I. Introduction – a prayer for hard times.

II. Pray. v. 1-2 Acts 2:42

- A. Humbly approach the LORD with reverent fear. v. 2a Job 42:1ff Ps. 77:2 Pr. 1:7
 - 1. Habakkuk is a changed man. 1:2,13
 - 2. God alone is "Awesome". Isa. 6:1ff
 - 3. Praise God for Who He is and what He does. Acts 4:24ff Ps. 44 78
- B. Pray for revival. v. 2b Ps. 85:6 119:25,37,40,50,88,93,107,149,154,156,159 Hos. 6:2
 - 1. Notice what Habakkuk doesn't ask. Mt. 6:10 1 Jo. 5:14
 - 2. Judah was in great need of revival.
 - 3. We need revival our nation, our church and ourselves.
 - 4. Revival comes through Divine intervention, not human contrivance.
 - 5. God uses means to accomplish revival. Js. 1:18
- C. Plead with God to remember His covenant and show mercy. 1:12 Ex. 2:24 6:5
 - 1. Habakkuk begs God to remember His covenant mercy. <u>Ex. 2:24</u> Ps. 103:13 116:5 Dt. 30:1-3 Isa. 14:1 49:15 54:8 55:7 Lam. 3:32 1 Ki. 8:50 Hos. 1:7 Mic. 7:19
 - 2. God mercifully remembers and revives His people. Deut. 30:3 Daniel 9:1ff
 - 3. Jesus came because God remembered His covenant mercy. Luke 1:54

III. Remember. v. 3-15

- A. When your faith is tried, remember Who God is, what He has done, and what He has promised. Ps. 77:11f
- B. Habakkuk's vision recalls God's past great works of deliverance and anticipates His future work to deliver His people from Babylon. v. 3-15
 - 1. A song for Judah during the exile God fights for His people.
 - 2. God comes forth in awesome splendor on behalf of His covenant people. v. 3-7 2:14 Ex. 19:16f 5:3 Ps. 68:7 8:1 97:4-5 90:2 Nah. 1:5 Dt. 33:2 32:24 28:21
 - 3. God saves His people and judges His enemies. v. 8-15 Isa. 66:15 34:1-10 51:9-10 63:1-6 Zech. 9:14 Ps. 77:16f 20:6 119:166,174 118:14 Jonah 2:9
- C. How does this vision of God help Habakkuk and the Jewish remnant?
 - 1. Just as God miraculously delivered His people out of Egypt, He will bring His people back from Babylon and establish them in the land. Deut. 33:2
 - 2. Just as God judged Pharaoh (and Goliath), He will crush the Babylonian oppressors. v.12b-15
 - 3. During the hard days of exile they must live by faith in these spiritual realities. 2:4
- D. How does Habakkuk's vision help us thousands of years later? Ps. 28:8
 - 1. We too gain comfort as we recall God's great works of faithfulness to His people and His judgement of the wicked.

- 2. We have far more to remember than Habakkuk did.
 - a. What God promised came to pass in history (539 BC).
 - b. Christ has come, bringing salvation to His people and assuring defeat for God's enemies. Gal. 4:4 3:13-14 Heb. 1:3 2:14-15 2 Co. 4:6 1 Jo. 3:8
 - c. Christ is with His people in this age. Mt. 16:18 28
 - d. Our Savior will come again bringing final deliverance and judgment as He establishes His righteous kingdom forever. Rev. 1:7 II Pe. 3:10
- 3. We walk by faith, not sight. 2:4 2 Co. 4:18 5:7
- 4. Did Habakkuk realize that he was pointing beyond the return from exile to the coming of Christ? v. 13,18 2:14 | Pe. 1:10-12 | Ro. 1:2 3:21 14-15 | Lu. 24:44f

IV. Trust. v. 16-19

- A. Habakkuk is transformed from fear to faith.
 - 1. God's plan hasn't changed, but Habakkuk's attitude has changed.
 - God's glory and His coming chastisement upon Israel causes Habakkuk to tremble.
 v. 16 Isa. 6:1ff
 - 3. He learns to rejoice in the LORD in spite of the worst of circumstances. v. 17-18 Zeph. 3:14f Phil. 4:4f Zech. 9:9 Isa. 66:10
 - 4. The LORD God is his strength. v. 19 Ps. 18:32-33 Ex. 15:2,13 Isa. 40:29-31
- B. You too can live above your circumstances by faith. Ps. 20:1 | John 5:4 4:18
 - 1. You will experience distress in this world. v. 16-17 John 16:33 II Ti. 3:12
 - 2. Instead of being overwhelmed by earthly circumstances, rejoice in your God and Savior. v. 18 Phil. 4:4-5,11-13 Mt. 4:4 2 Co. 12:10
 - 3. He will make you strong. v. 19 Phil. 4:13 Ps. 18:33

- B. Overcome fear with faith. 2:4 Job 13:15
