

THE AUTHOR OF PSALM 71

We don't know who wrote this psalm, though there's good reason to assume it was King David.

Four things we do know for sure about the author:

- 1. He's old.
- 2. He's weak & frail.
- 3. He's being hunted, threatened, & harassed.
- 4. He's overflowing with faith, joy, & purpose.

God is faithful to the old and weak. He will never abandon those who trust in him.

- 1. Keep Trusting. In your present crisis, remember how God has cared for you in years past, and continue trusting everything to him. (1-13)
 - Cry out to God for help.
 - Believe God's power to save.
 - Recall God's faithfulness in your life.
 - Never stop praising God—even when life hurts.

- 2. Keep Testifying. In your old age, raise up those coming after you to trust everything to God, and let your proven trust give way to endless praise. (14-24)
 - Brag about your God.
 - Get busy in the lives of the next generation.
