance; and a heart that seeks to know those Promises and that seeks to cherish those Promises and to be so satisfied by those Promises that a new kind of life emerges out of you- a life that is completely out of sync with this world – a life like the examples that we saw previously:

- ➤ A life that builds an ark in the middle of the desert
- A life that causes you to preach Righteousness for 120 years with little or no visible results
- A life that leaves the securities and the safeties of your established home and goes out into a country that you have never been in and builds a tent and lives in a tent when you are ninety years old- even though you already had a nice home back where you came from
- A life that allows you to be willing to lift a knife over your most treasured earthly possession and slay it.

But before we look at that demonstration of this awesome Faith, there is one more wonderful thing to see in verse 16. Notice the amazing "**therefore**" that is in the middle of this verse:

... Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God

Do you see that God is not ashamed! Now that is a very striking phrase. There is nothing quite like it that I know of anywhere else in the entire Bible - connecting shame with God and saying, God *might* be ashamed to do some things- but He is *not* ashamed to do this.

You know, I really want God to be able to say that of me. I want God to be able to say,

"I am not ashamed to be called Blair Bradley's God."

Now this is not just some sentimental desire that I have here, no, because if God were to say the opposite, if God said,

"I am ashamed to be called Blair Bradley's God,"

... then that would mean that God would not be my God, because God will never do anything that is shameful. So, you can see what is at stake here!

The writer tells us here that God is not ashamed to be called the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob. Recall **Exodus 3:6**: at the burning bush, and God says to Moses,

"I am the God of your father, the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob."

Now why is God not ashamed of this? The writer gives two reasons in verse 16: one in front and one behind. Look closely at verse 16. You see the word "therefore" or "wherefore" at the *beginning* of the statement: "therefore God is not ashamed" - which means that the *reason* for God's not being ashamed comes before. And then at the end of verse 16- you see the word "for" - " for He has prepared a city for them".

So, what are the two reasons God is not ashamed to be called the God of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob? The reason at the back is that He has prepared for them a city - a heavenly city of Promise. And the reason at the front is that they have seen that city from afar and they honestly and earnestly *desire* that city. Verse 16 says:

... they desire a better *country*, that is, a heavenly one ...

And because these people *desire* what they have seen from afar- Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God. God made the city for them; and now they desire what God has made. And that is why God is not ashamed to be called their God.

Now think about this for a moment. Do you want God to be ashamed or unashamed of being your God? If you want God to be unashamed at being your God- what must you then do? What must you seek after? What must you desire?

And the simple, stunning answer is this: Desire Him. Desire God. Desire the City that He has made for you. Desire the City of God over the city of Man. Desire Heaven over earth. Desire God over everything but God. This is what true genuine Faith does on the *inside*.

Faith desires God and the City that God has made for His people more than it desires anything that this world can give. So, Faith in God means *desiring* God; *craving* God; *hungering and thirsting* after God; It means *enjoying* God more than you enjoy anything or anyone else. It means that you honestly delight yourself- not in what God does; or what God gives you or what God blesses you with- but that you honestly delight yourself in Him as being the sole Prize and Delight of your life.

But think on this a little more. What is the opposite of being ashamed? If God were to state it *positively*- how would He say it?

"I am *not* ashamed to be called your God, rather I am _____ (what?) to be called your God - "I am *proud;* or I am *pleased* to be called your God."

Now why in the world would God be proud to be called the God of someone who desires Him and His City over the city of the world? Because when we honestly and earnestly desire God- we honor God. When you desire someone- you call attention to their worth. Desiring is no great achievement on our part. Nobody brags about getting hungry, especially when you are hungry for the best food in the world. There is no nobility in simply being hungry. So, nobody will brag about desiring God- especially when you consider that God is more desirable than anything else in the universe. So, we can see that desiring God doesn't call attention to *our* valueit calls attention to God's Value. We are the ones who have the need for Safety; and He is the One Who has the City of Heaven.

And what a marvelous City it is! No pollution, no graffiti, no trash, no peeling paint or rotting garages, no dead grass or broken bottles, no harsh street talk, no in-your-face confrontations, no domestic strife or violence, no dangers in the night, no arson or lying or stealing or killing, no vandalism and no ugliness. The City of God will be perfect because God will be in it. He will walk in it and talk in it and will manifest Himself fully in every part of it. All that is good and beautiful and holy and peaceful and true and happy will be in that City because God will be there. Perfect justice will be there and recompense a thousandfold for every pain suffered in obedience to Christ. And it will never deteriorate. In fact, it will shine brighter and brighter as eternity stretches out into unending ages of increasing Joy!

So, when you reach a place where you honestly and earnestly desire this City above everything else on the earth- that is when you honor God- Who, according to verse 10, is the Builder and Maker of that City.

You see, it is only when God is honored that God is pleased and not ashamed to be called your God. So here is the \$64,000 answer- The great battle for Faith does not begin at the level of our *behavior*- true genuine Biblical Faith *begins* at the level of our *desire*. So, the real question-the important question for us today is this: What do you desire? What do you crave after? What are you hungry for?

So, we can see that the kind of Faith that would allow a people to lose everything they owned in this life with joy begins- not by what we do- but by Who or what we desire. But true Faith doesn't stop there. It begins in us to change what we love and what we desire and then it moves outward from our inward desires- and outward to our behavior and our behavior changes to reflect the great work of Faith that God has done to us and in us on the inside.

So, we must take a brief look at the *behavior* of Faith from Hebrews 11:17-19:

¹⁷ By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac, and he who had received the promises was offering up his only begotten *son*;

¹⁸ *it was he* to whom it was said, "*IN ISAAC YOUR DESCENDANTS SHALL BE CALLED.*"

¹⁹ He considered that God is able to raise *people* even from the dead, from which he also received him back as a type.

So, Faith not only *desires* what God promises more than anything, but it also *does* things that can only be explained by the *Assurance* that we have that God will do exactly what He has promised to do in spite of humanly impossible obstacles. So, Faith *desires* the God of the Promises. And then Faith *trusts* the God of the Promises to deliver. And so, Faith acts in ways that are out of sync with a world that does not *desire* God and does not *trust* God.

So, consider what Abraham did – look what he did! Verse 17:

" By faith Abraham, when he was tested, offered up Isaac" -

... that is, Abraham laid Isaac on the altar and was ready to end his life. No why is this astonishing? Because this goes way beyond a father loving a son. And it also goes way beyond that the Ten Commandments, which commands us not to murder. Here's the great impact of this action by Abraham.

God had given Abraham a Promise that Abraham would have many descendants and this very son – God called him Abraham's *only* son- the son of his old age - would be the one through whom the descendants would come. Look at verse 18:

..."IN ISAAC YOUR DESCENDANTS SHALL BE CALLED."

So, if this boy dies- *everything* in our human experience says, the Promise of God will also fail right at that point.

So, here's the test: will Abraham reason his way out of Obedience or will Abraham trust that God will make that which is humanly impossible to come to pass? We find the answer in verse 19:

He considered that God is able to raise *people* even from the dead, from which he also received him back as a type.

Abraham believed God. Abraham accounted that even if he killed his own son that somehow God was able to raise him up from the dead so that the Promise that God had given to Abraham might come to pass- regardless of what it looked like right now. So, this outward "Act of Faith" is based upon the inward Assurance that what God has promised- He is able also to perform

Now apply this to your life. For many of you- Obedience feels like the end of a dream. You feel that if you do what the Word of God or the Spirit of God is calling you to do- it will make you miserable or cost you everything- and that there is simply no way that God could turn all the things going on in your life for Good.

Perhaps the Command or the Call of God you hear just now is to stay married; or to be satisfied that you are single. It may be to stay in that job or leave that job. Perhaps it is to get baptized; or to speak up at your workplace about Jesus; or to refuse to compromise your standards of honesty; or to confront a person who is in sin; or to venture into a new vocation; or to leave everything you own and become a missionary. Perhaps you think that unless you date or marry this lost person- that there will never be another chance to get married. So, as you see things in your limited mind, the prospect of obeying God about this particular issue is not a Joy at all- it is all work; and it is all terrible - it's like the loss of Isaac. You have considered every human angle; you've run the numbers over in your mind and it is simply impossible that it could ever turn out well.

Well, now you know what it was like for Abraham. Now you know why this verse is in the Bible. This story is in the Bible for you. It is in this message today for you. It is at the end of the message so that you will not easily be able to walk away from it.

Please hear me, beloved. I beg you to allow yourself to be confronted with this question today: "Do you desire God and His Way and His Promises more than anything; and do you believe that He can and that He will honor your Faith and Obedience by being unashamed to call Himself your God, and to use all His Wisdom and Power and Love to turn your path of Obedience into the path of Life and Joy?"

This is the crisis you face today: So, do you *desire* God? Do you desire His City? Do you *value* God? Will you *trust* Him? The Word of God to you today is this: "*God is Worthy. And God is Able. And they who put their Trust in God will never be ashamed.*"

Looking at the Reward Frees us to Love

Hebrews 11:23-28

23 By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the king's edict.

24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter,

25 choosing rather to endure ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin,

26 considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt; for he was looking to the reward.

27 By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

28 By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of the blood, so that he who destroyed the firstborn would not touch them.

Faith Makes the Difference When we Walk Through Crisis

Now as we look at four more instances of what this radical, inconvenient, being willing to lose everything with joy kind of Faith produces- please keep in mind the definition of Faith from **Hebrews 11:1:**

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen.

So, each of the four Acts in this Passage (**Hebrews 11:23-28**) is produced by this Faith, that is, by the Assurance of something that is hoped for-namely, God's Promise to be all that the believer needs. So, watch for that. Watch for the way that Hope in God produces a new kind of Behavior (which I think we should call, "Love").

And notice too that these four Acts of Faith cover a period of eighty years from Moses' birth to the time he led the people out of Egypt. And finally notice, as we read, that in these four moments of Moses' life- the Stress is tremendous. Each of them is a "life and death" Situation that would cause you to be knotted up inside and scarcely able to sleep at night- like some of you may be experiencing right now because of various Threats looming in your life. So, watch now what Faith produces.

Hebrews 11:23&24, 27&28

23 By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the king's edict. 24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter,

27 By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

28 By faith he kept the Passover and the sprinkling of the blood, so that he who destroyed the firstborn would not touch them.

Now these are four Crisis Points in Moses' life. And the point of these verses is that Faith - the Assurance of things hoped for - makes all the difference at those Points in our lives. Let's look at them and ask God to teach us how to walk through our crises by Faith.

Crisis #1 in Moses' Life - Were his Parents Afraid?

The first has to do with the Faith of Moses' parents when he was born. You recall that the King of Egypt was fearful of the growing number of Jewish males. So, he ordered them to be killed at birth- **Exodus 1:22** says:

Then Pharaoh commanded all his people, saying, "Every son who is born you are to cast into the Nile, and every daughter you are to keep alive."

Notice that there are two Threats in that Edict from the king: one is *explicit*, that all Jewish baby boys are to be killed; the other is *implicit*, that if you disobey this Command and keep a Jewish baby boy alive, you will be disobedient to the King's Law and risk your own life. In other words, parents had two choices:

- 1. They could kill their sons and save themselves
- 2. They could try to save their sons and risk their own lives

... but there was no middle way.

Now that's important to see, because **Hebrews 11:23** doesn't make sense if you don't see that. It says,

By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the king's edict.

Now someone might respond to that and say, "Of course, they were afraid of the King's Edict; otherwise they would not have been hiding the baby. They would have been showing him off to the neighbors if they weren't afraid of the King's Command that baby boys be killed."

So just what does verse 23 *mean*, that they hid their baby son "because . . . they were not afraid of the king's edict" You would expect the Bible to say something like:

"They hid their son because they were afraid,"

... not,

"they hid their son because they were not afraid."

And surely that's right: if they had *not* been afraid for their son's life, they would have carried him around in public.

The Answer is that there are two Threats in the king's Edict- not just one. One Threat was against their babies; and one was against the parents who don't kill their babies. The King said, "If you kill your baby you save your life. But if you don't kill your baby- you will risk losing your own life."

So, at some point- Moses' parents decided that they were *not* going to drown Moses in the Nile River but hide him. And at that point- they are risking their own lives. In other words, they looked the fear of Death (and perhaps brutal Torture) in the face; they understand it perfectly; they fully realize the risk and then they say:

"We will not give in to Fear. We will not kill our son out of Fear for our own lives. The Fear of our own Death will not control us."

And the point of this verse is this:

That Act of Courage toward their son and against the King, and that Act of Love toward their son- comes from the Faith that we have been talking about. **Hebrews 11:23** says:

By faith Moses, when he was born, was hidden for three months by his parents, because they saw he was a beautiful child; and they were not afraid of the king's edict.

Moses' parent's Faith in God that God was well able to do *something* to rescue them and the child and the Fact that this Faith was more than human Courage or human Belief but was, in reality- Assurance and Conviction- moved them to *disobey* the King's Commandment and save their son.

But how does Faith produce that kind of Courage and Love? The definition from **Hebrews 11:1a** gives the answer.

"Faith is the assurance of things hoped for."

Real, genuine Faith *frees* us for this kind of radical Courage and risk-taking Love because it is the substantive Assurance that what God promises to those who die in the Path of Love is *better* than what the world promises those who shun Risk and save themselves.

More simply, Faith in God's Promises *frees* us from the Fear of Death and makes us brave in the Risks of godly Love.

Human Ingenuity or Faith in God?

There's a minor Point here as well as this main one. It's important for all of us who want our lives to be on the cutting edge where there are Risks and Dangers and great Crises and great Needs. It's a point of Realism and Balance. Notice, Moses' parents risked their lives by *not* killing their baby. But also take Notice: They *did* hide the baby! Now in some people's minds - immature minds with little real-life Experience and out of touch with the complexities of the soul - might say, "If Moses' parents really had Faith, they would have entrusted the child's Care to God and just walked around the community with their new baby. That would have been real Faith."

Now how would you respond to somebody like that? People who say, "They don't trust God; they're using human ingenuity to protect their baby instead of entrusting him to God"? Perhaps the best way to respond is simply to tell them to read their Bibles and read them carefully.

Because the Bible says, in **Hebrews 11:23**, that Moses' parents *did* indeed have Faith. But it also says that they hid their baby. That's what the Bible says. So, what God defines as being Faith in His Word- that is what *real* Faith is- NOT some arbitrary Definition that we might make up ourselves. Not killing the baby put their lives at risk and was a great act of both Faith and Love. The Bible says it was. And hiding their baby was an act of human, but God-given, Wisdom (and no less from Faith). And so, to do otherwise would probably have been sinful Presumption- like the idea of Jesus jumping off the roof of the Temple to see if God would catch Him in Luke 4:9-12.

So, how should we apply this Truth to ourselves in the 21st Century? One way would be to say that following God's Call to work with AIDS patients is an Act of risk-taking Faith; while wearing rubber gloves during that Treatments is an Act of faithful Wisdom. Or, following God's Call to live in a rough neighborhood is an Act of risk-taking Faith; while and buying deadbolts is an Act of faithful Wisdom. Or, following God's Call to Guinea or Tanzania or Khazakstan or

Uzbekistan with your children is an act of risk-taking Faith; while giving your children Vaccinations and malaria Treatments is probably an Act of faithful Wisdom.

In other words, living by Faith is often perplexing - which is why, I think, Paul prayed incessantly in **Colossians 1:9-11** that his converts would have "spiritual wisdom . . . and bear fruit in every good work"

Which risky, inconvenient, dangerous, inopportune "good Works" we should do will seldom be written in the sky or spoken in a dream. (That is why Paul prays for spiritual Wisdom.) No, these selfless Acts of Love and Kindness will be wrestled into Reality by agonizing Prayer and biblical Saturation and self-Mortification and - above all - Faith, the Assurance of things hoped for.

Radical Confidence in God's Promise to take care of us is the main Key to unlock the Power and Path of this risk-taking Love.

Crisis #3 in Moses' Life - Was Moses Afraid?

Now jump with me over the second act of Faith in **Hebrews 11:24-26** to the third act of faith listed for us in verse 27- so let's read that verse together:

By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

Now I make this move because what we see here in verse 27, forty years later, is a Crisis that Moses faced- which is a lot like the one his parents faced at his birth. And we will understand it better if we see it in connection with what we saw in verse 23.

According to **Exodus 2:11&12**, Moses began to identify himself with his Jewish kinsmen and to become indignant at their enslavement. One day, he found an Egyptian beating a Jew and Moses intervened and killed the Egyptian. Now he thought this Act had been done secretly, but the next day he discovered the word has gotten around. **Exodus 2:14** says,

... Then Moses was afraid and said, "Surely the matter has become known."

Then the very next verse says,

When Pharaoh heard of this matter, he tried to kill Moses. But Moses fled from the presence of Pharaoh and settled in the land of Midian ...

Now here is a Crisis in Moses' Life just like the one we saw in verse 23. Is Moses afraid when he leaves Egypt or isn't he? Were his parents afraid when they hid their baby or weren't they? **Hebrews 11:23** says that his parents hid their baby because **"they were** *not* **afraid of the king's edict."** And here in verse 27 it says,

By faith he [Moses] left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

Yet we saw that Moses' parents were at least afraid enough to hide their baby. And in **Exodus 2:15** we read that Moses was afraid enough that when he heard that his violence was known...

... Moses fled from the presence of Pharaoh and settled in the land of Midian ...

... so, I hope you can see the similarity between these two Crises.

So, did Moses leave Egypt out of fear or didn't he? It's like asking: "*Did his parents hide Moses from Pharaoh out of fear or didn't they*?" And the Answer for his parents is that they *did* fear for the child's Life- but they did NOT act out of fear for *themselves*. They risked their own lives, and they did it by substantive Assurance in God's Promises.

Now it is somewhat different here with Moses- but not completely different. Moses probably did save his own life by leaving Egypt. But was fearful self-Preservation his motive in leaving? When verse 27 says, **"By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king"** did the writer of **Hebrews** forget about **Exodus 2:14** and the fear Moses felt, or is he pointing us to something very crucial and very deep in Moses' heart so that we won't misconstrue **Exodus 2:14**?

The key to understanding this is found in the word **"endured"** in verse 27. So, let's read verse 27 again:

By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king; for he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

In other words, it wasn't basically Fear that caused Moses to leave Egypt, it was "Endurance." Endurance? Endurance in what?

The word, "Endurance" implies that you are on a chosen Path of great Difficulty that you are tempted to forsake because things get very difficult- but you don't yield to the Temptation to quit- and you hang in there. You "endure." And the result of your enduring is that you see God's Promise come to pass.

So, what is the writer referring to when he says in verse 27 that Moses "left Egypt ... for he endured ..."? What Path had Moses chosen that required Endurance to stay on; and even led him out of Egypt for 40 years before he came back to rescue his people? The answer is Crisis #2.

Crisis #2 in Moses' Life - He Endured

Now we can go back and pick up the second Act of Faith that we passed over. So, let's read **Hebrews 11: 24-26** together:

24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter,

25 choosing rather to endure ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin,

26 considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt; for he was looking to the reward.

Now these verses describe a radically dangerous and costly Path that Moses had chosen before he felt threatened by the Pharaoh. Now mark what I just said. I said that these verses

describe a radically dangerous Path that Moses had chosen BEFORE he felt threatened by Pharaoh. What was this Path? Look again at verses 24-26:

24 By faith Moses, when he had grown up, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter,

25 choosing rather [there's the chosen Path] to endure ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin,

26 considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt; for he was looking to the reward.

Now here the writer of **Hebrews** expresses the dangerous and painful Path that Moses had chosen in two ways:

- 1. (Verse 25) It is, "choosing rather to endure ill- treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of Sin."
- 2. (Verse 26) It is, "considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt..."

Now don't miss this! This Choice that Moses made- was made BEFORE the Threat of Pharaoh. So, the bridges had already been burned between Moses and Egypt before Pharaoh ever threatened him. The Choice had already happened in Moses' heart- not physically- not yet- but *spiritually* and *morally* Moses was completely separated from Egypt; and was fully yielding to his Divine Calling already in his heart. Do you see that?

So, now the only Question was- NOT would he choose rightly- because he had already done that- but the only Question left for Moses was, "*Would he endure?*" Would Moses persevere in this chosen Path of Suffering for the people of God and the Glory of the Messiah; or would he cave in - like so many cave in today to their Egypt - the passing Pleasures of this world?

So, a very important Question that we need to ask and answer is this:

Was Moses' flight from Egypt a capitulation to a self-Serving, fearful, Pursuit of Ease and Comfort and Safety away from the Threats of Pharaoh?

And verse 27 gives us the answer. Verse 27 says, "*No*." The first part of **Hebrews 11:27** says:

By faith he left Egypt, not fearing the wrath of the king ...

The Bible says here that Fear was NOT Moses' basic mindset. Well then what *was* the mindset of Moses as he fled from Egypt? Look at the very next part of verse 27:

For he endured ...

Endured in what? Moses endured in the very same deep Motive that caused him to choose ill-Treatment with the people of God and Reproach for the Sake of Christ, namely,

... he endured, as seeing Him who is unseen.

In other words, Moses endured, "by Faith." He endured by looking to God's Promise- not Pharaoh's Threat.

And it was this same Faith that was the very same Motive that drove his radical Choices in verses 24-26. And you can see the Power and the Results of this radical kind of Faith in what Moses did in verses 25 & 26:

25 choosing rather to endure ill-treatment with the people of God than to enjoy the passing pleasures of sin,

26 considering the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt; for he was looking to the reward.

The Bible says here that Moses chose ill-Treatment with God's people; and he chose the Reproach of Jesus Christ, **"for** [because] **he was looking to the reward."**

Moses believed God. Moses believed God when things were Good; and Moses believed God when Pharaoh threatened his Life. Moses was looking to the Reward. Moses didn't see the Promises of God as being a "pie in the sky" fantasy- but Moses was looking- NOT merely for the Promises themselves- but notice that Moses was looking TO the Reward. In other words, Moses trusted not only that God was NOT a liar; and not only that God's Promises were true- but Moses trusted in the fact that he personally was going to receive exactly what God had promised himeven though the King of Egypt was trying to kill him at that moment.

So, it was Moses' Trust in the Reality of the Promises of God that gave him both the Desire and the Power to endure. So, the phrase, **"he was looking to the reward."** in verse 26 correlates with the phrase, **"seeing him who is unseen"** in verse 27.

Moses had, "by Faith", burned the bridges in his mind (by "the Assurance of things hoped for"), and then, "by Faith", he burned them in his flight (by "the Conviction of things unseen").

Yes, absolutely, Moses experienced Fear when the word spread that he had killed an Egyptian while saving a Jew - just as his parents had experienced that same Fear when they saved their baby boy and risked their own lives.

But what the writer of **Hebrews** is telling us in this Passage is that hiding their baby was *not* an act of fearful, self-Serving Unbelief in Moses' parents. And Moses' leaving Egypt was not an act of fearful, self-Serving Unbelief either.

On the contrary- their Actions were actually an "enduring"- in *spite* of Fear- in the full Obedience of Faith. So, Moses wasn't driven merely or even mainly by Fear. No, Moses looked to the unseen God to work out some Purpose for his people, and forty years later- he would discover what that Purpose was- and he would be back.

Burning our Bridges by Faith

The Bridges were burned between Moses and Egypt well before he was threatened by Pharaoh. They were burned in his heart; and they were burned, "by Faith". And that's what Faith does all through this Chapter. Faith is a "hunger for God" that triumphs over our "hunger for the pleasures of this world". And so, Faith unleashes radically God-centered, risk-taking, peopleloving Behavior.
