REFORMED EXPERIMENTAL (EXPERIENTIAL) PREACHING

(Syllabus for Course #512, Homiletics II, Joel R. Beeke)

I. Course Description

Defines and explains both the discriminatory and applicatory dimensions of Reformed experiential preaching. Examines how major Reformers, English Puritans, Dutch Second Reformation divines, and two great preachers from each of the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries emphasized the experiential dimension of vital Christianity in their sermons, then addresses the question: How can Reformed ministers best preach experientially today?

II. Course Objectives

By the end of this course, you should be able to:

- 1. Understand how the experimental dimension of vital Christianity was preached by the major Reformers, English Puritans, Dutch Second Reformation divines, and a few great preachers from each of the 18th, 19th, and 20th centuries.
- 2. Apply what we learn about experimental preaching to contemporary preaching.
- 3. Practice the basics of experimental preaching by writing sermons on texts that emphasize the experience of vital Christian truth in the soul and life of the believer.
- 4. Know the primary strengths and weaknesses associated with experimental preaching.

IV. Course Requirements

- 1. A final exam of six essay questions based on both class lectures and reading assignments (50% of grade).
- 2. A 15-20 page paper is required which should be (1) a study (scriptural, theological, historical, or a combination) of some aspect of experiential preaching; (2) a study of a sermon(s) of a particular minister noted for an experiential emphasis in his preaching; or (3) two of your own sermons (written out in full) based on a portion of Scripture which emphasizes spiritual experience. (Th.M. students must complete

number 1 or 2, <u>and</u> number 3.) (50% of grade).

3. The completion of the required reading assignments. Record the percentage of the reading assignments completed on the bottom of the final exam.
