# True & False Sanctification (JL-106)

John 17:17 Sunday, November 12, 2006

John 17.

This morning we will **continue** our <u>examination</u> of the **doctrine of <u>sanctification</u>**.

<u>Last week considering</u> the **definition** and **Biblical call** for **holiness** in the life of the Christian.

This week we will turn to look at the **means** of **sanctification** – that is **how** is it that one is **sanctified** – drawing from our text – John 17:17, where Christ prays:

Sanctify them in the truth, Thy Word is truth

- **brief review** from last week
- the <u>only true</u> means of sanctification –

  Sanctify them in the truth, Thy Word is truth
- Then, keeping with the theme of today's sermon being **Sanctification in Truth**,

we will *then go on to* look at some of the **false ideologies** that the <u>church has adopted</u> as **means** of **sanctification**, the **errant views of sanctification**.

- Lastly, we will **conclude** with some **final exhortations** to **pursue holiness without which no man will see God**.

PRAY

<u>Having last week defined</u> *Biblical sanctification* – what John Owen has called, and I referred to last week as "Gospel holiness"

That is the **practical outworking** of **regeneration** in the *faith* and *life* of the Christian –

also called **practical holiness** or **sanctification**.

To summarize from last week,

We began by stating that sanctification is God's will ...

The **command** of Hebrews 12:14 is

<u>Follow</u> peace with all men, and <u>holiness</u>, without which no man shall see the Lord:

1 Thess 4 says it clearly (v. 3)

For this is the will of God, your sanctification

This is **no option** for the **Christian**.

Holiness is **required** of God!

We said that **sanctification** is at the same time three things: a **state**, an **action** and a **process**.

1. it is a *state* in that we are

Sanctified ...

This Is our **true standing** before God because of the person and work of Jesus Christ

It is by <u>virtue of our UNION</u> with Christ by faith that His righteousness in <u>justification</u> and His holiness in <u>sanctification</u> are <u>both</u> imputed to us

1 Cor 6:11

And such <u>were</u> some of you: but ye <u>are</u> washed, but ye <u>are</u> sanctified, but ye <u>are</u> justified in the name of the Lord Jesus, and by the Spirit of our God.

You are **NOT** BEING **sanctified** or BEING **washed**You **ARE sanctified**, you **ARE washed**!

#### You are **DECLARED** <u>righteous</u> and made <u>positionally</u> holy (STATE)

## 2. Act (Definitive sanctification)

#### **Sanctification** is

a once for all **action** – a **definite** one time **act** of divine grace, by which we are *constituted* as holy.

Hebr 10:10

By this will we <u>have been sanctified</u> through the offering of the body of Jesus Christ <u>once for all.</u>

Our **sanctification** was **attained** for us in the **work of Christ** on the cross

In the death of Christ, sin was conquered ... not *in theory* but in a definitive act!

**Sanctification** is <u>no mystical matter</u> ...

Some teach that **sanctification** is <u>all *positional*</u>

as if one can be **positionally sanctified**without a *corresponding* **holiness of life** ...

But Scripturally, we find

Every time that our <u>position</u> or <u>standing</u> in Christ, Is emphasized, it has <u>practical</u> and <u>real</u> implications <u>in the life</u>.

Sin reigned in the past, NOW grace reigns in the present (Rom 6)

You are under the **enabling** grace of God.

#### John 13.

<u>final Passover</u> that Jesus spent with His disciples, we said how the *theme* of <u>Jesus' entire ministry</u> has **changed** – having <u>left the multitude</u>, He turned now to **minister to His own**. Jesus first *took up a basin and towel* to **wash His disiples' feet**. First Peter rejected –

Jesus said in verse 8,

"If I don't wash you, you have no part with me."

Peter conceded in vs. 9,

"Lord, not my feet only, but my hands and my head."

To which Jesus responds (Jhn 13:10)

"He who has bathed needs only to wash his feet, but is completely clean ..."

<u>He was alluding to the fact</u> that one who is *in Christ* need only be **bathed** – or **baptized into Christ** ... *ONCE* –

we are <u>clean</u> – *because* of the Holy Spirit's ONE TIME regenerative work *in the heart*.

However, we do need to have our **feet washed**. Which is a picture of the **daily progressive sanctification** of the believer

#### 3. <u>Process (progressive sanctification)</u>

Progressive sanctification is

the <u>continuance</u>, <u>maintenance</u>, and <u>progression</u> of **definitive sanctification** 

It is the outworking of holiness, without which no one shall see the Lord.

IT is our **experience** of

growing in the grace and knowledge of the Lord Jesus Christ and therefore progressively being conformed into the image of God

There is a **progressive manifestation** of *God's converting grace* in the life of **every** true Christian

For by one offering He has <u>perfected</u> for all time those who are <u>being sanctified</u>.

By the *offering of the cross*, in **that <u>definitive act</u>**,

He has **perfected** or **finished** a resultant process ...

And that process is your **sanctification**.

This is what the Scripture means when it speaks of "working out our salvation with fear and trembling."

This is also referred to as "practical Christian living"

#### **Progressive sanctification** is

living such a life that is **demanded** by the **Scripture** and by the **moral character of God**.

Such **sanctification** is largely <u>experimental</u> – that is it occurs in the realm of our **experience**.

And because of this, it is tainted by cultural background and personal preference,

And so is liable to great error.

It is because of <u>not understanding **positional**</u>, <u>**definitive**</u> and <u>**progressive sanctification**</u>,

that *much of the church* has **strayed** into <u>false teaching</u> in this matter of **sanctification**. which we will get into shortly.

But let us first consider where it is that we will find the **TRUE** *means* of **sanctification** ...

Sanctify them, Jesus prayed, in the truth, Thy Word is truth.

Salvation and sanctification are in truth ...

There is **ONE WAY** the child of God is **saved** and **sanctified**.

**Salvation** comes *by* the Word of God.

The law of the LORD is perfect, converting the soul: (Psa 19:7)

Timothy, from a child you have known the holy scriptures, which are able to make thee wise unto salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus. (2 Tim 3:15)

receive with meekness the engrafted word, which is <u>able to</u> save your souls. (Ja 1:21)

<u>faith</u> cometh by hearing, and hearing by the <u>word of God</u>. (Rm 10:17)

We are <u>born again</u>, not of corruptible seed, but of incorruptible, <u>by</u> the <u>word of God</u>, which lives and abides for ever.
(1 Pet 1:23)

To be **saved** is synonymous with **coming to a <u>knowledge of the truth</u>**, receiving a love of <u>the truth</u>.

The Holy Spirit does not reveal Truth to us in a <u>magical</u> or <u>mystical</u> way.

Truth comes from the Word of God,

as the Spirit of God illuminates or explains it to us.

As we *hear the Word of God*, <u>we believe</u> (Rom 10:17), our **belief** then is based upon **truth**.

It is some *generic faith* that **saves**, but **specifically faith** *in* **Christ**.

2 Thess 2:13-14 states that we are *chosen for salvation* through sanctification by the Spirit and <u>faith in the truth</u>.

And then, having been

born again by the imperishable seed of the Word of God (1 Pet 1:23),

Peter goes on to admonish us NOW

as newborn babes [to] long for the pure milk of the Word, that by it you may grow in respect to salvation (1 Pet 2:2).

<u>Jesus tells us that **discipleship**</u> is characterized by <u>continuing</u> or <u>remaining</u> in <u>the Word</u> (John 8:31-32).

The only thing that will *ever* set a sinner free from the <u>bondage of his sin</u> is *the Truth*.

<u>The Truth</u> is what <u>sets us free</u> unto <u>salvation</u> and in <u>sanctification</u>.

We are therefore *progressively* <u>sanctified</u> by the Holy Spirit through the **ongoing discipline** of **Scripture intake**.

It is a *growing <u>knowledge of the Truth</u>* that <u>leads to</u> *practical holiness* and *godliness*.

2 Tim 3:16-17 teaches us that **the Word of God** is the **God-ordained means** for **doctrine**, **reproof**, **correction**, and **training**;

that we might be throughly furnished (Fully equipped) for every good work.

Until we let the **Word of God**, <u>do</u> what it says it will <u>do</u> ...

Namely <u>teach</u>, <u>confront</u>, <u>correct</u>, and <u>train</u> us,
we will **NEVER** know <u>experiential sanctification</u> ...

there is **no other means** which the Holy Spirit uses to **sanctify**.

We do <u>not find sanctification</u> coming in <u>any other way</u> but *the truth* of **God's Word**.

This happens because all Scripture is indeed profitable to teach, reprove, correct and train.

As we first **learn** *the truth* of **God's Word**, it will become *inevitable* that **the Word** will **confront our sin**.

We <u>need</u> to be <u>confronted with our sin</u> — we need the <u>rebuking factor</u> of <u>God's Word</u> — it exposes sin, it refutes error.

1 Jo 2:5

but whoever keeps <u>His word</u>, in him the love of God has truly been <u>perfected</u>.

See how it is in the **keeping** (tereo = setting a watch upon, keeping before your eyes ... in practical terms: hearing, reading, studying, meditating)

in the <u>word of God</u>, as you do this, *the love of God* will be *perfected in you*.

# <u>Don't neglect</u> this discipline of taking in the Scripture,

my brothers and sisters ...

1 Thess 2:13-14

And for this cause we also constantly thank God that when you received from us the word of God, you received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually performs its work in you who believe.

The work of sanctification in the life ...

without which no man shall see God

is done in the Word of God ...

it cannot be done apart from the Word of God.

The **word of God** is the *God-ordained means* for your **sanctification**, and to the extent that we **neglect the Word of God**, we will be <u>severely crippled</u> and <u>under God's chastisement</u>;

but to the extent that we **practice** the **spiritual** <u>discipline</u> of **Scripture** <u>hearing</u>, <u>reading</u>, <u>study</u> and <u>meditation</u>, we will experience **sanctifying grace**.

Don't neglect it my friends, or that smarting rod
is going to come and you will find yourself
laid up on your back,
or out of work
or in some place
where you will have little else to do but to read the Word.

Don't neglect it!

#### Rom 12:2 admonishes us,

"Be not conformed to this world, but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind"

How is your *mind* to be *renewed*? **Through Scripture**.

Whose mold are you squeezed into?

If you are squeezed into this world's mold —
it is because your mind is not being renewed by Scripture.

The <u>default mode</u> is *the world* ... If we *neglect the Word*, we will be **conformed to** *the world*.

It is **the Scripture** <u>must</u> govern the way we <u>act</u>, <u>talk</u>, <u>walk</u>, <u>think</u> and <u>live</u>.

And all **sanctifying instruction** to **walk in truth** in a **worthy manner**, is found in **the Word of God**.

As believers we are *first justified by faith* ...

then *as new-born babes*, we <u>begin a *walk*</u> *in Christ* ... We <u>begin</u> to <u>grow</u> and are <u>changed</u> into His image.

As every *living* baby **grows** into **childhood** and *ultimately* **adulthood**, so <u>every *living* Christian</u> will go through the **same process**.

Justification and Sanctification are *inseparably* connected.

There are <u>no</u> justified saints, who are <u>not</u> in the process of <u>being sanctified</u>.

As Priest, Christ's blood paid the penalty for sin ... and cancels the <u>curse</u> of the law, which is the <u>damning power</u> of the law.

As King, His **presence in our lives delivers us** from the **reigning power** of sin.

"Sin shall no longer have mastery over you, for you are not under law, but under grace"

<u>Progressive Sanctification</u> is the ongoing process of <u>cleansing in the life</u>.

And <u>John 17</u>, in verse 17 and again in <u>verse 19</u>, Jesus prays for his people to be

sanctified in truth.

We've heard it said many times, many ways ...

This book will keep you from sin.

You've heard people call it "the good book"

From Genesis to Revelation ... this book is **GOOD** ... It is **profitable** 

Paul *emphasized* that he *Law is good*Jesus said that *He came to <u>fulfill</u>*, not *abrogate* the Law
David said *the Law of the Lord is <u>perfect</u>* 

<u>The Law</u> is *good*, it is *perfect*. Every *jot and tittle* of it ...

It is an *eternal* an *unalterable* rule of Righteousness.

It is a reflection of the moral character of God.

The *mere suggestion* that **God has done away with His <u>Law</u>**, is an **invention** from the pit of hell.

To *imagine* God *repealing* His <u>eternal</u> law, is to *take away* His justice and righteousness.

It <u>supposes</u> that <u>he would release His creation</u> from that which directs them into <u>doing good</u>, to <u>rather</u> permit them to do that which is **wrong**.

Matthew 5:18

till heaven and earth pass away, one jot or one tittle will by no means pass from the law till all is fulfilled.

How <u>horrible</u> to *imagine* that Jesus Christ would come from heaven, take on human flesh, die on the cross ... with the purpose of securing for His people lawless liberty and lascivious living!

That's why Paul uses such <u>strong language</u> ... "God Forbid!"

People will say, what about in <u>NT times</u>, are New Testament believers exhorted to **keep the law**:

I John 2:3, which will show us that it is the **mark** of a **true Christian**, that he <u>keeps</u> the law.

By this we know that we have come to know Him, if we keep <u>His commandments</u>. The one who says, "I have come to know Him," and does <u>not</u> keep His commandments, is a <u>liar</u>, and the truth is not in him; but whoever <u>keeps His word</u>, in him the love of God has truly been perfected.

Some would say, well, that's talking about the *New Commandment* ... the *Law of Christ* – <u>not</u> the *Law of Moses* ...

<u>except</u> that the *New Commandment*, <u>really isn't new</u> ... look down at <u>verse 7</u>:

#### 1 John 2:7

Beloved, I am <u>not</u> writing a <u>new commandment</u> to you, but an <u>old commandment</u> which you have <u>had from the beginning</u>; the old commandment is <u>the word</u> which you have heard.

You see, *the Law of Christ* <u>IS</u> the *eternal moral law*, only *in Christ*, it is <u>now</u> *written on our hearts*.

Isn't that what <u>Jeremiah prophesied</u> of the *New Covenant*? That this law would be written on your hearts, that you might perform it.

So the Law is Good!

HOWEVER,

Despite this there <u>is</u> a <u>right</u> and <u>wrong</u> way to use the law.

1 Timothy 1:8 says the Law is good, if one uses it lawfully,

A <u>scalpel</u> in the hand of a **plumber** is *very different* than a <u>scalpel</u> in the hand of a **surgeon**.

The Law has a **proper use** for *believers* and for *unbelievers*.

For <u>believers</u> as a rule for holiness – a guide to <u>show us God's will</u> – that we might do it and please Him, <u>out of love for Him</u>.

And for *unbelievers* as a school-master to <u>lead them to Christ</u>

But because people have **ignored** the **intent** of the law, what has happened is that it has **confused** the **work of the cross**.

The first message of the cross is **not** "God Loves You" but is "God's Law has been broken."

Trying to understand the cross as an **act of love**, apart from <u>understanding **the law**</u> is like trying to *assemble a jig-saw puzzle* with <u>half the pieces missing</u>.

All of the **errant ideas** that people have as to the **means** by which one is **sanctified** can be **summarized** under two broad categories

Legalism or Antinomianism.

All of the **means** that people consider **means of sanctification** — from <u>Gnosticism</u> to <u>mysticism</u> to <u>pietism</u> to <u>perfectionism</u> to "<u>higher life</u>" <u>theology</u>, to <u>second works of the Holy Spirit</u> — all fall under <u>one of these two</u> …

- All of these either on the one hand,

add laws to the Scripture – and these become *evidence* of sanctification – that is one is sanctified as he *fulfills* a <u>list of *dos* and *donts*</u>.

Or on the other hand,

a complete **setting aside** of the **law of God** — that is **denying** that <u>the law of God</u> has **any value**<u>in the life</u> of the **NT Christian** and that rather the Christian is now ruled by 
"the law of love."

# 1) Legalism –

a system of **salvation by works of law** — whereby men are **justified** or put in **right place** with God based upon *their* effort —

This is found in <u>Judaism</u>, <u>Catholicism</u>, as well as modern cults – in fact all of the world's religions, have some form of a <u>works-based earned</u> **righteousness**. Legalism omits or denies the need for the enabling grace of God

**Legalism** *perverts* **sanctification** by making it a **matter of** <u>duty</u> –

it <u>reduces</u> sanctification to the <u>keeping</u> of outward standards – it thus <u>separates</u> sanctification from the grace of God.

Legalism produces Phariseaism ...

The *Pharisees* were the "Separated ones" but their **separation** was **external** 

<u>Pharisaical sanctification</u> was a *work a man* – **not of the Holy Spirit**.

This is what characterizes much of Christian separation today.

There are <u>many churches</u> **consumed** with <u>the matter of **separation**</u>.

Pharisees are usually blind to their own lack of holiness or their own sin.

They are **quick** to correct **others**, while **failing** to see their **own** sin ...

Paul the *Pharisee*, believed himself to be **blameless**Until <u>the law shook him</u> and <u>free grace awoke him</u>
And then, He realize the **horror of his OWN sin**.

You want to know if you are a Pharisee ...

Let me tell you, if you are finding the fault of others
a greater rate than finding your own faults,

you are a Pharisee.

Your <u>dress may drag the floor</u>, you may <u>not have television</u> in your house, you may not <u>watch any sports activities</u> ...
You can be living *as though* you were <u>16<sup>th</sup> century Puritan</u> ...

The desire to *live godly in Christ Jesus* is **great**,

but it must come from the heart in obedience to the Word of God,

not from keeping some <u>man-made outward</u> standard that can make a man:
a <u>clean</u>, <u>moral</u>, <u>self-righteous</u>, <u>smug</u>
church member,
and leave him unchanged of heart.

Long dresses, not watching television, not going to movies,

Not eating, not drinking

where these activities come from the heart, is OK,

but if it is **forced upon a people** (*overtly* or *subtely*) as if to suggest that to **act such** makes one **holy**, then it is **horrible perversion**.

Such **legalism** has a <u>deadening</u> effect on **how** one lives. Legalism will **kill** any saint of God.

What good does it do for a people to <u>stop</u> all their <u>bad habits</u>, walk around <u>carrying their Bibles</u>, make good clean, sincere, moral church members,

and yet **remain** <u>unsaved</u> because they have <u>mistaken holiness</u> for an **outward system** of dos and don'ts.

Much of Christianity has been given a bad name by such activity.

Such systems are a **complete denial** of *Christian liberty*.

God did **not** call us to be *odd balls* – but to be the *salt of the earth*.

People should <u>notice us</u> for the **lives we live**, not for <u>looking oddly</u>.

**Separation** is **inward** not **outward**.

The Jews were to be separated outwardly –

But that which is born of flesh is flesh, and that which is born of spirit is spirit.

And <u>legalism</u> confuses this.

And much of the **errant thinking** on the **matter** of <u>what is *holiness* are the results of the influence of the **legalists**.</u>

Legalism in its <u>extreme</u> leads to another tendency called <u>asceticism</u> ... that is an <u>unbiblical self-denial</u> that seeks to gain God's favor by giving up things.

This again is <u>Pharisaeism</u>
Lord, I thank you that I am not like this publican, <u>I fast</u>, <u>I tithe</u> ...
Look at what I do that he doesn't ... I'm more holy!

It is trying to **move God's hand** by what <u>I do</u>.

Coloss 2:18 ...

Let no one keep defrauding you of your prize by delighting in self-abasement ...

[skip down to verse 20]

If you have died with Christ to the elementary principles of the world, why, as if you were living in the world, do you <u>submit yourself to decrees</u>, such as, "Do not handle, do not taste, do not touch!" (which all refer to things destined to perish with the using) — in accordance with the commandments and teachings of men? These are matters which have, to be sure, the <u>appearance</u> of <u>wisdom</u> in <u>selfmade religion</u> and <u>self-abasement</u> and severe treatment of the <u>body</u>, but are of <u>no value against fleshly indulgence</u>.

I remind you again of what I said a few weeks ago ...

Wherever you go ... Wherever you go ... wherever you go ... BE SURE ...

You will drag this body of death with you!

The *Pharisees* failed to realize this.

#### <u>Phariseaism</u> is all about **hedges** ...

they had *the law*, so <u>in order to *keep they law*</u>, they built <u>hedges around the law</u>,

to **be sure** that they would **not break it** –

They had the *appearance of wisdom*, but were *self-made religion* and *self-abasement* and were of *no value against fleshly indulgence*.

#### Asceticism today is manifested as

some people believe that we should <u>drive old cars</u> – or <u>buy our suits at the salvation army</u> ...

That these are **manifestations** of **holiness** and **humility** 

#### An ascetic is **not humble** at all.

An ascetic is one who

is attempting to gain righteousness through self-denial.

There is nothing **more prideful** than to think that one can be **more holy** through acts of **self**.

# <u>Another tendency</u> is in <u>asceticism</u> – this is an **unscriptural perversion** of the **reality of life** ...

Failing to see that **life is REAL** – and so trying to live on a <u>self-created non-earthly</u> **plain**.

#### People do this with the church ...

we want our church to be like the <u>early church</u> ... oh yeah, which one?

You want the <u>carnality</u> of **Corinth**You want the <u>legalism</u> of **Galatia**Maybe the <u>angel-worship</u> of **Colossae** appeals to you How about the <u>lukewarmness</u> of **Laodecia**?

# The *church* as an institution is **not perfect**, it never was.

Let's stop trying to think that we can create a perfect church ...

If we think our church is **perfect**, we will <u>cease reforming</u> – dwelling on a <u>self-created</u>, **plain** that is **no earthly good**.

So concerned about <u>separating</u>, that we have <u>separated ourselves</u> <u>so much</u> that we are <u>no longer really in the world</u> where we can be <u>salt</u> and <u>light</u>.

We have all heard the saying,

"He is so heavenly minded that he is of now earthly good."

<u>but there are those</u> who **create** their own "**spiritual plain**" in which to live on – and <u>their the only ones on it!</u>

Anthony was the founder of Christian monasticism ... He never changed his vest or washed his feet.

**Simeon Stylities**, who in the 5<sup>th</sup> century spent the **last several years of his life** atop a 36 foot pillar ...

mistakingly believing that the **path to spirituality** lied in **withdrawing physically from the world** and **exposing his body** to the elements

It was his attempt to **retreat** from *the physical* as though **Christian separation** were *physical* or *geographical* 

He had his food sent up with a rope.

To keep himself from falling off, he tied himself and developed rope burns ...

one day a maggot fell out of his sore,
and he put the maggot back in saying, "my friend eat what God hath provided thee"

That is **not unworldly** ... that is **un<u>REAL</u>** ... its **INSANITY**! That's' not **salt** and **light**.

There's no one looking at that kind of behavior and praising God for it.

<u>Asceticism</u> might make a person appear spiritual, because of its <u>emphasis on humility</u> and <u>poverty</u>, but it only serves only to **gratify the flesh**.

Yet this is a *practice* in the church today ...

People living on their own self-created plains ...

Creating their own "cloud nine"

Imagining some *perfect ideal* instead of *bearing with one another*.

Seeking sanctification by <u>removing themselves</u> from Biblical reality.

Do not to be intimidated by false human philosophy,

<u>legalism</u>, <u>mysticism</u>, or <u>asceticism</u>.

Those are but "broken cisterns that can hold no water" (Jer 2:13).

We <u>must not STAND</u> with those who want to put <u>unscriptural restrictions</u> on our lives, let the <u>Bible be our guide</u>, not <u>social dictates</u>.

<u>It was Charles Finney</u> who said, "no tobacco, no alcohol" **Why**?

If you put bad things into your body, you will sin.

It was also Charles Finney who said,

"no coffee, no tea, no spicy foods"

Our Lord said, that it is <u>not</u> what goes into the body that defiles him.

You can eat or drink what you want in realm of your Christian liberty, and in considering your own fleshly weaknesses,

unless you can cause your brother to stumble ...

But it is not a moral issue, its an ethical issue.

<u>Legalism</u> promotes in otherwise <u>sincere people</u> a lifestyle that is <u>diametrically opposed</u> to true Biblical godliness.

Is it possible that in your **desire** to be **a good Christian**, beneath all that <u>sincerity</u>,

is it possible that your heart has remained untouched?

Is it possible that you have tried to keep yourself in check with outward things?

Is it so that while **outward** trying to be a Christian, inwardly you are **rebelling** against **heart holiness**.

If all of your Christianity is a **system** of dos and don'ts – then by God's free sovereign mercy, might **your eyes be opened** to look to Christ.

Christianity is **not** a **system** of **works** and **laws**,

Christianity is **Jesus Christ** ... His **person**, His **work**,

<u>redeeming the soul</u>, <u>transforming the life</u>,

and the *implanting of a heart's desire* to **please Him**.

That is **biblical sanctification**.

2) <u>Antinomianism</u> (ante = against ... nomos = law)

<u>Antinomianism</u> is to **cast off restraint** and live a **subjective Christianity**.

Man is by nature <u>antinomian</u> ... as he, from the <u>garden of Eden</u> on, sought to **cast off God's law** 

Men are **sinners** by nature – and therefore a-nomia ...
no man apart from God's grace likes **outward restraint**.
None of us like to be told by someone else
what is **right** and what is **wrong** ...

<u>Antinomianism</u> is derived from the false theory of <u>dispensationalism</u>, that the **law of God** is <u>abolished</u> when Jesus died on the cross,

the Law *therefore* has **no value** as a *guiding principle* and Christians are to be guided by the "*law of love*,"

which is **interpreted** and **defined** individually by "the Spirit."

<u>Dispensationalism</u> is a **total view** of **Scripture** that **relegates the law of God** to a **past age** and to the **nation of Israel ALONE**.

It makes the **law of God**, <u>Jewish</u>, <u>national</u>, <u>Old Testament</u> – <u>not</u> for **believers** – so they **deny** the **present existence** of the **reality** of an <u>objective</u> standard for holiness.

Dispensational theologian Lewis Sperry Chafer wrote in his "Systematic Theology"

"as positional sanctification is <u>absolutely disassociated from</u> daily life, so <u>experimental sanctification</u> is absolutely <u>unrelated</u> to position in Christ."

<u>Dispensationalists</u> separate <u>sanctification</u> from the law of God.

They are *therefore*, **relativistic** *because* it has **no standard** of **what holiness is** – as there is **no law**.

<u>Dispensationalism</u> teaches that we are <u>united with Christ</u>, that <u>He is our justification</u> and <u>our sanctification</u>, and <u>that is true</u>,

but <u>dispensationalism</u> also teaches that our **positional sanctification** has **no relationship** whatsoever to **the way we live** in <u>daily life</u>.

1 Thess 4:7-8

For God has not called us for the purpose of impurity, but in <u>sanctification</u>. Consequently, he who rejects this is not rejecting man but the <u>God</u> who gives His Holy Spirit to you.

<u>Antinomianism</u> is <u>humanistic</u> at its core.

Antinomianism emphasizes love ...

### When the Bible tells us that love is the fulfillment of the law ...

it is in the context of

Thou shalt not steal, thou shalt not lie, thou shalt not commit adultery ...

It tells us this is **HOW** we are *loving our neighbor*.

#### Love is defined by law ...

How can I know **HOW** to *love my neighbor* apart from law?

#### The Antinomian's love has no foundation and

becomes <u>relativistic</u> and <u>situational</u> ... **love** becomes <u>different</u> under <u>different **situations**</u>.

## For many Christians their law, and guiding principle is:

"the peace they have in their heart"

# <u>Antinomianism</u> is one of the <u>greatest perverted forces</u> in <u>Christianity today</u>. It is the <u>road</u> for many to <u>seek other **means**</u> of **sanctification**.

Strange as it may seem, Antinomianism leads to legalism.

Man is created as a law-keeping being Man requires order ... and law

He hates restraint, yet at the **same time** seeks *some* **standard of law** that he can use to *justify himself*.

So when the Antinomian, says,

don't bind me ... don't tell me the ten commandments, don't tell me "thou shalt" "thou shalt not"

# And he neglects God's law,

he will seek to substitute it with his own standard of law -

And any law added to God's law becomes legalism.

So you <u>don't eat</u>, you <u>don't drink</u> – there's a lot of places you <u>don't go</u> – you <u>dress a certain way</u> ...
you <u>do all the dos</u> and <u>don't all the don'ts</u>
and **still go the hell**.

Because man's law is graceless!

It is only <u>God's law</u> that *brings freedom*! Only His law is *just*, *holy* and *wise* ...

Man's law has an appearance of wisdom ...

<u>Antinomianism</u> is also the <u>root</u> of many professing Christians seeking <u>MYSTICAL</u> <u>means</u> of sanctification.

Apart from any **STANDARD of sanctification**, many seek **sanctification**rather than from the absolute **truthful standard** of **God's Word** instead in **experiences**.

<u>Mysticism</u>, or the **pursuit** of a deeper or higher <u>subjective</u>

religious experience – is the <u>only sanctification</u> many Christians
ever know of and it is a counterfeit rooted in <u>Antinomianism</u>.

<u>Mysticism</u> looks for truth <u>internally</u>, weighing <u>feelings</u>, <u>intuition</u>, and other <u>internal sensations</u> more heavily than <u>objective</u>, <u>observable</u>, <u>external data</u>.

This <u>irrational</u> and <u>anti-intellectual</u> **approach** is the <u>antithesis</u> of Christian theology.

Yet it **speaks** in <u>Biblical</u>, <u>genuinely Christian</u> **terms** ...

You will hear from mystics of

A <u>relationship with God</u> – a <u>union with God</u>. A <u>life of prayer</u>, <u>meditation</u>, or <u>contemplation</u> – a <u>personal experience</u> with God. But while shrouded in Biblical language,

# it **departs** from an **objective standard** of the **Word of God** and makes **sanctification**

entirely a matter of feeling and pragmatic principles.

This manifests itself even in the way we talk ...

No longer do people say, "I believe" or "My opinion is" But "I feel"

Even **preachers** speak of what they "feel" rather than "believe"

We live in an **existential world** governed by **feelings**. Which has replaced **believing** 

Sense has replaced faith.

So men look to their **feelings** – <u>rather than</u> to any <u>objective **means**</u> to **make decisions**.

Men look to be guided by an *inner life* ...

They look for **guidance** in how the "spirit moved them" Or how they <u>felt</u> about an <u>experience</u>
And not "THUS SAITH THE LORD"

The living word of God!

This PERMEATES modern Christianity.

Subjectivism that takes precedent over the revealed will of God in His word

This has existed *throughout* the **history of Christianity**.

In the first century, **Peter** dealt with this in his **second epistle** ... before identifying of the **false prophets**,

he *first* made sure that those who were reading his letter *knew*:

that **despite** *all* that <u>he himself had **experienced**</u> and <u>seen with his own eyes</u> **as an apostle** 

# That there was what he describes as a MORE SURE WORD A lamp shining in the dark place

And that no prophecy of Scripture was ever made by the act of human will, but men moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God!

<u>Later in the second century</u> the church adopted <u>mysticism</u> derived from the <u>ideas of **Plato**</u> ...

<u>In mid-evil times</u>, the **monastic life** (monks in monasteries) was based upon *mystical* **ideas**.

The Quakers are another example.

They did not need the Bible because they were guided by an inner light.

<u>Keswick</u> or "<u>Higher Life</u>" movement ... adopted by the <u>Charasmatic</u> and <u>Pentacostal movements</u>.

Teach that **sanctification** comes to us in a **moment of time** 

The <u>modern Charasmatic</u> believes that he is **sanctified** when he experiences the **speaking in tongues**.

Others look for specific <u>manifestations</u> as *proof* that they are **sanctified**.

They need this <u>existential experience</u> of <u>instantaneous sanctification</u> – this <u>second work</u> of grace that they can live a <u>life</u> of godliness –

and we do not **doubt** their *sincerity*, but it is **decidedly against** the teaching of the Word of God.

And when *push comes to shove*, **some** of those who have **achieved** that *higher life*act just as *carnally* as those of us who are **still struggling** with the **remnants** of **indwelling sin**.

Realize too, that this is why so many in this camp fall into such **gross immorality** ...

#### Mysticism and immorality always go together ...

Because when one <u>separates sanctification</u> from the <u>law</u> – he will be <u>led by his SENSES</u> – which will *always* lead to <u>sinful behavior</u>.

So this *ugly*, *ungodly*, *antinomian gospel*, which is *a lawless gospel*, which is *no gospel* at all is **rampant** in a church today

And it has <u>relegated</u> the <u>Word of God</u> to a *mere road map*.

The Word is good they will say,

to point you in the right direction —

but we cannot idolize the Bible ...

the Bible after all is not God —

and a relationship with God is personal and dynamic the standards of relationships change.

God once used an <u>objective standard</u> to reveal His will, but <u>no longer</u> All of this **nonsense** comes down to <u>Satan's attack</u> on the most **foundational cornerstone** of the faith ... Sola Scriptura – Scripture alone!

This rallying cry of the reformation implies that **the Word of God** is *infallible*, *inerrant*, *complete*, *final* ... *absolutely authoritative* ... and *Totally sufficient* for **all your needs!** 

There is <u>nothing essential</u> for man to know which may **not be found there**.

Without Sola Scriptura, there is **NO basis for <u>sanctification</u>**.

<u>Scripture</u> has been <u>given</u> to the church – it was <u>delivered</u> to the church as a **body of teaching** – those things most surely believed among us!

And these things, have been passed down from generation to generation ... entrusted to faithful men to teach

So from <u>Augstine</u> to the <u>reformers</u> – <u>Wycliffe</u>, <u>Hus</u>, <u>Luther</u>, <u>Calvin</u>, <u>Knox</u>, <u>Zwingli</u>, <u>Edwards</u>, <u>Matthew Henry</u>, <u>John Bunyan</u>, Charles Spurgeon, Martyn Lloyd-Jones, up **to this very day** ...

this body of teaching has been entrusted to faithful men to teach ...

Men have lost their lives over this Word ...

To this day, Bibles exist from the time Bloody Mary ruled England ... She was **responsible** for the **murder** of many Protestants. Her soldiers would spill the blood and **dip their Bibles** in the blood – a few of these have been preserved to this day – "Martyr's Bibles" this was someone's **most valuable possession**, and their blood is there to **prove it.** 

Yet today, there is a <u>contempt</u> for <u>doctrine</u>, for <u>teaching</u> – and an <u>emphasis</u> to the contrary on <u>emotional indulgence</u> and the <u>perversion of Biblical love</u>

All scripture is given by inspiration of God, and is <u>profitable</u> for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness: That the man of God may be perfect, <u>throughly</u> <u>furnished</u> unto all good works. (2 Tim 3:16-17)

Christianity is <u>based on **DOCTRINE**</u> ...

and **doctrine** is the *basis* of **experience** – **not the other way around!** 

**God's law**, that is **His Word**, is the *only* revealed **standard of <u>holiness</u>**.

And we will **not submit ourselves** 

to the *dos and donts* of <u>Pharisaeism</u> on the one hand or to the <u>lisentiousness</u> of <u>antinomianism</u> on the other hand.

The church is full of people imprisoned by false systems of doctrine –

Perhaps you know of some ... who are slaves to lies ... slaves to legalistic systems or to Antinomian heresy

We must <u>after first understanding</u> these truths for <u>ourselves</u>, take <u>every false ideology</u> and <u>false doctrine</u> and **make it obedient to Christ** ...

we must, as Jude admonishes ...

have mercy on some, who are doubting; save others, snatching them out of the fire hating even their garments Or else, those people enslaved by the lies, will die captive to them.

<u>Get these things down for yourselves</u> ... <u>fight this battle first in **your own heart**</u>.

<u>Be disciplined</u> to **constantly** get truth into your own **mind** this is **absolutely critical**.

Remember <u>spiritual growth</u> – your **sanctification** – only comes **in Truth**, and there is <u>no other way</u> to **get it.** 

So **get it** – **understand it** – get **rooted** and **grounded** in it – and then **STAND** *for* it ...

"content earnestly for the faith which was once for all handed down to the saints."

If we fail to do this ... and we just go along our merry way,

People will not be delivered from the lies they believe –
some may not even be saved –
and others who are will not grow.

Wrong damns ... Truth saves ... Truth sets free!

If anyone teaches otherwise and does not consent to sound words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which accords with godliness, he is proud, knowing nothing, but is obsessed with disputes and arguments over words, from which come envy, strife, reviling ... (1 Tim 6:3-4)

**Spiritual growth** is *dependent* upon **sound doctrine**.

And brother and sisters, many of your closest friends are starving to death Starving for what you know and have found to be the truth.

have mercy on some, who are doubting; save others, snatching them out of the fire ...

Sanctify them, Jesus prays, IN the truth. Jesus said, I am the truth

1 Cor 1:2 says we are sanctified IN Christ Jesus

What a wonderful fact! What a treasure!

But I'll leave you with some *final exhortations*, by way of application ...

Two pitfalls to watch our for ... and five encouragements ...

Three pitfalls ... very practical ...

I) Do not imagine that *just because you are a Christian*, that *somehow* the **truth** is going to **infuse itself** *automatically* in your life.

This is a great fallacy ... faith is not passive ... true we do not rely on our own activity,

but at the same time, don't just sit around and do nothing ... Tolle Lege ... PICK UP and READ

And consistently apply what you read!

You don't get a "shot of sanctification" You are sanctified as you READ and APPLY.

II) The second pitfall to be aware of is this:

Don't expect to feel something happening to you.

Sanctification is application of truth believed.

We are neither saved nor sanctified by sense, but by faith.

III) Don't read just because "I have a certain amount of time before I got to work"

Read in such a way so as to come to a deeper knowledge of the greatness and holiness of God ... and the magnitude of my sin, which in turn magnifies His grace.

Which brings me to conclude with some **final encouragements** as to **how** to *read the Word of God* ...

5 encouragements all under one heading.

# Read your Bible, with an eye toward your sanctification.

In the *entire Word* there is *something* that will promote your <u>sanctification</u>, but there are **certain emphases**, which are of **particular importance**.

- 1) Look for **truths** taught about **God Himself**
- 2) Wherever you are reading, **look for Christ**.

Jesus said "But the Scriptures point to Me!" John 5:39

**Search the Scriptures** with a <u>view</u> of seeing and knowing more of your Redeemer,

As your ideas brighten on the person of **Christ**, you will find that you **love Him more.** 

- 3) Study the doctrine of sin see how God views sin and how man is affected by sin.
- 4) Meditate upon the Scriptures which introduce and teach the great doctrine of your identification with Christ.

  Look for all the mentions in the New Testament of our being IN CHRIST.
- 5) <u>realize</u> as you read that **God** <u>directly addresses **His Word**</u> to <u>YOU</u> ...

It is *personal* ...

The Word of God is an instrument not only of law or of government, but of fellowship.

Through it the great king of the universe <u>reveals</u> his desire to not live separated from his subjects,

but on the contrary

He desires that they **know Him** – that is *intimately* in a **love relationship**.

This can only happen as both parties know about each other.

God is your maker, and as such He knows EVERYTHING about you – before we say or do anything He knows us ...

But we know **nothing** of Him ...

*Until, that is,* we have <u>His word</u> *quickened to our heart* by His Spirit.

So God gives YOU <u>His Word</u> to <u>woo you</u> – <u>not</u> in an evangelical sense – <u>not</u> to woo the unregenerate – but to woo YOU – *His bride* to **love Him**. Remember that ... this is *God's love letter* to YOU, who believe.

It woos as well as <u>instructs</u>-

It does not just tell us about God –

but to calls us to personal communion with God.

#### Be sanctified, in the truth ... God's Word is truth.

Truth, received in the love and power of it . . . will establish your decisions, will soften and melt your heart, will warm and draw your affections upward, will keep your conscience alive and tender,

It is the food of faith, the bread of life It is the strength of hope, It is the well-spring of love.

"My child, listen to Me and **treasure** My instructions. Search for them as you would for lost money or **hidden treasure!**" (Proverbs 2:1,4)

# So the Word of God is the tool that the Holy Spirit uses to make us more like Christ ... to have grow in holiness.

#### This is important to God.

So much so that without holiness, no man shall see Him.

# I pray that you would make it the <u>priority</u> in your life.

That *just as* you would **not** *go a day without eating*, so you would *not go a day* without **meditating on the Word**.

# Long for it as a baby craves pure milk.

A baby doesn't care whether it is <u>inside</u>, <u>outside</u>, whether it is <u>day</u> or <u>night</u>,

A baby will **scream** until it gets the **milk** ...

Likewise <u>do more</u> than *merely* **read it**, <u>do more</u> **study it**,

#### **DESIRE IT!**

Want it more than anything else.

May it be yours' as it was David's **treasure** in that it *is more valuable than gold, yea than much fine gold* 

And it is your **pleasure** — In that it is *sweeter also than honey of the honey comb*.
