Matthew 16:13-18

Commitment Phobia

- ❖ The fear of making any kind of commitment to other people
 - applies to lifelong as well as short-term commitments
 - affects personal, business and organizational relationships
- ❖ The fear that by making a promise to do <u>one</u> good thing, we will miss out on something even better
 - keeping one's options open
 - commitment to the church is at an all-time low
 - 50% say church attendance is not necessary
 - only 1 in 3 who call themselves "born again" attend church on a semi-regular basis (8.25% of the total US population)
- Many think they can be a follower of Jesus Christ without being attached to the body of Christ
- ❖ The church of the early 21st century needs to help Christians cultivate an understanding of the church and why every believer should orient his/her life around it

What Is the Church?

- * The church is not an organization or an organizing principle
 - the church is a living organism that is distinctly and exclusively Christian
 - the word *church* is a thoroughly Christian word
- The church is a BODY of people who profess and give evidence that they have been saved by grace alone, for God's glory alone through faith alone in Christ alone
 - a local, loving collection of people who are committed to Christ and committed to one another
 - the church **BELONGS** to Jesus Christ (Matt 16:18)
- ❖ Word pictures that help flesh out our understanding of the unique nature and function of the church
 - the living **BODY** of Christ (1 Corinthians 12)
 - **a TEMPLE** or spiritual house (Eph 2:21, 1 Peter 2:4-5)
 - a **FLOC**K (Acts 20:28)
 - a **FAMILY** (1 Timothy 3:15)
 - "family values"
 - a pillar and buttress of the truth
- These pictures underscore that being part of Jesus' body means participating in a living, functioning, serving, witnessing community

Why Should I JOIN a Church?

- Like family membership, church membership is not an obscure matter
 - you don't change your family membership day by day, week by week or season by season
 - in the same way, your identity with a church family is meant to be clear and unambiguous
- The NT makes multiple references to the principle of church membership
 - an official list of people (Acts 2:27)
 - the concept of union (Acts 5:13-14)
 - *join* = glue, cement together, firmly unite
 - *join* = the word describing the physical union that takes place between husband and wife
 - an identifiable assembly (1 Corinthians 14:23)
 - the provision of accountability (Heb 13:17, Matt 18:19)
- ❖ The Christian life is not meant to be lived in isolation
- Church membership identifies you as a believer (1 Jn 2:19)
 - membership in the local church testifies to your membership in the universal church
 - when you grasp hands with other believers to know and to be known by them, you defeat your selfish, self-seeking tendency to see the Christian life as all about "you"
- Church membership helps you fulfill Jesus' great commission (Matt 28:19-20)

- Church membership is for the edification of the rest of the body... to build one another up
- Church membership is for the glory of God

What Does Church Membership Mean?

- ❖ A commitment to
 - participate regularly in worship, small groups, attendance at the Lord's Table
 - assume a ministry role
 - protect the unity of the church
 - share responsibility for the church
 - follow the leadership as it seeks God's will for the church
