### PETER'S MAIN POINT

Those who have been reconciled to God through faith in Jesus's death are summoned to endure unjust suffering, following Jesus's example in death.

# CHRISTIAN, ENDURE UNJUST SUFFERING (1 PETER 2:21–25)

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According to Peter, the crucifixion of Jesus was:

- a. Penal—paying the legal penalty of lawbreakers
- b. Substitutionary—not for himself but in our place
- c. Expiatory—effectively cleansing us and reconciling us to God

# CHRISTIAN, ENDURE UNJUST SUFFERING (1 PETER 2:21–25)

- 1. Peter reminds every Christian that the Messiah suffered as your substitute (verses 24–25).
- 2. Peter reminds every Christian that the Messiah suffered as your example (verses 21–23).
