<u>I.</u> <u>Introduction: This is one of the most sordid chapters in the Bible.</u>

II. Amnon rapes his half sister Tamar. 13:1-19

- A. Amnon is sick with "love". v. 1-2
 - 1. Tamar is very beautiful (and pure). v. 1a,18a 14:25 I Kings 1:6 I Sam. 14:12
 - 2. Amnon appears to desire Tamar only for her outward appearance. v. 1b
 - 3. Amnon's feelings were so strong that he was affected physically and emotionally (depression). v. 2 Ps. 32:3-4 Gen. 4:5 Jonah 4 I Kings 21:4
 - 4. Why can't he do anything to her? v. 2b Lev. 18:9,11
 - 5. Amnon tragically follows in his father's footsteps.
 - a. He is attracted by a woman who is beautiful, but off limits. 11:2-3 Mt. 5:28
 - b. Rather than fleeing from temptation, he indulges his desires (lusts, fantasies) which leads to further sin. 11:4a Js. 1:14-15 Job 31:1 II Tim. 2:22
 - c. His sin has deadly consequences. 11:15ff 12:10ff Js. 1:15
 - 6. Amnon is also acting like Shechem who raped Jacob's daughter Dinah. Ge. 34:2ff
- B. Cousin Jonadab hatches a clever, but evil plot. v. 3-5 I Ki. 21:5ff
 - 1. Some people have worldly wisdom, but use it for evil. v. 3 Gen. 3:1 I Ki. 21:5ff Js. 3:15 I Co. 2:6
 - 2. Jonadab affirms Amnon's right to be happy and to have whatever he desires. v. 4a
 - 3. What should Jonadab have said when he heard what Amnon wanted? Pr. 27:5
 - 4. Jonadab's plot is very shrewd getting Amnon alone with Tamar by taking advantage of the sympathy, goodness and trust of others. v. 5
- C. Amnon carries out Jonadab's plot and violates his half sister. v. 6-14
 - 1. The plan works flawlessly. v. 6-10
 - 2. Amnon propositions his half sister. v. 11 Gen. 39:12
 - 3. Tamar refuses and resists (4 reasons). v. 12-13 Ge. 34:7 Judg. 20:5-6 Dt. 22:21
 - 4. Amnon forcibly rapes Tamar. v. 14 Gen. 34:2
- D. Amnon hatefully rejects Tamar. v. 15-19
 - 1. At this point the only honorable thing for Amnon to do would be to marry Tamar. Ex. 22:16-17 Dt. 22:28-29
 - 2. Why does he hate her? Really this hatred is not a new development.
 - 3. Amon, like his father David, abuses his power to harm others. 11:4,6,14ff
 - 4. Tamar cries out in her desolation. v. 19 Gen. 37:3 Dt. 22:24
 - 5. More bad things are about to happen as a result of this deplorable sin. v. 20ff

III. Learn from this tragedy.

- A. Learn from Amnon who had passion without love (hormones without heart).
 - 1. Strong feelings, which some call love, often are no more than infatuation or lust.
 - 2. It is not necessarily wrong to feel attracted to someone. v. 1
 - 3. Sometimes a felt attraction is wrong and must be resisted. v. 1 Ga. 5:23 Ro. 13:14
 - 4. Don't make a desired relationship into an idol something you can't live without. God alone will satisfy your soul. v. 2 Col. 3:5 Isa. 55:1-2 Phil. 4:11 Jer. 17:5-8
 - 5. Often what people call love is hateful lust. v. 15
 - 6. Our culture has radically pursued "sexual liberty."
 - 7. Sin reaps terrible consequences. v. 19ff Pr. 5:11,10ff 6:24ff Heb. 13:4b
 - 8. Don't assume that you are not vulnerable to temptation. I Co. 10:12

- B. Learn from examining Jonadab who had shrewdness without principle. v. 3-5
 - 1. Be careful in choosing your friends and companions. I Co. 15:33 Ps. 1:1 Pr. 13:20
 - 2. Those who appear to be the most clever (worldly wise) are the most dangerous.
 - 3. What kind of friend are you? Pr. 27:5-6,9 I Sam. 18:1ff
- C. Learn from Tamar who had purity without protection.
 - 1. Outward beauty can be a mixed blessing. Pr. 31:30
 - a. Outward beauty may attract the wrong attention as people want you because of your appearance rather than loving you for who you really are inwardly.
 - b. Some people learn how to use their good looks to manipulate others. 14:25ff
 - 2. Tamar exemplifies the inner beauty and character of a godly woman.
 - a. She honors her father. v. 7-8
 - b. She is willing to work with her hands. v. 9 Pr. 31:13
 - c. She shows mercy to others. v. 10
 - d. She fears God and is morally pure. v. 12-13.
 - e. She is modest. v. 18
 - 3. Tamar instructs you how to deal with sexual temptation.
 - a. Fornication is deplorable because it violates God's holy law. v. 12
 - b. Sexual sin harms others reproach. v. 13a
 - c. Sexual sin harms you -- a wicked fool.
 - d. Fulfill your desires honorably by pursuing a godly marriage. v. 13c Heb. 13:5
- D. Learn from David.
 - 1. Your sin will influence your children. 12:10ff
 - 2. Fathers have a special responsibility to protect their daughters (and sons).

IV. Concluding applications: Where can hope be found in such a sad passage?

- A. God has taught us a much better way to find true romantic love -- in marriage. Gen. 2:18-25 Eph. 5:22-33 I Co. 13:4ff
 - 1. Love delights in the person more than the package which means you should get to know the person well before giving up your heart and committing yourself.
 - 2. True love seeks what is best for the beloved. I Co. 13:4-7 Eph. 5:25ff Gen. 2:18
 - 3. God has given marriage as a blessing to humanity for the enjoyment of loving romance and sex. Gen. 2:24 Prov. 5:15-19 Heb. 13:4a
- B. God is working out His plan. 12:10ff Ex. 20:5
- C. God is the protector and comforter of the oppressed (and the judge of oppressors). Ps. 68:5 146:9 Pr. 31:9
- D. Christ our bridegroom has loved us with a sacrificial purifying love. Eph. 5:25ff I Jo. 4:10 John 3:16 Ps. 22:6 Isa. 53:7
- E. Christ has set His people free from bondage to sinful desires. Ti. 3:3-4 Ro. 6:1ff Ezek. 18
