- -Purpose: to encourage young Timothy and give him the instruction he needed to effectively supervise church life as an apostolic representative (3:14, 15)

-Corporate Prayer (2:1-8)

-Role of Women in the Church (2:9-15)

-Leadership in the Church (3:1-13)

-Money and Wealth (6:3-19)

IV. Christ in 1 Timothy

-Savior of sinners (1:15); the one Mediator between God and men (2:5, 6); God manifested in the flesh (3:16); the One who was patient and merciful to Paul in saving him, strengthening him, and setting him apart to apostleship (1:1, 12, 15, 16); the Source of the believer's faith, hope, and love (1:1, 14); the One who is coming again (6:14)

V. Practical Lessons in 1 Timothy

- 1) Paul's first letter to Timothy highlights the great importance of ecclesiology (doctrine of the church) (3:14, 15).
- 2) Paul's first letter to Timothy assumes the foundational importance of the gospel (1:12-16).
