Morning Worship Service:

Philippians 1:21-26

To Be or Not to Be—that is NOT God's Question

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2. Paul's Dilemma: Stay or Depart to be with Christ (22-24)

3. Paul's Preference (25-26)

Application:

- 1. The need to put our own wishes aside
- 2. The need to see God glorified in everything
- 3. The need to serve where God puts us

CONCLUSION: Paul, in this passage, shows the Philippian church that although it may be more desirable to depart for heaven, he is willing, as their partner, to share in their sufferings, see them grow, and produce true spiritual fruit in their lives. Why? Because we follow Christ, who did the same for us: forsaking the glory of heaven, living for us, living among with us, then suffering and dying for us; showing us an example to follow.

Romans 6:5-11; 8:12-17

¹⁵ For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we shall certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. ⁶ We know that our old self was crucified with him in order that the body of sin might be brought to nothing, so that we would no longer be enslaved to sin. ⁷ For one who has died has been set free from sin. ⁸ Now if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him. ⁹ We know that Christ, being raised from the dead, will never die again; death no longer has dominion over him. ¹⁰ For the death he died he died to sin, once for all, but the life he lives he lives to God. ¹¹ So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin and alive to God in Christ Jesus. ...

¹² So then, brothers, we are debtors, not to the flesh, to live according to the flesh. ¹³ For if you live according to the flesh you will die, but if by the Spirit you put to death the deeds of the body, you will live. ¹⁴ For all who are led by the Spirit of God are sons of God. ¹⁵ For you did not receive the spirit of slavery to fall back into fear, but *you have received the Spirit of adoption as sons*, by whom we cry, "Abba! Father!" ¹⁶ The Spirit himself bears witness with our spirit that we are children of God, ¹⁷ and if children, then heirs—*heirs of God and fellow heirs with Christ*, provided we *suffer with him* in order that we may also be glorified with him.

Second Timothy 3:10-17

¹⁰ You, however, have followed my teaching, my conduct, my aim in life, my faith, my patience, my love, my steadfastness, ¹¹ my persecutions and sufferings that happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium, and at Lystra—which persecutions I endured; yet from them all the Lord rescued me. ¹² Indeed, *all who desire to live a godly life in Christ Jesus will be persecuted*, ¹³ while evil people and impostors will go on from bad to worse, deceiving and being deceived. ¹⁴ But as for you, *continue in what you have learned and have firmly believed*, knowing from whom you learned it ¹⁵ and how from childhood you have been acquainted with the sacred writings, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. ¹⁶ All Scripture is breathed out by God and profitable for teaching, for reproof, for correction, and for training in righteousness, ¹⁷ that the man of God may be complete, equipped for every good work.

Hebrews 11:32-40

32 And what shall I say? For time would fail tell. more to me of Gideon, Barak, Samson, Jephthah, of David and Samuel and the prophets—³³ who through faith conquered kingdoms, enforced justice, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions, ³⁴ quenched the power of fire, escaped the edge of the sword, were made strong out of weakness, became mighty in war, put foreign armies to flight. 35 Women received back their dead by resurrection. Some were tortured, refusing to accept release, so that they might rise again to a better life. 36 Others suffered mocking and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment. 37 They were stoned, they were sawn in two, they were killed with the sword. They went about in skins of sheep and goats, destitute, afflicted, mistreated—38 of whom the world was not worthy—wandering about in deserts and mountains, and in dens and caves of the earth.

³⁹ And all these, though commended through their faith, did not receive what was promised, ⁴⁰ since God had provided something better for us, that apart from us they should not be made perfect.

Taking Gathered Worship Home

Self-preservation is so strong in us that if our lives are threatened our fight or flight instinct is automatic. But in Christ we have a different impulse: self-sacrifice. Just as *Christ came to give His life for ours*, Paul considers the Philippians' need for him above his own preferences. So too should we consider others rather than just ourselves.

Please use the devotional material below each day this week to praise Christ. Ask Jesus to teach us His ways that we may walk in them to accomplish His purposes.

Sunday Morning

READ Philippians 1:21-26; Romans 6:1-14; 8:12-17; Second Timothy 3:10-17; Hebrews 11:32-40. DISCUSS How did Paul evaluate his life or death options? How does the truth of the resurrection make that impossible for Paul, given his hope in Jesus? What are fruitful labors? What is progress and joy in the faith? PRAY "Lord Christ, help us to see life and death according to Your Word."

Sunday Evening

There will be no Young Adults' Fellowship tonight.

Monday

READ **Philippians 1:21-26**; **Romans 6:1-4**. DISCUSS What does it mean to be baptized into Christ Jesus? How does Christ's resurrection apply to us? Why? MEDITATE on **Romans 6:8**. PRAY, "Lord Jesus, You have identified with us so that we might be in You. Teach us how to live that out in our daily lives."

Tuesday

READ Philippians 1:21-26; Romans 6:5-11; 8:12-17. DISCUSS What is the significance of our being united with Christ? How does that affect our life? Our death? Why? What does it mean to live according to the flesh? What's the alternative? MEDITATE on Romans 6:8. PRAY, "Lord, teach us how to live as members of Your holy family. We want to be like You and honor Your name."

Wednesday

READ Philippians 1:21-26; Romans 6:12-14; Second Timothy 3:10-17. DISCUSS, What does it mean to "present your members to sin as instruments for unrighteousness" and how do we stop doing it? How can we live as those under grace? MEDITATE on Romans 6:8. PRAY, "Lord, we want to present our members as instruments of righteousness. Help us!"

Thursday Happy Birthday, Karis!

READ Philippians 1:21-26; Romans 6:1-14; Hebrews 11:32-40. DISCUSS What was the better life they were seeking in v. 35? How is that provided in the resurrection? MEDITATE on Romans 6:8. PRAY, Lord, we long to be made new in the power of the resurrection. Help us to live in resurrection life."

Friday

READ Philippians 1:21-26; Romans 6:1-14; 8:12-17; Second Timothy 3:10-17; Hebrews 11:32-40. DISCUSS, How has God been teaching you from these passages this week? DELIGHT in Christ, knowing that we will be like Him one day! MEDITATE on Romans 6:8. PRAY for unity and joyful care for one another at FCCW.

Saturday

PREPARE today for the worship service tomorrow which is available both in-person and via live-stream. READ Philippians 1:1-30; Psalm 13:1-6. Invite others to join you tomorrow for the service. Ask Jesus to gather us together joyfully to praise Him.
