Get Ready 1 Peter 3:13–17

Introduction

It was 23 years ago, that we found ourselves in a world of panic over Y2K. The world was going to end because all the computer systems were going to shut down.

Y2K is the shorthand term for "the year 2000." Y2K was commonly used to refer to a widespread computer programming shortcut that was expected to cause extensive havoc as the year changed from 1999 to 2000. Instead of allowing four digits for the year, many computer programs only allowed two digits (e.g., 99 instead of 1999). As a result, there was immense panic that computers would be unable to operate at the turn of the millennium when the date descended from "99" to "00".

In the years and months leading up to the turn of the millennium, computer experts and financial analysts feared that the switch from the two-digit year '99 to '00 would wreak havoc on computer systems ranging from airline reservations to financial databases to government systems. Millions of dollars were spent in the lead-up to Y2K in IT and software development to create patches and workarounds to squash the bug.

The research firm Gartner estimated that the global costs to fix the bug were expected to be between \$300 billion to \$600 billion

While there were a few minor issues once Jan. 1, 2000, arrived, there were no massive malfunctions. Some people attribute the smooth transition to major efforts undertaken by businesses and government organizations to correct the Y2K bug in advance. Then came 9-11 in 2001, and everyone knows where they were when the got word or saw the 2nd plane fly into the second building in New York. In response, the United States entered into the longest war ever fought on foreign soil. Many of our men and women died in the attacks and the war afterward.

In 2008 Lehman brothers Global financial services went belly up and we saw the beginning of the 2008 financial housing collapse. But that was not the end of a roller coaster ride of unprecedented events. In the fall of 2019 some people in China came down with a sickness unlike anything we had

seen before. A novel Coronavirus, later known as Covid 19 would infect the planet. 1000s would die and we would all be told to shutdown, lockdown and mask up. Businesses closed, churches closed their doors, Sporting events were stopped. The 2020 Summer Olympic games were delayed. Worse yet, members of the family were forbidden to visit their loved one in the Hospital who had Covid. It was for many a very dark and fearful time. Depression and suicide skyrocketed.

But this was not all. In the last 2 decades we witnessed the popular emergence of the seeker sensitive mega church. The dumbing down of doctrine and the continuing escalation of apostasy. The Woke ideology of social justice and critical race found a home in the culture and in large Protestant denominations. Churches and leaders began capitulating and compromising on core moral and ethical truths found in scripture. The theme was not, "Has God said" but, "Has God really said".

The church that was once the pillar and ground of the truth was now a crumbling and cracked edifice with little to no resemble of the church of earlier days.

At the same time of one of the most dangerous times of compromise of the church, there has been a significant rise of persecution of believers throughout the world and the United States.

More than 340 million Christians worldwide experienced high levels of persecution in 2020, with 4,761 killed for their faith, a new report has revealed.

The annual World Watch List produced by Christian charity Open Doors showed this is a huge increase on previous years; the 2019 figure was around 260 million.

For the first time, the charity categorized all of the 50 worst countries in the world as exhibiting "very high" or "extreme" levels of persecution towards Christians – affecting 309 million people.

Newsweek reported in January 2018 that "the persecution and genocide of Christians across the world is worse today than at any time in history."

In Egypt, <u>Christian Coptic women are targeted</u>, kidnapped and forced to convert to Islam and sold as domestic servants where they are sexually exploited and physically abused. Just last year, <u>drug cartels killed 23 Christian</u>

<u>leaders in Mexico</u> and four in Colombia specifically for their faith and standing up against the cartel's criminal activity in the country. On Mother's Day in Indonesia, an Islamic family launched a suicide bombing attack on three churches, killing 10 people and severely injuring another 40

Additionally, the Chinese government has started a systematic campaign to destroy church buildings and all Christianity-related structures, beginning with the demolition of one of the largest churches in China where over 50,000 Christians worshipped every week.

In 2017 alone, the killings of Christians in Nigeria increased more than 62 percent. In the city of Onitsha in southern Nigeria, a radical gunman attacked a church killing 12 of its members and injuring an additional 18. In the Nigerian state of Kebbi, church leaders were arrested and sentenced to three years in prison.

Although there are many who we would not identify as orthodox believers or evangelicals that have died. The point is that they have identified as a christian or a follower of Christ and have lost there life for it. There is a notable and tremendously troubling rise of persecutions of those who call themselves Christians throughout the world. The

worse of it being in North Korea, China and a large section of the Islamic nations.

For years the most we here in America would know of persecution was what we read about or heard of in lands overseas. There would be the period but rare event where a church or christian group or person would be in the news for there unwillingness to compromise on the ten commandments in a courtroom or a manger scene erected in a public place. But for the most part that was about it. No one shot, or jailed or beaten for their faith. Mostly we where made fun of or mocked as fundamentalist, Bible thumpers.

But that is all changed. It is a new hostile world for any vocal Christian. In the last 15 years the attempts to silence the christian community is off the charts. We are in a different time, a different culture, a dangerous season. The years of parents raising an ungodly seed, has finally sprouted and the plant has lots of thorns and is deadly.

The hatred for Christians and particularly christian doctrine is boiling over. All it needs is an opportunity and a platform to speak and the hatred spews forth.

As I told you a few weeks ago, the persecution and hatred that we see today is not because we are christians, it is because of what that stands for.

And it's not because of the cardinal doctrines, like Monotheism, or Jesus is the God, or Salvation is apart from works, or Jesus is the only way.

No one really cares what you believe about those things in this religious pluralism. This has been reflected in the last few surveys of the diminishing doctrinal distinctives that people, even professed christians care about.

But what our culture really cares about is the license to sin. You can talk about your Theology proper all day long and debate your views of Eschatology, but just don't tell me that it is wrong for a man to marry a man or a man can't be a woman, or that I can't kill my baby when I want to before or immediately after birth. Don't tell me that there is a right and a wrong, or that there is judgment to come or that I will be held accountable.

Don't judge me, lest you be judged. Stay out of my business and what I do is my own business. What I do with my body and to my body is my choice.

This is the line in the sand, the watershed issues that will divide the believers and will continue to

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show what church and which christians will compromise and which will not.

- Jack Phillips, the baker, has been harassed for over a decade, bombarded with requests to make the most profane cakes, and dragged in and out of court simply for trying to run his business as a Christian (persecution that continues despite his having prevailed at the Supreme Court).
- Barronelle Stutzman, a florist, was eventually forced into retirement because she also refused to compromise on her traditional Christian faith commitments and participate in the celebration of sin.
- Coach Joe Kennedy was fired for exercising his First Amendment rights to pray to God in public. It took him almost seven years to fight to undo this unjust persecution, prevailing only when the Supreme Court ruled that "a government entity sought to punish an

individual for engaging in a brief, quiet, personal religious observance doubly protected by the Free Exercise and Free Speech Clauses of the First Amendment...the Constitution neither mandates nor tolerates that kind of discrimination."

Even crisis pregnancy centers, many of them run by Christians, are under attack because they promote life, rather than death. Since early May, when the *Dobbs* decision was leaked suggesting that *Roe v. Just like many campus colleges, public schools are getting hit as well. Student groups like InterVarsity have been kicked off campuses, and a teacher in New Jersey was suspended for giving a student a Bible.

Many Christian colleges themselves also have been in jeopardy lately. Recently, some have been asked to conform to secularist ideology or they will lose their accreditation. Traditional evangelical schools like Gordon College in Massachusetts and Kings College in New York are having their accreditation questioned. Some secularists are arguing that Christian colleges should never deserve accreditation, period.

A Phoenix pastor who was jailed for holding a Bible study group on his private property is now holding one behind bars.

Michael Salman is serving a 60-day sentence in Maricopa County's notorious Tent City jail for allegedly violating his probation by holding religious services on his property in violation of zoning and building codes. Hundreds signed a petition calling for a ban on "hate speech" at school board meetings after one parent quoted the Bible in his public comments criticizing the board.

At the Dec. 13 school board meeting, many parents demanded board members resign, in the wake of a grand jury report that indicted the former superintendent and another school official for their handling of sexual assaults.

The school's <u>transgender policy</u> has been a focal point of criticism by parents after two female students were sexually assaulted by a boy wearing a skirt in 2021.

During the public comment section, one speaker accused the board of promoting "immoral" behavior that was against God's "design" and "natural order."

"[LGBT] behaviors should never have been promoted, taught, or encouraged in the schools that you oversee," Mark Winn said, before paraphrasing Jesus in the Gospels.

"If any man or woman causes one of these little ones to stumble, it would be better for [them] if a millstone to be put around your neck and thrown into the lake," Winn said, adding, "Get back to reading, writing and arithmetic and quit grooming and pimping."

Those comments provoked 19-year-old Loudoun County community organizer Andrew Pihonak to start a petition banning "hate speech" at future school board meetings.

There is no reason that I can see that we should expect this to get better. It will only get worse as we witness the Judgement of God on this nation and the churches. I. An Unexpected Reaction.

¹³ And who *is* he who will harm you if you become followers of what is good?

To understand the reason for this statement, we need to consider the context

1 Peter 3:8-12 (LSB)

- 8 Now to sum up, all of you be like-minded, sympathetic, brotherly, tender-hearted, and humble in spirit;
- 9 not returning evil for evil or reviling for reviling, but giving a blessing instead, for you were called for the very purpose that you might inherit a blessing.
- 10 For,
 - "THE ONE WHO DESIRES LIFE, TO LOVE AND SEE GOOD DAYS,
 - MUST KEEP HIS TONGUE FROM EVIL AND HIS LIPS FROM SPEAKING DECEIT.
- 11 "HE MUST TURN AWAY FROM EVIL AND DO GOOD;
 - HE MUST SEEK PEACE AND PURSUE IT.
- 12 "FOR THE EYES OF THE LORD ARE
 TOWARD THE RIGHTEOUS,
 AND HIS EARS ATTEND TO THEIR PRAYER,
 BUT THE FACE OF THE LORD IS AGAINST
 THOSE WHO DO EVIL."

The person who would respond to evil attacks by returning good and turning from evil to pursue peace and willing to do good should expect a better life, more love and a good days.

After all....

"who will harm you if you become a person zealous of what is good."

In other words, for those who do good and not evil and respond to persecution and evil accusations with goodwill and peace should not expect evil in return.

The rhetorical question, expects shock that someone would suffer for doing good to others.

"Who is going to harm you if you are eager to do good?"

Based on our experience and sense of justice, the question expects a strong negative answer. The interrogative "who" (*tis*), together with the articular participle (*ho kakōsōn*, "the one who will harm"), seeks the identity of the individual who would thus react to the practice of goodness.

The verb "harm" (*kakoō*) continues the concept of evil (*kakos*, v. 12) that lies at the root of Christian suffering. The verb denotes mistreatment and implies that real damage is done through such actions. Elsewhere in the New Testament, the verb occurs only in Acts where it is used of the oppression of the Israelites by the Egyptians (7:6, 19) and of antagonism toward the church—expressed either in active persecution (12:1; 18:10) or in vicious attitudes toward believers (14:2). Here the term includes any hostile and injurious attitude or activity that produces essential damage.

The KJV reading, "followers" (*mimētai*, literally "imitators"), follows the variant reading of the Textus Receptus. That reading is not as well supported.

"A burning desire to do what is right is the sure indication that one has experienced the goodness of God. Those who love goodness are, by that very love, freed from the fascination of evil." The condition is not an occasional good deed, but being "eager" ($z\bar{e}l\bar{o}tai$, literally "zealots") of the good. The use of the noun rather than the adjective implies not merely the possession of zeal but its active embodiment in the readers' lives. It conveys "the idea of wholeheartedness and singleness of purpose." They had become "enthusiasts" for the doing of good. Moffatt paraphrases, "If you have a

passion for goodness." They aggressively seek to perform the good. Ellison shrewdly observes, "We are far more likely to suffer, if we are zealous for other people to do right, than if the zeal is applied to our own lives."

That which they zealously promoted is indicated as "good" (tou agathou, "of the good"), an articular adjective used as a noun. It stands emphatically at the head of the conditional clause, "If of the good zealots ye may have become." The emphasis strengthens the contrast between doing harm and doing good. The neuter singular sums up and presents as a unit "all the various forms of moral excellence which have been spoken of separately in vv. 10, 11." Christian goodness has a unitary character.

Some commentators have taken *tou agathou* as masculine—"the Good One"—understood as a

reference to Christ. Thus Robert Young translated, "if of Him who is good ye may become imitators," but that view is likely only if the inferior reading "imitators" is adopted, a reading that Alford suggested may have arisen as a reminiscence of 3 John 11 in the mind of some scribe.

it is still true that normally a life of active beneficence toward others disarms those who might otherwise be hostile. So understood, the emphasis is that anyone who is actually disposed to injure those who help others is acting in a perverted way.

Even today, in the violent culture that is less and less tolerant of Christianity, do we expect someone to be harmed for doing good to others. People most normally respond to kindness with kindness. Even the worst pagans and unbelievers of our culture generally respond positively to someone doing good to others.

Its like this past Christmas.... you can see example after example of people giving gifts to poor, destitute people in the name of Christ and no harm

is done, but rather praise is given.... In this last frigid cold we had, we read of others who would risk their life to help the homeless find shelter or the elderly have heat, some in a generic way others in the name of Christ.

Churches opened their doors to give a warm place for people to stay.

We see examples all year of good done to others in the name of Christ with no recourse or hatred in return.

This is Peter's point. It is abnormal, even a fallen world to expect harm in return for someone who does good for others.

Peter did not promise his readers that they would escape such suffering. The teaching of Jesus, his own experience, as well as his insight into the perversity of human nature, made him fully aware that there were exceptions. His very purpose in writing was to prepare his readers for such experiences.

The verb "suffer" (paschō) is more general in meaning than "harm" (kakoō) in verse 13; it occurs no less than twelve times in 1 Peter, more often than in any other New Testament book. It means to experience something that falls to one's lot, whether good or ill. Only in Galatians 3:4 does it refer to a pleasant experience. In all of its forty-one other occurrences, it denotes an unpleasant or hurtful experience of some kind. Though the suffering of death may be involved, generally lesser forms of suffering are denoted, such as

those mentioned by Jesus in Matthew 5:11: "when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kind of evil against you because of me." The use of the present tense indicates that such experiences may be the repeated lot of Christians.

Is there a difference here in the text of good things and righteous things
Generally—-no. But specifically— yes

The Salvation army does good things
The Mormon church can to do good things
The Catholic church does good things
Lost people can do good things.

But are they righteous things, in the sense that they are done in obedience to the Laws of God for The Glory of God and the sake of Christ Name? We would have to say NO.

Not every person can do righteousness which is pleasing to God.

The righteousness of a lost person is filthy rags in God's sight.

Biblical Righteousness is uniquely tied to Christ and the Law of God and Scripture.

⁷ Little children, let no one deceive you. He who practices righteousness is righteous, just as He is righteous.

I might be slicing the pie pieces a little thin here to make my point, I believe that this is more of what Peter has in mind.

Not just a general good deed that is done by the lost and saved.

But that which is uniquely tied to Christ, the law and the whole of Scripture.

Here is the point Im driving at.... If all Christians where guilty of just doing good deeds....i.e. helping the poor, building hospitals, delivering food to the needy, handing out gifts at Christmas, being good employees, not drinking, smoking or cursing. Being faithful to our wives and husbands, taking care of and providing for our families, going to church, tipping the waitress good at the restaurant, helping a neighbor with his broken pipe, etc.....

NO one would care. All the more power to you. The problems come when we open our mouths and start talking about the Bible and what it says and the commandments it gives and then the problems get worse, when we won't bend to the demands of the culture because of the Word of God and when we call on the world around us to repent of the sin as defined in the Bible.

We would be fine if we would just keep our mouth shut.

Think of it this way. How many times have you not said something you know the Bible says so you can keep the peace or keep your job. We know what it is

to compromise and keep our mouth shut to avoid suffering and persecution. In fact, that is what I believe that has caused such a rapid decline in our culture.....too many christians who zip their lips when it comes to the things that biblically wrong.

It was not the coming of Christ as a baby in the manger that was a problem. It was not a problem when He became a young man helping Joseph in his work. It wasn't even a problem when He shows up at the Baptism to fulfill all righteousness and be baptized.

All the problems started when as it says in Matthew **5:1–2** (NKJV)

5 And seeing the multitudes, He went up on a mountain, and when He was seated His disciples came to Him. ² Then He opened His mouth and taught them, saying:

Then, all hell broke forth, men got mad, stones where picked up to throw, demons raged, and the religious plotted to kill him.....

Jesus was the most compassionate, kind loving, caring, long-suffering, patience person who every

walked on this planet. He did more good than anyone has ever done because his good was not just temporary but eternal.

But this very good person who did good deeds, they slaughtered on a tree!! The hated Him with the vilest affecting. They lusted for his death and despised him with every fiber of their being. But it wasn't the good that he did that caused it...It was what He said.

John 10:27–33 (NKJV)

²⁷ My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me. ²⁸ And I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; neither shall anyone snatch them out of My hand. ²⁹ My Father, who has given *them* to Me, is greater than all; and no one is able to snatch *them* out of My Father's hand. ³⁰ I and *My* Father are one."

³¹ Then the Jews took up stones again to stone Him. ³² Jesus answered them, "Many good works I have shown you from My Father. For which of those works do you stone Me?"

³³ The Jews answered Him, saying, "For a good work we do not stone You, but for blasphemy, and because You, being a Man, make Yourself God."

John 5:17–18 (NKJV)

¹⁷ But Jesus answered them, "My Father has been working until now, and I have been working."

¹⁸ Therefore the Jews sought all the more to kill Him, because He not only broke the Sabbath, but also said that God was His Father, making Himself equal with God.

⁵⁹ Then they took up stones to throw at Him; but Jesus hid Himself and went out of the temple, going through the midst of them, and so passed by.

But also the reason they wanted Him dead is He confronted there hypocrisy. He internalized the Law of God. He clarified true Righteousness. He confronted their sin. He condemned them to Hell. He pronounced judgement. He exposed their lies. He rejected their teachings and destroyed their authority.

By the way, He did what most preachers won't do and what very few christians have the courage to do. He spoke up and said what God says!!!

That is why so many say well, I don't see so much persecution. The reason is that most Christians and preachers don't speak up or they are not clear enough or specific enough to cause someone to think..

It's like John MacArthur said.

"Sometimes, we don't make the gospel clear enough for the non-elect to reject it" The same is for us.

We don't make the Word of God clear enough for the world to hate us.

But if we are courageous and not compromising and are willing to suffer for Christ, you need to keep in mind

1. Remind yourself that you are Blessed

14 But even if you should suffer for righteousness' sake, *you are* blessed.

The word here translated "blessed" (*makarioi*; cf. 4:14) was used by Jesus (Matt. 5:3–11). To be "blessed" in this context does not mean to "feel delighted" but to be "highly privileged.
