Church Order of the FRCNA

Article 25 – The office peculiar to deacons is diligently to collect moneys and other contributions of charity, and after mutual counsel, faithfully and diligently to distribute the same to the poor as their needs may require it; to visit and comfort the distressed and to exercise care that the alms are not misused; of which they shall render an account to the Consistory, and also (if anyone desires to be present) to the congregation, at such time as the Consistory may see fit. (Church Order of the FRCNA)

Article 26 – The deacons shall enable the needy under their care to make use of Christian institutions of mercy. They shall confer and co-operate with deaconates of neighbouring churches when this is desirable for the proper performance of their task. They may also seek mutual understanding with other agencies in their community which are caring for the needy, so that the gifts may be distributed properly.
