Matthew 27:27-31

JESUS REPROACHED BY THE SOLDIERS

- I. The scourging.
 - A. Jesus was scourged: being stripped, hands tied around a pole, beaten with a whip with lead in tips.
 - B. This was done by the on-duty Roman soldiers, who purposely gathered all those who were off-duty, to join them in the sport.
 - C. For the soldiers it was an opportunity for sport with physical torture and bodily hurt.
- II. Worse than the physical abuse was the cruel verbal mocking salutes, "Hail, King of the Jews!
 - A. They gave Jesus the appearance of a king: a purple robe, a crown and a scepter.
 - B. The soldiers, representing the kingdom of this world, despise Christ's kingship, considering it folly and entirely worthless.
 - C. This reproach hit deeply because Jesus was/is really King (Ps. 2:6-8).
 - 1. He is King, but His kingdom is spiritual (not earthly), and He obtains it only by righteousness.
 - 2. But this kind of king and kingdom means nothing to the soldiers who recognize only earthly, physical might.
- III. King Jesus bore the reproach, giving His back to them, testifying in this way that He is the Servant of Jehovah.
 - A. First, no one could have heaped this reproach on Him without His will.
 - B. Second, see that His suffering is voluntary, completely an act of His will, arising out of love and obedience to His Father.
 - 1. He bears reproach as the Servant of Jehovah, and for the sake of God and God's righteousness.
 - 2. This is a mighty royal deed!
 - C. This condemns the world in the judgment of God.
 - D. Finally, Christ bore the reproach because He put all His confidence in the Father.
- IV. Jesus endured the suffering, despising the shame in order that we might be delivered from eternal torments.
