- A. Probes "Examine yourselves"
- **B.** Proves "prove your own selves"
- C. Perceives "Know ye not your own selves"
- III. Excellence "we can do…for the truth" (vs. 7-8)

An excellence that:

- A. Abstains "that ye do no evil"
- **B.** Appears "we should appear approved"
- C. Adheres "we can do nothing against the truth"
