Why Study Hebrews?

Historical figures thoughts on Hebrews:

pen of R. C. Sproul:

I have often said that if I were thrown in prison and in solitary confinement, and was allowed to have only one book, the book I would want to have would be the Bible. But if my options were even further restricted, and I was permitted to have only one book of the Bible, the book that I would choose would be the book of Hebrews.

Now that usually surprises people who know me because they assume the book I would want to have would be Romans. But the reason Hebrews is the book I would choose is because it so richly and comprehensively integrates all of the teaching of the Old Testament with the material that is found in the New Testament, serving as the best connecting link between the two. It is also one of the finest books of the New Testament – indeed, of the entire Bible – in terms of its literary quality. The book of Hebrews also gives us a very high Christology since the central theme is the supremacy of Christ. In Hebrews, Christ is compared to various people and things and shown to be superior to them all.

Famous quoted verses:

Hebrews 4:12

For the word of God is living and active and sharper than any two-edged sword, and piercing as far as the division of soul and spirit, of both joints and marrow, and able to judge the thoughts and intentions of the heart.

Hebrews 9:27

And inasmuch as it is appointed for men to die once and after this comes judgment

Hebrews 12:6

FOR THOSE WHOM THE LORD LOVES HE DISCIPLINES, AND HE SCOURGES EVERY SON WHOM HE RECEIVES."

And without faith it is impossible to please Him, for he who comes to God must believe that He is and that He is a rewarder of those who seek Him

Author's In depth Knowledge of the OT

Example = Melchizedek

- Mentioned 2 times in OT. Gen 14:8 and Psalms 110:4a total of 4 verses.
- No google search engine...no concordance...no commentary.
- Yet Author creates a whole chapter on the priesthood of Jesus in the order of Melchizedek.

DO WE KNOW OUR OLD TESTAMENT THIS WAY?

Depth of theology


- Topics addressed
 - The priesthood of Jesus in the order of Melchizedek is not addressed anywhere else in the NT.
 - Major topics of Christology...Deity of Christ, Humanity of Christ, Efficacy of His death, His temptations, the atonement by His death, Mediator of the New Covenant ...etc.
 - Other topics such as the Sabbath Rest, Angels, Prophecy, Faith, Church community engagement.
 - The list could go on.

Relevance to us today

- Have you been a Christian for some time but now find you are lacking interest in doctrinal topics?
- Have you been coming to church for some time but never really made a personal and public confession of faith in Jesus Christ?
- Has an addiction to a particular sin hardened your heart almost to a point of spiritual numbness and ambivalence?
- Do you feel apathy gaining a grip on your soul?
- o Are you growing in your faith and now hunger for deeper truths?
- Either way, this is the journey for you. It promises to test your theology...your faith...your deepest
 desires...what you hope for...where you are spending your time...how you view authority...and what
 awaits us after death!

CONTEXT: For Hebrews

- o Genre: Sermon / Letter or Epistle
 - Literary work of art
- Author & Recipient
 - Author Unknown
 - Controversial over the years. Origen, the successor to Clement, who uttered his now-famous agnostic confession: "Whoever wrote the epistle, God only knows for sure."
 - Paul, Stephen, Luke, Clement, Barnabas, Apollos, Paul /Luke combo, and many others.
 - It was accepted as canon by the early church.
 - Comment on implied Author ...even though we don't know their name. Jewish based on knowledge of Judaism...yet very well educated in Greek Rhetorical styles.
 - Recipients
 - A local believing church. Believed to be primarily Jewish due to its content and the assumption about their understanding of the intensely Jewish rituals.
 - Somewhere in Palestine and Rome are the most popular suggestions. But others have been made: Alexandria, Colossae, Ephesus, somewhere in Asia Minor, Cyrene, Antioch, Syria in general, Corinth, and Cyprus.
- General time of writing.
 - Shortly before 70AD as there was no notice of the fall of the temple...and it would surely have been noted if that were in recent history.



Implied Authors purpose for writing

- Also clearly stated in Ch 13:22... as a word of exhortation...Literally in Greek "I Have exhorted you".
 - Acts 13:15
- What kind of exhortations do we see?
 - 45 imperatives, prohibitions and pure exhortations
 - Imperatives: Strengthen...make every effort to...live a new and living way...etc.
 - Prohibitions: Do not...
 - Pure exhortations...in Greek...Hortatory Subjunctives: Let us...
- Exhortations appear to center around 5 basic warning passages
- 1. 2:1-4 Pay careful attention.... so that we do not drift away
- 2. 3:1-4:16 Do not harden....no unbelieving heart among you... enter the Sabbath rest.
- 3. 5:11 6:12 Leave elementary teaching...Go on to maturity...
- 4. 10:19 39 Let us draw near...hold...consider...remember...don't throw away confidence...
- 5. 12:1-29 Let us run...don't grow weary or lose heart when disciplined...make level paths...etc.
- The purpose for his writing is clearly to get everyone from a state of unbelief to a state of spiritual maturity...i.e. to heaven. "We call this discipleship!"

Themes

- Major Themes
 - Don't turn away and Jesus is greater than
- Minor Themes
 - New Covenant compared to Old Covenant...promises in general.
 - The Word of God
 - > Faith...the famed Hall of Faith in Heb 11
 - Death
 - Angels
 - Community life in the local church body
 - Suffering...of Christ and the church
 - Dangers of Sin
 - > Endurance to the end

General Flow for the book

- Trying to encourage or exhort them to not fall away from the NT Gospel
 - Numerous exhortations spread throughout letter
- Walks them through the major elements of Old Testament showing at each point how Jesus and the New Covenant is greater than all of them.
- Similar approach to...
 - Jesus with 2 disciples on road to Emmaus LUKE 24:13-35
 - Peter in Acts 2
 - Stephen in Acts 7
 - ➤ Paul in Acts 13:15... this also ties into the Greek word used for exhorting in Hebrews.

THEOLOGICAL PREPARATION

- OT Knowledge
 - Ps. 2; 8; 95; 110; Jer. 31; Ps. 40; Hab. 2
- Systematic Theological Threads Woven Into Text
 - Promise Fulfillment
 - Already but not Yet
 - Escalatory Typology



Cautions

- Experienced theologians can be needed to see the flowers and avoid ruts Example: Hebrews 1:1...alliteration in Greek with 5 different words starting with "p" or π in Greek.
- πολυμερως και πολυτροπως παλαι ο θεος λαλησας τοις πατρασιν εν τοις προφηταις επ εσχατωντων ημερων τουτων ελαλησεν ημιν εν υιω
 - At different times ...in different ways...long ago...fathers...and prophets
- Some have erroneously jumped to unbiblical conclusions on whether you can lose your salvation.
 - Careful interpretation of its own theology can prove this author doesn't believe you can lose your salvation
 - Let clear scripture interpret blurry scripture.
 - Let the Bible interpret the Bible...but also let book of Hebrews shed light on Hebrews.
- You may need help from commentaries or GCBC pastors.

PERSONAL PREPARATIONS FOR YOUR STUDY OF HEBREWS

- 1. Personal Faith Decision to Follow Jesus Christ is Mandatory.
 - Without it, Hebrews will not draw you nor be compelling to you.
- 2. Steps prior to verse by verse study.
 - a. Confess any sin which is unrepentant.
 - b. Pray that the Holy Spirit would lead you to maturity.
 - c. Read Hebrews all the way through in one sitting as many times as you are able...3..4..10 times.
 - d. If you run into a story you don't know in the Old Testament...Stop and Read the story.
 - e. OPTIONAL Take a friend with you.
- 3. Begin a section / verse by verse study.
- 4. Upon completion, start again. You will see more the 2nd time through.
