	First be reconciled to your brother, and then come and offer your gift.
4	Principles of Reconciliation
5	Proverbs 18:19
	• A brother offended is harder to be won than a strong city: and their contentions are like the bars of a castle.
	In Biblical times a walled city was conquered in one of four ways:
	– Storming the walls (usually a bad idea)
	Starve out the inhabitantsSearching for a small door or opening
	– Searching for a small door or opening – Sounding the trumpets (crying out to God)
6	1. God reproves the unreconciled
	Things only get worse when offenses are unresolved.
	• Jacob:
	– Deceived his father to steal inheritance
	– Deceived Laban; Was deceived and cheated by Laban for 20 years; fled from Laban
	 Discovered his brother approaching with a troop of armed men to kill him. A wise man recognizes setbacks as signals from God to reconcile with others.
7	2. Reconciliation begins with self-examination
	• Psalm 139:23-24 Search me, O God, and know my heart: try me, and know my thoughts:
	And see if there be any wicked way in me • We need to:
	See our offense from the eyes of the one we have offended.
	– See how we failed to demonstrate love.
8	Jacob had a wrong heart
	• Love is:

- (Matthew 6:33)
 Jacob:
 - Should have been focused on giving to those he was serving

- Giving without the motive of personal reward

- Instead, he was more concerned about getting for himself and his own personal

- Focusing on advancing the Kingdom of God and letting God take care of all my needs

9 3. Cry out to God

- God:
 - He alone can bring about reconciliation
 - He desires to deliver us so He will get the glory (Psalm 50:15)
- Jacob cries out to God for help (Genesis 32:9-12)
- A cry must be fervent
 - Israel conquered Jericho with a loud cry and the walls came tumbling down
 - "A brother offended is like a walled city" (Proverbs 18:19)

10 The cry of reconciliation

- "O God, deliver us from further contention and bring us into peace in the name of Jesus and for His glory"
- James 5:16 speaks of the "effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man"
 - Comes shortly after James 5:9 "Grudge not one against another"
 - Confess our faults (be reconciled) to one another
 - Basis of healing

11 4. Reconciliation gives to the one we have offended

- Giving demonstrates a changed heart and should be done as we have opportunity.
 - Proverbs 21:14 -- A gift in secret pacifies anger: and a reward in the bosom strong wrath.
 - Luke 3:8 -- Bring forth therefore fruits worthy of repentance.
- · Make restitution if you took from another.
 - If you cannot make restitution, then indicate your willingness to do so.

12 Illustrated by Jacob

- Genesis 32:13-31
 - Sent Esau a gift
 - Actually, he sent the gift in stages so it was perceived as several separate gifts
- Gifts do not always need to be things.
 - Give of your time (my most precious commodity)
 - Perform an act of service that requires humility

13 5. Reconciliation serves

- Jacob identified himself as Esau's servant rather than as his brother.
 - Genesis 32:4 -- Thus shall ye speak unto my lord Esau; Thy servant Jacob saith thus
 - Genesis 33:4-5 -- And Esau ran to meet him, and embraced him, and fell on his neck, and kissed him: and they wept. And he lifted up his eyes, and saw the women and the children; and said, Who are those with thee? And he said, The children which God hath graciously given thy servant.
- Jesus is our example (Philippians 2:5-11)

14 6. Reconciliation requires sincere repentance toward God

- David disgraced Bathsheba, murdered Uriah, and offended Ahithophel (and other members of Bathsheba's family) and the nation of Israel.
- But his primary offense was toward God.

• Against you, only you, I have sinned and have done this evil in your eyes, so that you are correct when you speak, you are blameless when you judge.

15 Illustrated by Jacob

- · Jacob associated Esau's countenance with the face of God Whom he had offended
 - And Jacob said, "No, please, if I have found favor in your eyes, you must take my gift from my hand, for then <u>I have seen your face which is like seeing the face of God</u>, and you have received me." (Genesis 33:10)
- · All offenses are first toward God which is why we cannot worship with unresolved offenses

16 7. Reconciliation seeks release from the offended one

- Reconciliation is not just going through the motions of asking forgiveness
 - Sometimes the one offended will not forgive immediately
 - They are waiting to see our change of heart and evidence of our sincerity before they release us
- · We must demonstrate dialasso (a complete change) in order to complete the restoration

17 Illustrated by Jacob

- Jacob bowed before Esau and had his family also bow to Esau (Genesis 33:1-11)
- Jacob bestowed on Esau the blessing that he had stolen from him
 - Genesis 27:29 -- Let peoples serve you, and nations bow down to you; Be lord of your brothers, and may the sons of your mother bow down to you. Cursed be those cursing you, and blessed be those blessing you.
 - Jacob's attitude caused Esau to release and forgive him.

18 What does reconciliation do?

- Removes hindrances that non-believers would have from becoming Christians
- Allows the body of Christ to function harmoniously with each member bringing health to the Body
- Helps us be one with the Father so the world will know that we are His disciples
- · Enables God to bless us

19 How does Christ illustrate this command?

20 He initiated reconciliation

- He took the initiative to reconcile us to God. (We who caused His death -- should take responsibility of our offenses.)
- 2 Corinthians 5:18-19 -- And all these things are from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ, and who has given us the ministry of reconciliation, namely, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation.

21 2. He humbled himself

- He left the splendor of heaven for us (Philippians 2:5-8)
 - Think this in yourselves which was also in Christ Jesus, who, existing in the form of God, did not consider being equal with God something to be grasped, but emptied himself by taking the form of a slave, by becoming in the likeness of people. And being found in appearance like a man, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, that is, death

on a cross.

22 3. He removed the wall of separation

- Jesus tore down the wall that separates us from God.
- This was illustrated by the tearing of the veil in the Temple at His death
 - Started from the top and torn to the bottom
 - Removed our hindrances to access God

23 4. He made restitution

- 1 Peter 1:18-19 -- ...because you know that you were redeemed from your futile way of life inherited from your ancestors not with perishable things like silver or gold, but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of an unblemished and spotless lamb
- He became our Passover Lamb to take away our sins

24 ___ 5. He anguished over our reconciliation

- Just as Jacob wrestled with the Angel, our Savior wrestled in prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane
- Luke 22:44 -- And being in an agony he prayed more earnestly: and his sweat was as it were great drops of blood falling down to the ground.

25 6. He demonstrated love and complete forgiveness of sin

- He gave gifts to men (Ephesians 4:8) to demonstrate His complete forgiveness
- · His most important gift is the Holy Spirit
- He gives us spiritual gifts:
 - Motivation gifts Romans 12
 - Manifestation gifts 1 Corinthians 12
 - Ministry Gifts Ephesians 4

26 7. He strengthens fellowship through the body of Christ

- We are all part of the household of faith
- We are urged to increase our fellowship with one another (Hebrews 10:24,25)
- Our goal is unity with one another that glorifies Christ
 - Ephesians 4:13 -- Till we all come in the unity of the faith, and of the knowledge of the Son of God, unto a perfect man, unto the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ:
