Loved to the End (JL-77) John 13:1

Sunday, December 4, 2005

John 13:1

Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father, having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end.

We are about to embark onto **new ground** in our **journey** through the Gospel of John.

The section of Scripture which we begin today has been regarded by many to be the most precious portion of this Gospel and even in all of Scripture.

If John's Gospel were laid out as a tabernacle, chapters 13 through 17 would be the "most holy place"

in the sense that these chapters reveal a greater understanding of the relationship between the Father and Son, the person and work of the Holy Spirit, and the mystical union between Christ and His disciples.

<u>In the prologue of John's Gospel</u> we will recall that **Christ's**<u>mission</u> and <u>ministry</u> was <u>first</u> to *His own natural people*,

the *physical* children of Abraham, the Jewish people ...

but the **sad testimony** <u>from John chapter 1</u>, was that *though He* **came to His own**, **His own received Him not** ...

<u>This has been fully demonstrated</u> in <u>chapters 5-12</u> of this Gospel.

In the end of chapter 12, Jesus makesing one final plea to these people to come to Him, but the end result was that He hid Himself from them.

The **sad testimony** of the **prologue** ... that *His own <u>did not receive Him</u>*, was not <u>fatal</u> nor <u>final</u> *however*, because <u>remember</u>, that though THEY did not receive Him, there <u>would be</u> a people who <u>would</u>.

John 1 reads,

<u>To as many as received Him</u>, to them He gave the right to become children of God, even them that believe on His name.

It is this group of people ... who <u>now become identified</u> as the children of Abraham ... the children of God ... and "His own."

Remember in the *parable of the Good Shepherd*,
Jesus is seen as the **Shepherd of the sheep**,
calling "*His own sheep*" *by name* out of the fold of this world.

Well, now in chapters 13-17, we see **Christ alone**, with **His own** sheep, separated from the world, telling them of their particular blessings and privileges.

As a **bridegroom** writes love letters *exclusively* to his **bride**,

God in these chapters of Scripture,

writes to we who are His children, those who believe, a love letter.

The <u>truths</u> and <u>promises</u> <u>in these chapters</u> are <u>exclusively</u> <u>for</u> the <u>bride</u> of Christ.

<u>Chapter 13 begins</u> what is called the "Paschal Discourse"

By the middle of this chapter, **Judas**, the <u>last remnant</u> of the world, in their midst, will be gone ...

as he will leave to do his bitter work of betrayal.

<u>leaving the bulk of this discourse</u> ... this <u>teaching</u> on this final Passover night <u>for</u> his true followers.

If we *liken* our **journey through John** as a walk through the **tabernacle** of Israel ...

While chapter 5-12 are like the "outer courts,"

<u>chapter 13</u> brings before us the "altar of burnt offering" and the "bronze laver" whereby one is <u>saved</u> and <u>washed</u>, before entering the tabernacle.

In <u>chapter 14, 15 and 16</u>, we walk by the *Golden Menorah*, the *Table of Shewbread*, and the *Altar of Incense* ...

All, on our way **through the veil** that <u>separated God and man</u> into the *holy of holies*,

of which we <u>receive a glimpse</u> in <u>chapter 17</u> ...
the *high priestly prayer* of Jesus Christ.

Some of the most <u>poignant</u>, <u>powerful</u> teaching <u>in all of the Bible</u>, takes place <u>here</u> on the <u>last evening</u> that Jesus spent with His <u>disciples</u>.

<u>Before the meal was over</u>, Jesus would **institute** the <u>Lord's Supper</u>, and from that point on, **believers** would **no longer** recall primarily the **Passover lambs in Egypt**,

but they would **celebrate** and **remember** *the Lamb of God*, **Jesus** Christ, *who takes away the sin of the world*.

<u>During that meal</u>, Jesus **explained** the **legacy** that He would **leave behind**, as <u>He departed</u> to **go to the Father**.

His words are <u>intimate</u>, <u>personal</u>, <u>full of love</u> for those He called *His own*.

This <u>legacy</u>, was <u>not only</u> for the <u>disciples</u> <u>seated at the table</u>, but **for us** <u>who follow</u>, to <u>claim as our own.</u>

We have <u>crossed a great divide</u>.

Jesus has *hid himself* from those who would **not believe** and are **perishing**

And is <u>now</u> <u>revealing Himself</u> in all of His glory to <u>His children</u>.

It is not surprising, therefore, that the first words of this section in chapter 13 draws a distinct contrast between the people of the covenant and those of the world.

John 13:1

Now before the feast of the passover, when Jesus knew that his hour was come that he should depart out of this world unto the Father,

That tells us the **timeframe** ... it is **Passover** – <u>one of the two</u> most **holiest days** of the <u>Hebrew year</u> ...

The day when God parted the Red Sea

The day when God delivered His children from slavery

the day when all Israel remembers their deliverance
by the blood of the lamb, painted on their doorposts –

and their subsequent delivery from slavery in Egypt.

<u>The day</u> when God **set His people apart**, and <u>identified them</u>, by bringing them *through the waters* of the Sea

<u>Is the very same day</u>, here in <u>John 13</u>, that **Jesus** <u>identifies</u> <u>**His own**</u>, by the <u>washing of their feet</u> <u>with water</u>.

It was the <u>feast of Passover</u> ... a **feast** of <u>symbols</u> and <u>allegories</u> that <u>pointed</u> beyond <u>merely</u> the one event.

<u>Filled</u> with **<u>types</u>** and **<u>shadow</u>**,

pointing to a **greater deliverance** from a **greater bondage** ... by the **blood** of a **greater Lamb** ... the <u>bondage of sin</u>, **by** <u>the blood of Jesus Christ</u> ...

To the hustling people of Jerusalem this year, though it was **nothing more** than <u>religious ritual</u> and <u>tradition</u>.

<u>It is interesting that</u> while we are told the **time of year**, there is **no detail** as to the <u>specific</u> time of day or place where this is occurring.

<u>The synoptic gospels</u> tell us **all** about <u>the upper room</u>, and **all** of the <u>specific details</u> in **preparation** for the **feast** ... but *John* does not.

Perhaps this is to make this passage timeless ...

Perhaps the timeless nature of these chapters are intentional on the part of the Holy Spirit, so that we do not read this a merely a "narrative of events," but as a "timeless truth" for all members of Christ's body of all times.

Humans have a **tendency** of **taking events in history** and making **memorials** *of them*, *rather* than **appreciating their intent** ...

Like Christmas ... (manger scene under a tree ... a moment **memorialize**, while missing the whole **meaning** ...)

This section of John's Gospel cannot be frozen in time ... it is timeless.

Let's look at our verse again ... the rest of it:

having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the end.

<u>Here</u> we are **introduced** to the <u>beautiful Greek word</u>, agape ... repeated twice ...

The word, translated as "*love*" is a *uniquely* Biblical word.

There are several *classical* Greek words which can be **translated** as *love*,

but **none** captures the <u>self-sacrificing</u>, <u>self-giving</u>

love of Jesus Christ

... so the **Scripture** <u>redefines</u> a <u>rarely used word</u>

in fact it <u>almost</u> invents this word ... agape ...

to mean the greatest LOVE

that <u>surpasses</u> all human <u>understanding</u> of that word.

This word *agape*, so far *found but* 6 times in this Gospel in chapts 1-12, now will repeat 31 times during this "*Paschal Discourse*."

<u>Up to this point</u>, the **emphasis** of <u>Christ's teaching</u> was

"*light*" and "*life*" words found <u>82 times in the first twelve chapters</u> ... yet in the next 5,

we find "life" mentioned 6 times, and "light" not at all.

Clearly <u>LOVE</u> takes no a **new prominence** in this *final Paschal Discourse*.

I want you to **ponder** for a moment on the word **LOVE** ...

What does it mean? How do we define it?

As you do, I also want you to **realize** that the **greatest human mind** <u>cannot begin</u> to **fathom** its <u>true meaning</u>.

We throw around this word *love* so easily ...

We "love" our favorite meal

We "love" our dog

We "*love*" the <u>Mets</u> or the <u>Yankees</u> or the <u>Jets</u> (God help you) or Giants

We'll say things like, "Oh I loved that sermon"

Is this *love*?

We can say "I love you" to our wife or husband ... our children ...

While that's on a bit of higher plain than loving the Mets ...

But is it truly what love is?

Sad to say, that **even** when we **think** of **God's LOVE** ... it *too* has been **so trivialized** by **today's church**.

Modern evangelists, beginning with D.L Moody in the late 19th century, were the first to use the phrase "God Loves You" in his preaching of the Gospel ...

Today, the **term** has in <u>many places</u>, **replaced the Gospel** ...

You can search *long and hard* for 1800 years of **church history** and will **not** find the idea that "God Loves You" was *ever* **used in evangelism**.

Yet today, that's the main message ... "GOD ... LOVES ... YOU"

<u>Are we to emphasize</u> to *individuals* who are *haters of God*, upon whom **His wrath abides**, with a <u>smile on our face</u> ... "God Loves You!"

<u>The idea</u> has been **so trivialized** that we <u>cannot help</u> to think about a <u>smiley face next to the phrase</u>.

But this aside, the **HEAVY TRUTH** to the believer in Jesus Christ ... that <u>God Loves You!</u> is a glorious truth worthy of our considerable meditation and thought.

God loves you.

Separate it from the context from which we have <u>heard it in the past</u> ... and let's **meditate** <u>upon that a moment</u> – <u>word</u> <u>by word</u>.

The subject:

God,

the infinite, sovereign, immutable, awesome creator of heaven and earth ... the high and lofty One, whose train fills the temple ... the eternal, unchanging, magnificent, just, faithful, and true **Being** who is *all and in all* ... the **glorious**, Father, Son and Holy Spirit ... the covenant-keeping *Father of Lights*, the wonderful counselor, the Prince of Peace, the Mighty God ... **GOD** ... The verb: Loves ... **Agape** ... the self-giving, sacrificial, deep, emotional and purposeful expression ... as a perfect Father to His children ... as the *perfect husband* to **His bride**. As displayed in its highest form, by the giving of one's life for another ... God loves sinners, so much, that He died for them! He gave His blood in exchange for the lives of many sinners! He purchased a pardon and redeemed sinners by a **cruel** and **inhumane** death on a cross ... Greater love has no man than this ... GOD LOVES ... GOD LOVES ... WHO? The object: YOU!

Who are you?

Well, if you've been with us for any **significant part** of our study of the first 12 chapters ... you will **know** who **you** are.

I don't think that there could be **anyone** with us for *any length of time* that would **still believe** that they were a *pretty good person*, worthy to be loved ...

Most of the world can accept that God loves them,

because they believe themselves to be lovable people ...

But its when the Scripture reveals to us who we TRULY are, that we realize the GLORY of LOVE.

So who does God love? ... YOU and Who are you?

You were born in trespasses and sins, conceived in iniquity, your thoughts were never of God, in fact they were on your own evil intents, even your good works are considered as filthy rags, you are an enemy of God, you have broken His law

Being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness; full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, gossipers, proud, boasters, disobedient to parents, without understanding, covenantbreakers, ungrateful, unmerciful:

1 Cor 6:11 says,

And such were some of you; but you were <u>washed</u>, but you were <u>sanctified</u>, but you were <u>justified</u> in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, and in the Spirit of our God.

Turn to Ephesians 2 ... one **last <u>blast</u>** of **who you** *were* ... So that you can **appreciate** the *LOVE* that has been <u>extended to you</u> **by GRACE** ...

Eph 2 ... vs. 1

And you He made alive, who were <u>dead in trespasses and sins</u>, in which you once walked according to the course of this

world, according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit who now works in the sons of disobedience, among whom also we all once conducted ourselves in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind, and WERE BY NATURE CHILDREN OF WRATH, just as the others.

4 But God, who is rich in mercy, because of His great love with which He loved us, even when we were dead in trespasses, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved), and raised us up together, and made us sit together in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus, that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us in Christ Jesus. For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast.

So GOD LOVES ... who?

Children of wrath, children of darkness, following our own selfish desires and wants ...

Namely, **YOU!**

Now, with a <u>full understanding</u> what a **magnificent** *love* ... *this becomes*.

<u>I hope you see</u> why it is important to KNOW whom it is that God loves.

Be sure that if the church is confused on this matter,

how much more the world,

which is why to tell someone who rejects Christ that

God loves him is in essence to cauterize his conscience ...

to give him a false sense of security in his sinful state.

The <u>unregenerate</u> cannot distinguish between a general love and a specific love ... which is why he can accept that God loves him ...

It sounds good to him,

When the world hears, "God Loves You" ...

They're not hearing, that God loves him ...

by *giving him another day* – another *moment* where he has a **chance to repent** ...

He hears, **God loves him**, and *therefore* he will *surely* **go to heaven** when he dies.

This is a lie!

We must be very careful that we do not take the children's bread and cast it to the dogs!

We must <u>reclaim</u> the *LOVE OF GOD* ... as <u>specific</u> for *the children of God*.

"God Love You" must <u>not</u> be the topic of evangelistic sermons, but the <u>topic</u> of the <u>gathering of the saints</u> on Sunday!

There is **not one** example in *any* of the four Gospels where **Jesus** tells an **unbeliever** that **He loved them** ...

Now He did love them,

but He did not use this as an evangelistic method.

We cans see how because we have so *generically* used this term, it has lost all meaning ...

But if we **understand** the *AGAPE* of <u>chapters 13-17</u> in the light of **human nature** *emphasized* in <u>chapters 1-12</u> ... *LOVE* **flourishes**!

If we <u>understand</u> the who the <u>YOU</u> is in *God Love You* This will **come alive** for us.

Turn to the **Song of songs** ... or **Song of Solomon** ...

I hope you had the *opportunity* to **meditate** this week upon the **Song of songs** ... as I did, I noticed <u>just how</u> **God**, <u>the LOVER</u> ... **pursues His bride** ... <u>His beloved</u> ... who we are in the allegory.

<u>I want to point out a couple of things</u> ... so look at the **Song of songs** ... chapter 1 ...

God is the KING in this metaphor ... look at verse 4 ...

<u>Draw me</u>, and we will run after thee: the king hath brought me into his chambers: we will be glad and rejoice in thee, we will remember thy love more than wine: the upright love thee.

The *king <u>here</u>* is **seen** as the one <u>drawing</u> the bride.

He is the **initiator** of **LOVE** ...

The New Testament tells us that we can *love*, <u>only</u> <u>because</u> **He first loved us**.

In chapter 2 ... the **bride** sees the *King coming to her* ... As she describes it ...

Listen! ... My beloved! ... Behold, he is <u>coming</u> ... Climbing on the <u>mountains</u>; <u>leaping</u> on the hills! My beloved is like a <u>gazelle</u> or a young stag. Behold, he is standing behind our wall, He is <u>looking</u> through the windows, He is <u>peering</u> through the lattice.

That is God!

He is coming after <u>YOU</u> ...
He is climbing the mountain for <u>YOU</u>
He is leaping on the hills in pursuit of <u>YOU</u>
He is looking through <u>YOUR</u> window
Peering through <u>YOUR</u> lattice.

<u>David, the Psalmist,</u> in his **beautiful** <u>allegorical</u> <u>Psalm 23,</u> <u>paints the picture</u> of the **Good Shepherd**, whose <u>goodness</u> and <u>mercy PERSUES him</u>, <u>all the days of His life</u>.

> <u>David knew</u> that He was *loved to the end* ... He <u>understood</u> that the *lovingkindness of God* is *everlasting*, to those who are <u>His sheep</u>.

Look again at Song of songs – chapter 1 ... verse 5:

I am <u>black</u>, but <u>comely</u>, O ye daughters of Jerusalem, as the tents of Kedar, as the curtains of Solomon.

Look not upon me, because I am black, because the sun hath looked upon me: my mother's children were angry with me; they made me the keeper of the vineyards; but mine own vineyard have I not kept.

The *bride* observes some **by-standers** look **disdainfully** upon her *because* of her **blackness** which **long hours in the hot sun** doing **harsh work** had put upon her.

What a picture of the Christian who recognizes his sinful estate and deceitful heart ...

we are \underline{black} ... we are **beaten down** by the **terrible taskmaster** – **SIN.**

Those who look upon us, would **never imagine** <u>us</u> **to be** the **objects** of <u>love</u> ... let alone the **love** of the **King**!

Guilt blackens us;

Sorrow blackens us;

Suffering blackens us;

Sin blackens us ...

We've been scorched by troubles, trials, tribulation ...

The difficulties of life ...

<u>Take note</u> that this *bride* <u>found herself</u> under the **displeasure** of **her own household** ...

She is **abused** by her own family ...

her sisters made her the keeper of the vineyards ... to the extent where she neglected her own vineyard.

<u>How we, likewise allow</u> our <u>past oppressions</u> to <u>keep us</u> from tending the garden God has given us!

All of this blackens our soul!

Luther said, we are but snow covered dung!

This notwithstanding, we are nevertheless objects of God's love.

God Loves You seems so <u>simple a thing</u> to understand ...

But is a **cheap idiom** if we <u>fail to understand</u> any of the **these three words** ...

Not the least of which is the word **YOU**.

You are *black*, but God has made you *comely* ...

He has made you beautiful!

He has washed you ... He has cleansed you ...

Your family abused you

You suffered the damage of a bad marriage

You destroyed your life with drugs or alcohol

Your **past** and your **sin** has *caused* what *seems to you* an **indelible mark** ... a **permanent stain** ...

But you have been <u>covered</u> ... clothed by the <u>glorious</u>, <u>pure</u>, <u>spotless</u>, righteousness of Christ ... and you are a new creation ...

Not characterized any longer by blackness!

The *King of kings* delights in your *beauty*!

Let's go back to our text and look at John 13 again ...

having loved his own which were in the world,

I'd ask you the question ... are you *His own*?

Notice that the **promise** of *God's love* is NOT to *just anyone* ... but *His own*!

I believe there is a <u>dual meaning</u> here in these words of <u>verse 1</u> ...

There is a <u>transfer of ownership</u> ... in a sense ... as *who* He means by the term "His own" <u>changes</u>.

At the beginning of this Gospel in chapter 1,

"His own" very clearly refers to the Jewish nation ...

"He came to His own, but His own received Him not."

Nevertheless, **He loved "***His own*" ... that is *His natural people* ... and *He loved them to the end*.

There is <u>no need</u> to <u>take</u> on the *view* that **Jesus** <u>did not love</u> those who rejected Him.

God does *love* men and women and there is an indiscriminate *love* extended to all people, that is <u>necessary</u> because God's nature is *love*.

Jesus told us in Matthew 5:44 —

love your enemies in order that you may be sons of your Father ... we know from this, that the Father loves <u>His enemies</u>, and this love is <u>not dependent</u> upon their repentance.

<u>In Mark 10:17-23</u> — Jesus had a *love* for the **rich young ruler**, *yet this man did not enter the kingdom of God*.

God *loves* those who **don't love him**, and this *love* is **manifested** in the **common grace**

and the *staying* of **wrath** and **judgment**.

God has <u>compassion</u>, he <u>pities</u> the lost,

as demonstrated by His love for Nineveh,

The fact that Jesus Christ **incessantly warns** His people, demonstrated His *love* for them.

But let us not confuse this non-specific *love* with the specific and infinite *love* that God reserves for His children.

Though *God loves the world*, there is a <u>limit</u> in <u>degree</u>.

There is an **end** to that love ...

There is a **time** when *mercy* is <u>exhausted</u>.

There is **no more grace** in hell.

The Scripture says,

it is appointed to man once to die, and then the judgment.

If you have not *received* His *love* here, while we have breath, there is **no hope** <u>beyond the grave</u>.

As in the days of Noah,

There is a time, when God shuts the door of the ark.

Here in the Gospel of John ... that time had come,

and Jesus loved "his own natural people" to that end

<u>But now</u>, after all of the <u>unavailing appeals</u> to Israel of the <u>first 12 chapters</u>, <u>Christ now comforts</u> His heart by adopting and setting His love upon the <u>few</u> who <u>did receive Him</u>.

It is to these, "His own, which were in the world" that He has lavishes His love upon.

You see, the **definition** of "*His own*" has **changed** ...

Context demonstrates that this **population** called "his own" **now** is comprised of those who **DO** receive Him.

I ask you, are you Christ's OWN? who owns you?

<u>I Cor 6:19</u> tells us that if you are Christian, *you are not your own*, you belong to Christ.

He owns you.

We belong to Jesus Christ ... not only because He <u>created</u> us ...

but because He adopted us ...

we were chosen, out of the world, in Him before the foundation of the world.

Deuteronomy 7:6

"For you are a holy people to the LORD your God; the LORD your God has <u>chosen you</u> to be a people for <u>His own</u> <u>possession</u> out of all the peoples who are on the face of the earth.

Election is the <u>ultimate expression</u> of *God's love*.

We can lose sight of this ... with all of the doctrinal arguments ...

But throughout the Scripture we find time and again, God's unconditional election of His saints connected with His purposeful and active love ...

1 Thessalonians 1:4

"For we know, brothers, loved by God, that he has chosen you".

Colossians 3:12

"Put on then as God's <u>chosen ones, holy and loved</u>, compassion, kindness..."

Ephesians 2:4-5

"But God, who is rich in mercy, <u>because of the great love with</u> which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us alive together with Christ (by grace you have been saved)"

Psalm 33:12

<u>Blessed</u> is the nation whose God is the LORD, The people <u>whom He</u> <u>has chosen</u> for His own inheritance.

Psalm 65:4

How blessed is the one whom <u>You choose and bring near</u> to You To dwell in Your courts.

And here in John 13:1

Having <u>loved</u> <u>His own</u>, who were in the world ...

With only the disciples remaining,

LOVE now becomes the dominant theme ...

having loved his own which were in the world, he loved them unto the END.

Who can define *the end*?

Is it ... *the end of this life?* ... *surely* we are *loved* throughout *this life*.

David said,

"Yea though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, Thou art with me."

We are <u>assured</u> of *His love* and presence with us ... as Jesus promised, "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age."

The term *UNTO THE END* in our text is interesting. εις τέλος

The Greek indicates that God loves His children to the fullness of His capacity to love creatures.

He <u>loved them</u> to the *uttermost* ...

God's love for His own had no beginning and will have no end.

Its <u>beginning</u> was **before we were in our mother's womb**, in <u>the days of eternity PAST</u>, its <u>end</u> will be in the <u>days of eternity FUTURE</u> ...

Think about that ... $\varepsilon \iota \varsigma \tau \varepsilon \lambda \circ \varsigma$ Suggests ... **no beginning**.

He did not start loving you when you were born, but if you are one of His sheep, He has loved you from the days of eternity.

Look at Psalm 139 ... verse 14 –

or middle of verse 13 ...

Thou didst weave me in my mother's womb.

I will praise thee; for I am fearfully and wonderfully made: marvelous are thy works; and my soul knows it well. My substance was not hid from Thee, when I was made in secret, and skillfully wrought in the lowest parts of the earth.

Thine eyes did see my substance, yet being unperfect; and in thy book all my members were written, which in continuance were fashioned, when as yet there was none of them.

<u>How precious also are thy thoughts unto me, O God!</u> how great is the sum of them! If I should count them, they are more in number than the sand: when I awake, I am still with thee.

That's enough to chew on for a few hours ...

This is **not** some **general truth** ... it is TRUE of **YOU** ... as a *born-again child of God*!

How precious also are thy thoughts unto YOU____!

How great is the sum of them! If YOU____should count them, they are more in number than the sand:

How glorious!

How about ... Jeremiah 31:3 ... which tells us about eternity future.

"I have <u>loved YOU with an everlasting love;</u>
<u>Therefore I have drawn you</u> with lovingkindness.

Psalm 103:17

"But the lovingkindness of the Lord is from everlasting to everlasting on those who fear Him".

So, does *such love* **stop** *when we sin*?

NO! ... unto the end ... means unto the end!

This *love* extends to the *farthest extent* of our need for His grace.

David said, "Though I make my bed in hell, Thou art there."

He knows what you have done ... and what you will do ...

And loves us nevertheless.

It is UNCONDITIONAL!

Jesus knew that in only a few hours,

- 3 of his disciples would fall asleep while he agonized in prayer.
- He knew that **Peter** would **deny Him**
- He knew that **all** would "forsake Him" that evening
- He knew that <u>just moments ago</u>, they were **clamoring** and **arguing among themselves** as to *who was the greatest disciple*!

• He knew that <u>in a moment</u>, Peter would **pridefully reject**His <u>desire to wash his feet</u>.

Yet He loved them, and loved them to the uttermost!

And He loves us ... He loves us unto the end

- of our own *miserable failures*
- Unto the **end** of our *backsliding*
- Unto the **end** of our *wanderings*
- Unto the **end** of our *unworthiness*
- Unto the **end** of our <u>deepest and darkest hours</u>

We can take **comfort** in this **strong** and **powerful** and **intense**, **affectionate love of God** that **will stop at NOTHING** to <u>keep us from perishing</u>!

That's why 1 Cor 1:8 promises that He

shall <u>confirm you unto the end</u>, that ye may be <u>blameless</u> in the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

In Rom 16:25, He is able to establish you according to my gospel

In <u>2 Cor 1:21</u> He is the One

who <u>establishes us</u> in Christ and anointed us is God, who also <u>sealed us</u> and gave us the Spirit in our hearts as a pledge.

In <u>1 Thess 3:13</u> ...

He may <u>establish your hearts unblamable</u> in holiness before our God and Father at the coming of our Lord Jesus with all His saints.

<u>In 2 Thess 3:3-4</u>

But the Lord is <u>faithful</u>, and He will <u>strengthen</u> and <u>protect</u> you from the evil one. And we have <u>confidence</u> in the Lord concerning you, that you are doing and will continue to do what is commanded.

Peter writes in 1 Pet 5:10-11

And after you have suffered for a little while, the God of all grace, who called you to His eternal glory in Christ, will <u>Himself perfect</u>, <u>confirm</u>, <u>strengthen</u> and <u>establish</u> you.

And in the *benediction of Jude* vss. 24-25

Now to Him who is able to <u>keep you from stumbling</u>, and to <u>make you stand</u> in the presence of His glory <u>blameless</u> with great joy, to the only God our Savior, through Jesus Christ our Lord, be glory, majesty, dominion and authority, before all time and now and forever. Amen.

Grab hold of these promises ... my brothers and sisters ...

Cherish them,

Believe them,

they are *more precious than gold*!

Think upon these great truths!

Let them be your *meditation day and night*!

If you are a disciple of Jesus Christ,

this is *because* God has *personally*, *individually*, *unconditionally*, and *lovingly* **chosen you** out of the world.

Today, you may feel far from Jesus, but take comfort:

he loves <u>his own</u> who are in the world.

Consume yourself with this truth ...

Get your *eyes off of yourself* ... and **put them on Him**.

This is what He would have us taken with!

YOU have captured His heart, with just one glance!

He **DELIGHTS** in **YOU!**

"Listen! ... Behold! ... He is coming ...

Climbing on the mountains,

Leaping on the hills!

Like a gazelle

Behold! ... he is standing behind your wall,

He is looking through your windows,

He is peering through your lattice.

He has said to you ...

'Arise, my darling, my beautiful one, and come along.

For behold, the winter is past, the rain is over and gone.

The flowers have already appeared in the land;

The fig tree has ripened its figs,

And the vines in blossom have given forth their fragrance.

Arise, my darling, my beautiful one,

And come with me!""

He proclaims it proudly,

"Behold, YOU are fair

Like the moon, you outshine the stars, my beloved, my beautiful one"

The **beauty** of the **Perfect One**, the Lord Jesus Christ has been **given** to **YOU**!

So ...

God has said of YOU ... You are fair, my love, there is no spot in thee.

His bride has <u>not even one blemish</u>, <u>in His sight</u>!

Though <u>she</u> often wanders from Him and grieves His Holy Spirit,

He does not allow her faults to affect His love.

There is no remembrance of her follies,

He does not hold onto one ill thought of her.

Yes, we are <u>black</u> ... we are <u>totally depraved</u> ... our hearts are <u>desperately wicked</u> ... we do not deny <u>any</u> of this ...

But by the **GRACE of God** ...

we are *comely* ...

declared and made so by the King of kings and Lord of lords!

He has loved us ... Yes, He has loved us unto the end!

My friends, a proper understanding of God's love for you unto the uttermost will make us a strong, faithful, confident, and joy-filled church!

Strength of character, faithfulness in conduct, courage of conviction, humility of spirit, and hope for the future all stem from this glorious TRUTH.

That <u>Jesus Christ</u> has <u>loved his own</u> who are in the world, and loved them unto the end!
