 - -Interpretation: Allegorical; Typological; Naturalistic; Inferential
 - The Song records historical events; pay attention to details; the Song reminds us of a greater higher, perfect love
 - -Structure: Speakers (bride; bridegroom; daughters of Jerusalem)
 - I. The Courtship: Love Commenced (1:1-3:5)
 - II. The Wedding: Love Consummated (3:6-5:1)
 - III. The Marriage: Love Confirmed (5:2-8:14)

- III. Christ in the Song
 - -The Song is suggestive of Christ's love for the church (Hos. 2:19, 20; Eph. 5:25)

- IV. Prominent Themes and Practical Lessons in the Song
- 1) The Song designates the essential parameters of human marital love.
 - →one man and one woman in a context of covenantal commitment for life
- 2) The Song celebrates the eminent virtues of human marital love.
 - → Legitimacy and Purity; Joy and Beauty
- 3) The Song advocates the elevated significance of human marital love.
 - → Human, marital love is a faint reflection of God's unfailing, unwavering love for His people in Christ.
