Their Delayed Acquisition

13a

Meaning of dying in faith. Rev 14:13. Not in frustration, futility, failure.

Hymn: "My Faith Has Found a Resting-Place."

2. Their Distant Affection 13b Note their courageous confession. See Heb 11:25-27.

> 3. Their Decisive Admission

A very bold confession. Mt 7:23; 10:32; 1 Jn 1:9. Recall Gen 23:3, 17-20; 25:7-10. Citizens of heaven are sojourners and exiles on earth. 1 Pe 1:1

Their Defiant Acceptance

Defiance = make it clear, manifest. Intense yearning of the heart. Similar posture, since in Heb 13:14. Customary, consistent content of conversation.

The eschatological perspective presses into the currency of their lives with a directing, defining dominance.

Are we driven by such a perspective? If not why not? What are our obstacles?

B. BY AFFIRMING THEIR TOTAL COMMITMENT

15, 16A

The Rejected Possibilities

Return to what? See Josh 24:2. Recall Gen 24:1-7. The proof, persistence, and "purification" of faith. The desire to return contradicts the nature, etc. faith.

It refuses all possibilities and pretensions to personal preferences that diminish, distract, deter, etc., our faith.

It rejects all temptations to return to our former conditions, to the way we were. No nostalgia.

Christian life = a cruciform life, Lk 9:23-26; 14:25-27. Concept, principle, meaning, etc., of a disciple of Christ is one who rejects all pretensions to, desires for, pursuits of personal glory and glamour; comforts and conveniences:

What in the world do we have to do with the world?

2. The Reaffirmed Priority
A continuous, insistent desire, forged on the eschatological promise.

Cf. 1 Tim 3:1. The concentration, strength, and passion of their search.

The nature of this home is developed in Heb 12:22-24; 13:14.

An ardent focus and accepted fact. This world is not our home! Clear, compelling, candid conviction.

The direction of faith. The telos of biblical eschatology = living with God in heaven, in the city that he builds. From Gen to Rev. We're living in the tension between the already and the not yet.
