THANK GOD FOR THE PLAGUE

Matthew 24:7-8; Ephesians 5:20

INTRODUCTION

- The coronavirus has turned the world upside-down
- The greatest impact has not been the disease itself, but the response of governments to it – closing borders, halting travel, rationing purchases, closing businesses, banning gatherings, and effectively crippling economies
- Many in the government and media are sensationalising and scaremongering as it suits their agenda to create fear in the population
- Multitudes are now living in fear, panic and dread of what may happen to them
- In their fear, some are finding comfort in godless songs such as "Imagine" and "You'll Never Walk Alone"
- But while the children of this world have their "hearts failing them for fear" (Luke 21:26), the children of God have been given another spirit, not "the spirit of fear; but of power, and of love, and of a sound mind." (2 Timothy 1:7)
- Rather than be *fearful*, we can be *thankful* for the coronavirus (Ephesians 5:20; 1 Thessalonians 5:18)
- While the world sings the song of fools (Ecclesiastes 7:5), the Christian sings songs of praise and thanksgiving to God continually:

Through all the changing scenes of life, In trouble and in joy, The praises of my God shall still My heart and tongue employ.

- One of the marks of true faith is a thankful heart, not only in times of prosperity, but particularly in times of trial
- Job, having lost all his wealth, and all of his ten children, responded by worshipping God and blessing his name (Job 1:20-22)

Consider three reasons we can be thankful unto God for the plague:

I. BE THANKFUL THAT GOD HAS DOMINION OVER THE PLAGUE

- A. The earthly source of the plague
 - 1. The virus is thought to have originated in China
 - 2. If we look back further such diseases originated with the fall of man and the curse that came upon the creation (Genesis 3; Romans 5:12; 8:22)
- B. The divine source of the plague
 - 1. God, in his almighty providence, preserves and governs his creation (Psalm 103:19)
 - 2. He "worketh all things after the counsel of his own will" (Ephesians 1:11)
 - 3. He sends both good and evil upon man, as he sees fit
 - a. "Shall we receive good at the hand of God, and shall we not receive evil?" (Job 2:10)
 - b. "I know, O LORD, that thy judgments are right, and that thou in faithfulness hast afflicted me." (Psalm 119:75)
 - c. "I form the light, and create darkness: I make peace, and create evil: I the LORD do all these things." (Isaiah 45:7)

- i. Note that the "evil" in this verse is not *moral* evil, but the opposite of peace, such as judgments, plagues, pestilence, war, etc.
- 4. Everything God does is just, holy and good (Psalm 145:17)
- 5. His ways are not our ways, and his ways are past finding out we must not presume to think we can fathom his unsearchable judgments (Isaiah 55:8-9; Deuteronomy 29:29; Romans 11:33-36)
- 6. God is said in Scripture to directly send *pestilence* upon man twenty-five times, and *plagues* twenty-three times
- 7. God has been wonderfully merciful in sending a virus upon the world, instead of immediately raining fire upon the world and burning mankind up, as we all deserve

II. BE THANKFUL THAT GOOD WILL DEVELOP FROM THE PLAGUE

- A. The forces of darkness are using the plague for their wicked designs
 - Globalist agencies and governments are using the crisis to remove liberties, seize power, and hasten their New World Order
 - a. The World Health Organisation has urged the world to stop using cash for transactions
 - b. The Hong Kong government is forcing new arrivals to wear tracking wristbands/bracelets that will notify authorities if they leave home, or try to remove it
 - c. The USA, the President has enacted the "Defence Production Act", which gives the government power to force private companies to produce goods or render services for the government

- 2. It is important to remember what their ultimate objective is: centrally controlled society, politically, economically
 - a. The end of the family unit, where the state owns your children
 - b. The end of private property; the end of small/family business, and even medium-sized business, so that everything is controlled by multinational corporations
 - c. The end of national democracies, and the formation of a global technocracy

B. Yet there are positive results from the crisis

- 1. A realisation of the frailty of man (Psalm 39:4)
 - a. Many people live under the illusion that they are indestructible
 - b. Yet our lives can be cut short by something so small that it cannot be seen by the naked eye

2. A removal of trust in riches

- a. Prosperity is an obstacle to faith in God (Deuteronomy 8:10-17; 2 Chronicles 26:16; Psalm 30:6; Matthew 19:16-24)
- b. Many now see that riches are "deceitful" (Matthew 13:22) and "uncertain" (1 Timothy 6:17)
- c. Many now see the folly of trusting in riches that "make themselves wings", and "fly away" (Proverbs 23:5)
- 3. The closure of borders, and nations asserting their sovereignty
 - a. The distinct nation-state is sanctioned by God (see Genesis 10)

- Globalism is rebellion against God (Genesis 11), and is an integral element of the final world kingdom under antichrist (Revelation 13)
- 4. Many children are being taken from schools to be taught by their parents at home
 - a. Parents, particularly fathers, are entrusted with the instructing of their children (Ephesians 6:4)
 - b. Children are likely to become infected at school
 - i. Humanism
 - ii. Evolutionism
 - iii. Socialism
 - iv. Immorality
 - v. Sodomy
 - vi. Transgenderism
 - vii. Vulgarity
- 5. Concern for the elderly
 - a. The condition of a society may be gauged by the way they treat their young and aged
 - Darwinian evolutionists are happy with the coronavirus as it "naturally rejects" and kills the elderly and unhealthy, who should be eliminated for the good of the herd
 - c. The Bible commands us to honour the grey head (Leviticus 19:32)

- 6. The closure of pubs and clubs with their drunkenness and immorality (Habakkuk 2:15)
- 7. The crippling of the idol of professional sports (Exodus 20:3)
- 8. Postponement of transgender surgeries
- 9. Stockpiling of guns and ammunition (Luke 22:36)
- C. Affliction is the means that God often employs to turn people to himself
 - 1. The ungodly, like the Prodigal, are not ready to turn to God until they "begin to be in want" (Luke 15:14)
 - 2. God uses affliction in the life of the believer
 - a. For chastening (Hebrews 12:5-11; Psalm 119:67)
 - b. For our perfection (Romans 5:3-5; James 1:3-4)
 - c. As unpleasant as these afflictions are, we know that they work together for our good (Romans 8:28)

III. BE THANKFUL THAT GOD WILL DELIVER FROM THE PLAGUE

- A. God promises protection and deliverance to his people (Psalm 34:19; 2 Peter 2:9; 2 Corinthians 1:8-10)
- B. Christians are *not* promised to be spared from suffering, sickness or death from disease (see 2 Corinthians 12:7-10)
 - Paul was confident that "the Lord shall deliver me from every evil work, and will preserve me unto his heavenly kingdom" (2 Timothy 4:18)
 - 2. A short time after writing those words, Paul was beheaded for the name of Christ
 - 3. His deliverance was not from death, but through death

- Some have misused scriptures like Psalm 91 to teach that believers will not become infected with the virus (Psalm 91:3-9)
- C. The ultimate deliverance for the Christian is *eternal* deliverance beyond this life and world
 - 1. Death to the believer is an entrance to the presence of the Lord Jesus Christ (2 Corinthians 5:8)
 - 2. It is *then* we shall be freed from all sickness, pain and evil for all eternity (Revelation 21:3-4)
- D. Hence we should act with wisdom regarding the present crisis
 - 1. We must be careful not to act presumptuously and tempt God (Matthew 4:5-7)
 - 2. "A prudent man foreseeth the evil, and hideth himself: but the simple pass on, and are punished." (Proverbs 22:3; cf. 28:1)

CONCLUSION

- 1. As serious as this current plague is, there have been far more serious plagues in world history
- 2. The Spanish flu of 1918-1919 killed 50-100 million people worldwide, which was between 3-5% of the world's population
- 3. When affliction comes, we have a choice as to how we respond either *curse* God (Job 2:9), or *trust* God (Job 13:15)
- 4. As we see the fabric of society fracturing around us, it is an opportunity to rebuild
- 5. For Satan's people, an opportunity to rebuild upon a satanic, humanist, globalist foundation

- 6. For God's people, an opportunity to rebuild society upon a foundation of the gospel of Jesus Christ
- 7. This plague is having a serious and tragic impact on many people, physically, emotionally and financially, and our hearts go out to them
- 8. But it is vital we view this from an eternal perspective
- 9. In 100 billion years from now people will not be thinking about the coronavirus of 2020
- 10. If there is any thought of this life in eternity, it will be, "What did I do with Jesus? Did I believe in him, to the saving of my soul? Did I reject him, to my eternal damnation?"
- 11. The greatest plague comes not from without, but from within the plague of the heart (1 Kings 8:38)
- 12. It matters little if a person escapes the present plague, only to perish in hell for eternity (Matthew 16:26)
- 13. For those who are in Christ, there is nothing, including the plague, that can separate us from the love of Christ (Romans 8:35-39)

Fear him, ye saints, and you will then Have nothing else to fear; Make you his service your delight, Your wants shall be his care.
