The author was certainly seen as a well-respected leader to the audience, whose comments were viewed as a loving rebuke. If you were led to confront a fellow Christian about ongoing spiritual immaturity, how would you balance truth with love? Read Colossians 3:12-17 and form a list of key points that you would need to keep in mind.
- **2.** Read 1 Corinthians 3:1-3? What does Paul call this church out for, and what are some consequences of their spiritual state?
- 3. Paul also has to rebuke the same people in 1 Corinthians 5.
 - a. What are they rebuked for?
 - b. Could their acceptance of this sinner and even boastful acceptance of him, be linked to their state of being spiritual babies?
 - c. How might the situation in 1 Corinthians 3 & 5 relate to Hebrews 5:13-14?
- **4.** Have you ever noticed that a spiritually immature person or a spiritually immature church is not discerning about how to practically live out the Christian life and walk in righteousness? Feel free to discuss.
- 5. Have you seen an example of this in your own life, of how a lack of feeding on solid food caused you spiritual immaturity and a lack of discernment? Each person take a moment to reflect on your life, and perhaps a couple of people would not mind sharing an example from their past.
- 6. The church of Corinth and the Hebrews seemed to be quite content with their spiritual immaturity. What are some benefits of a church having a multitude of spiritually mature believers? List three.
