Call to Worship

This psalm contains several allusions to the tabernacle/Temple, and the holiness of God, who carries out His exalted reign in the midst of His people, from His throne replicated in the Most Holy Place.

Psalm 99 ESV

¹ The LORD reigns; let the peoples tremble! He sits enthroned upon the cherubim; let the earth quake!
2 The LORD is great in Zion;
he is exalted over all the peoples.
³ Let them praise your great and awesome name!
Holy is he!
⁴ The King in his might loves justice.
You have established equity;
you have executed justice
and righteousness in Jacob.
⁵ Exalt the LORD our God;
worship at his footstool!
Holy is he!
⁶ Moses and Aaron were among his priests,
Samuel also was among those who called upon his name.
They called to the LORD, and he answered them.
⁷ In the pillar of the cloud he spoke to them;
they kept his testimonies and the statute that he gave them.
⁸ O LORD our God, you answered them;
you were a forgiving God to them,
but an avenger of their wrongdoings.
⁹ Exalt the LORD our God,
and worship at his holy mountain;
for the LORD our God is holy!

We Acknowledge Our Sin

* Reading from the Law

These passages, taken together, demonstrate the multi-faceted theology behind the phrase "light of the world." Alternatively, Israel, Christ, and Christian believers are all given this designation, showing that Christ is the true Israel, but also that those who are His people in both Old and New Testaments have a responsibility to reflect that light to the world.

Isaiah 42:5-7; Isaiah 49:1-6ESV

⁵ Thus says God, the LORD,
who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what comes from it,
 who spread out the earth and what comes from it, who gives breath to the people on it and spirit to those who walk in it: ⁶ "I am the LORD; I have called you in righteousness; I will take you by the hand and keep you; I will give you as a covenant for the people, a light for the nations, ⁷ to open the eyes that are blind, to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon,
from the prison those who sit in darkness.
 ^{49:1} Listen to me, O coastlands, and give attention, you peoples from afar. The LORD called me from the womb, from the body of my mother he named my name. ² He made my mouth like a sharp sword; in the shadow of his hand he hid me; he made me a polished arrow; in his quiver he hid me away. ³ And he said to me, "You are my servant, Israel, in whom I will be glorified."

⁴ But I said, "I have labored in vain;

I have spent my strength for nothing and vanity;

yet surely my right is with the LORD,

and my recompense with my God."

⁵ And now the LORD says,

he who formed me from the womb to be his servant, to bring Jacob back to him;

and that Israel might be gathered to him-

for I am honored in the eyes of the LORD,

and my God has become my strength—

⁶ he says:

"It is too light a thing that you should be my servant to raise up the tribes of Jacob

and to bring back the preserved of Israel;

I will make you as a light for the nations,

that my salvation may reach to the end of the earth."

John 1:1-5;8:12ESV

In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. ² He was in the beginning with God. ³ All things were made through him, and without him was not any thing made that was made. ⁴ In him was life, and the life was the light of men. ⁵ The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it.

^{8:12} Again Jesus spoke to them, saying, "I am the light of the world. Whoever follows me will not walk in darkness, but will have the light of life."

Matthew 5:14-16 ESV

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden.¹⁵ Nor do people light a lamp and put it under a basket, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house.¹⁶ In the same way, let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven.

Silent Confession of Sin

Corporate Confession of Sin

This psalm pictures, whether it alludes to it or not, the very thing that Israel did at the tabernacle and later at the Temple, when they offered sacrifices through the priests, looking to (though not directly at) the ark in the Most Holy Place, where God's throne in heaven was replicated above the cherubim.

Assurance of Pardoning Grace

By God's grace in the gospel, we have been given a knowledge of God in Christ, which enables us to believe in Him and thus be saved through our reception of all of God's covenant promises.

2 Corinthians 4:6 ESV

For God, who said, "Let light shine out of darkness," has shone in our hearts to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Leader: This is the gospel.

The Apostles' Creed

Distribution of Elements

Because we believe that wine was used in the Last Supper and is thus more in accord with the fullness of symbolism intended by God in the Lord's Supper, we offer and encourage wine for those who take part in Communion. For those with conscientious convictions against the use of wine, however, we offer grape juice, which is contained in the inner circle of the communion trays. The cups containing wine are in the outer circles.
