Romans 6:15-23

Introduction:

- 6:1 Should a believer sin so that grace may abound?
6:2-14 No, because a believer has a new identity
6:15 Should a believer sin because he is under grace?
6:16-23 No, because a believer has a new master

Discussion Points:

1. Paul says that believers are no longer under the law, but instead, are under grace. In what ways could a believer misunderstand this statement? How should a believer understand this?
2. Verses 17-18 teach that we used to be slaves to sin, but God set us free from our old master and made himself our new master. What would you say to a believer who still feels enslaved to sin?
3. There are many times when we fail to live in accordance with our change of master. What are we failing to know or believe when this happens?
4. We were reminded of our cheap wages and harsh working conditions as a slave to sin. Why is it good for us to be reminded of that?
5. What has God been doing in your life to remind you that He is a gracious and kind master?
