Scripture: Exodus 20:1-17 & Luke 16:19-31

Intro: If only one would rise from the dead ... I would believe (Luke 16:29)

Five Questions in Jesus' Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus

I. Is your wealth corrupting you? (19-21)

- A. The Bible does not condemn material possessions
 - 1. Increase of possessions thru honest trade/work is God's promise (Prov 10:4; 12:24)
 - 2. Yet each increase also increases the temptation in riches (1 Tim. 6:9)
- B. Failing to use our riches to enrich the poor is *criminal* (James 5:1-6)
 - 1. Wickedness is also to *neglect the poor* (Job 24:7-10; Is. 58:5-12)
 - 2. Godliness is also to *serve the needy* (Job 29:12-17)

II. Are you defining blessedness as Jesus defines it? (vs. 20-22)

- A. The rich man defined his blessedness wrong
 - 1. He was mastered by the material and ignored the spiritual
- B. By outward standards Lazarus was to be pitied
 - 1. His circumstances contrasted with is name
 - 2. His death brought him security and comfort of heaven (vs. 22)
- C. Challenge: How would you finish, "I will be blessed when ...?

III Are you ready to die and meet your Maker?

- A. Death comes to all and every kind of people (Ps. 49)
- B. Death is not the "end but merely the beginning" of heaven or hell (vs. 22)
- C. Are u ready to meet your Maker now? (Eccl. 12:1; Ps. 2:11-12)

IV. Do you actually believe in hell?

- A. Clearly, rich man did not quite believe it (vs. 28)
 - 1. Hell is *the total separation from God sealed forever* (vs. 26) and a place of torment (vs. 23-24)
 - 2. In hell, one word will never cease to embitter: *Remember* (vs. 25)
 - 3. Hell does not bring an ounce of repentance
 - a. his apparent concern for his brothers is not compassion (vs. 28)
 - b. his implied argument is a smoke-screen excuse (vs. 30)
- B. Take a deep and close look at this rich man's spiritual portrait: is he you?

V. Are you a spiritual beggar like Lazarus?

- A. Lazarus remained a beggar, yet he was brought to heaven!
 - 1. This does not teach that the (economic) poor are heaven-bound
 - 2. This illustrates the life of grace: we become and remain beggars
- B. Are we such spiritual beggars like Lazarus was a beggar?
 - 1. Lazarus felt his sores, needs and rags
 - 2. Lazarus felt his helplessness and hopelessness in his condition
 - 3. Lazarus daily laid at the 'rich man's door'
- C. God declares: The LORD takes pleasure in them that fear him, in those that hope in His mercy
 - 1. What is to fear Him?
 - 2. What is it to hope in His mercy?
 - 3. What does it mean that the LORD takes pleasure in such?

Being confident of this very thing, that He which hath begun a good work in you will perform it until the day of Jesus Christ.
