- B. For married Christians considering divorce (vss. 10-11)
 - 1. Paul evokes Jesus' teaching (Mark 10:2-12)
 - a. Ideas on divorce: Hillel, Shammai, and Genesis 2:24
 - 2. Do not divorce ... but if you do ...
 - a. Paul was a realist divorce will happen in the church
 - b. Reconciliation of a broken Christian marriage speaks volumes to a broken world that needs to be reconciled to God

C. For Christians Married to Unbelievers (vss. 12-16)

- 1. The believing spouse is not to initiate a divorce (vss 12-13)
- 2. Any divorce is only to be initiated by the unbelieving partner and the believing spouse should not resist (v. 15)
- 3. A **promise** for the "mixed marriage" household (v. 14)
 - a. A different conclusion than his Pharisaic "separatist" tradition
 - b. Holiness is contagious (Rom 11:16)
- 4. A hope for the "mixed marriage" household (v. 16, 1 Pet 3:1-2)
 - a. How different this is from selfish reasons for getting divorced
 - b. Not a guarantee, but a hope in a powerful transforming Gospel
- 5. God has called us to peace
 - a. It is a very difficult challenge to live with an unbeliever, but it is the better way.
 - b. This has nothing to do with remarriage.
- 6. The balance between the "already" and the "not yet"

III. The Guiding Principle behind Paul's advice on Marriage (vss 17-24)

- A. Believers should remain in the state they are in when they were saved
 - 1. Illustrative analogy 1: circumsized/uncircumsized (vss 18-19)
 - a. Circumcision doesn't matter!!! How can it be?
 - b. We have a primary and secondary citizenship
 - c. How Paul viewed works and the commandment
 - 2. Illustrative analogy 2: slave/free (vss. 21-23)
 - a. Slaves should not seek freedom!!!!! How can it be?
 - b. Understanding slavery in First Century Rome
 - c. Our identity as Christians is found in Christ
 - d. Relax and remain with God wherever you find yourself
 - 3. The Gospel erases human markers of identity (Gal 3:27-28)
- B. The world in its present form is passing away (1 Cor 7:31)
 - 1. So, bloom where you are planted ...
 - 2. We are not here to create a utopian world for ourselves
