






What is the second law of thermodynamics?</i></p> <p><b>First Law of Thermodynamics</b> The conservation of mass and energy.</p> <p><b>Second Law of Thermodynamics</b> Everything moves from order to disorder.</p> <p><b>Modern Physics</b> <i>Quantum Physics</i> – energy is released in “packets” Example: A <i>photon</i> is a “packet” of light.</p> <p><i>Special Theory of Relativity</i> – for non-acceleration The speed of light in a vacuum is constant. What are key dates and places in the life of Paul?</i></p> <p><b>The Book of Acts</b></p>  <p>Gather and scatter, gather and scatter, The churches are built by gather and scatter— Gathered at Pentecost, Scattered by Stephen, Gathered at Antioch, Scattered to heathen.</p> <p><b>But should the gathered heathen have Jewish circumcision?</b></p> <p>Let all apostles gather to settle now the matter: “No! <i>We’re saved by grace through faith in Christ— Just look how God gave heathen life!”</i> So out went Paul—to gather and scatter, Further and further, to gather and scatter.</p>	<p><b>The Bible Timeline</b></p> <p>First John the Baptist, then Jesus the Savior— Tempted by Satan, then teaching by seashore, Casting out demons, then calling apostles, Healing on Sabbath, the Pharisees hostile— Galilee finished—Jerusalem showdown: Tried and betrayed, the cross for our sin— God raised up His Son—forever He wins.</p> <p>Pentecost pow’r and Jerusalem witness, Peter and John and the lame brought to fitness; Stephen is stoned, but the word of God spreading, Philip, a Eunuch, and Saul as he’s heading. Barnabas, Paul—the mission to Gentiles: Trials, a shipwreck—unhindered in Rome; The visions of John then call us all home!</p> <p><b>What are the visions of John?</b> <i>The book of Revelation, also called the Apocalypse.</i></p> <p>Seven seals, seven trumpets, Seven bowls lead to judgment; Are you ready for that final day? Sealed in Christ, we are forgiven, Saved from wrath and bound for heaven; Jesus is the sinner’s only Way.</p>

What are five attributes of God’s greatness?</i></p> <p><b>God Is Good</b></p> <p><b>Righteousness</b> – acting according to <i>glory</i> Ultimately, God does all things for His glory.</p> <p><b>Faithfulness</b> – acting according to His <i>word</i> God never lies or breaks a promise.</p> <p><b>Justice</b> – acting according to <i>deeds</i> <b>or</b> giving what is deserved (reward/punishment)</p> <p><b>Mercy</b> – <i>not</i> giving what is deserved (His <i>pity</i>)</p> <p><b>Grace</b> – giving what <i>cannot</i> be deserved God’s favor is freely given. It cannot be earned.</p>	<p><i>What is rhetoric? How do logic and rhetoric differ?</i></p> <p><b>What are Aristotle’s three means of persuasion?</b></p> <p><b>Ethos</b> – the <i>character</i> of the speaker</p> <p><b>Pathos</b> – the <i>emotional state</i> of the audience</p> <p><b>Logos</b> – the <i>argument</i> itself</p> <p><b>Note:</b> A Christian recognizes these means; but behind the means are spiritual forces that either blind human eyes (2 Cor. 4:4) or open them (Eph. 1:18).</p> <p>Praise the Lord! We can be <i>taught of God</i> (Jn. 6:44)!</p>
Scripture	Proverb
<p>The tutor asks the question and students respond. The shorter verses can be memorized in the first year.</p> <p><b>What is the unbreakable golden chain of salvation?</b> “Whom He predestined, these He also called; and whom He called, these He also justified; but whom He justified, these He also glorified.” —Romans 8:30</p> <p><b>Note:</b> God saves <i>each</i> of His elect to the end. <i>What a comfort to every believer—eternal security!</i></p> <p><b>What is the fruit of the Spirit?</b> “But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; against such things there is no law.” —Galatians 5:22-23</p> <p><b>Note:</b> Love comes from God (1 Jn. 4:7)—listed first!</p> <p>The “Bonus” passage summarizes the gospel message:</p> <p><b>The Romans Road</b> Romans 3:23 6:23 5:8 10:9-10 8:1</p> <p><b>Highlighted Verses</b> “For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God.” —Romans 3:23</p> <p><b>Note:</b> The “all” refers to justified believers in Christ. They “lack” the glory of God until glorification.</p> <p>“For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.” —Romans 6:23</p> <p><b>Note:</b> Sin earns death; but life is a freely-given gift. This gift is located in <i>one</i> place: “in Christ Jesus.”</p>	<p>The teacher should memorize the <b>introduction</b> and quote it with <b><i>lively emphasis</i></b>, while looking the students one by one in the eye.</p> <p><b>Memorize:</b> It is not good to judge a hood good. Leave the crook on the hook—or be cursed; Throw the book at the crook and be blessed. —from Proverbs 24:23-25</p> <p>The <i>saying</i> should be memorized, but not the reference. Show the picture (see the document of thirty pictures).</p> <p><b>Note:</b> A just government with justice for all is a <i>good</i>. God Himself is such an impartial judge (Rom. 2:5-6).</p> <p>In the Psalms, the afflicted are often <b>saved by justice</b>— God saves them by punishing the oppressor (e.g. Ps. 7).</p> <p>When Jesus returns and establishes His kingdom, both the devil and the wicked will eventually be punished.</p> <p>As a result, the righteous in Christ will be <i>totally</i> saved.</p> <p><b>Note:</b> We are also (and primarily) saved from <i>God</i>. Christ appeased God’s wrath for us through the cross. And because God sent Christ in love for us (Jn. 3:16), and because Christ Himself is God (Jn. 1:1; Tit. 2:13), it is right to say that God Himself saved us from God!</p>

Go right or left first, <i>then</i> set the ladder and go up!</p> <p><b>Arithmetic</b> <i>What are the first twelve multiples of twelve? 12, 24, 36, 48, 60, 72, 84, 96, 108, 120, 132, and 144 If you know a song for these numbers, sing it out!</i></p>	<p><i>What are the four fundamental forces?</i></p> <p><b>What is the first law of thermodynamics?</b> The conservation of mass and energy.</p> <p><b>What is the second law of thermodynamics?</b> Everything moves from order to disorder.</p> <p><i>Children may simply learn the names of the theories:</i></p> <p><b>Modern Physics</b> <b>Quantum Physics</b> – energy is released in “packets” Example: A <i>photon</i> is a digital “packet” of light. <i>Energy released is a multiple of the frequency.</i></p> <p><b>Special Theory of Relativity</b> – for non-acceleration The speed of light in a vacuum is constant. Approaching the speed of light slows down time. <i>It also contracts the length and increases mass!</i></p> <p><b>General Theory of Relativity</b> – for acceleration A straight-line is defined as a beam of light. Gravity bends the space-time continuum. <i>Constant acceleration creates the feel of gravity.</i></p>
Geography and Chronology	History
<p><i>What are the key dates and places in the life of Christ? What are key dates and places in the life of Paul?</i></p> <p><b>The Book of Acts</b> <i>The circle diagram can be put on the board (Acts 1:8). Children can memorize the poem. Alternatively, these words in bold can also be written on the board.</i></p> <p>After Pentecost in Jerusalem, Christians <b>gather</b>. After the stoning of Stephen, Christians <b>scatter</b>. Philip takes the gospel to <b>Samaria</b>. Peter takes the gospel to <b>Judea</b>. Paul is converted on the road to <b>Damascus</b>. Cornelius is converted as the first of the <b>Gentiles</b>. Paul takes his <b>first</b> missionary journey. The <b>council</b> in Jerusalem decides Gentiles can stay. <b>Gentile believers do not have to become Jews.</b> Paul takes his <b>second</b> missionary journey. Paul takes his <b>third</b> missionary journey. Paul takes his <b>fourth</b> missionary journey. <i>Paul is arrested, put on trial, and shipwrecked.</i> Paul takes the gospel to <b>Rome</b>.</p> <p><b>Note:</b> The so-called <b>Circumcision Controversy</b> is the largest controversy in the New Testament: <i>Must a Gentile convert become Jewish to be saved?</i></p>	<p>The Bible history timeline can be chanted or sung. The following is the final part of this lengthy poem:</p> <p>Pentecost pow’r and Jerusalem witness, Peter and John and the lame brought to fitness; Stephen is stoned, but the word of God spreading, Philip, a Eunuch, and Saul as he’s heading. Barnabas, Paul—the mission to Gentiles: Trials, a shipwreck—unhindered in Rome; The visions of John then call us all home!</p> <p><b>The Visions of John</b> The answer to the question is not intended for memory. Students must memorize this poem after the answer:</p> <p>Seven seals, seven trumpets, Seven bowls lead to judgment; Are you ready for that final day? Sealed in Christ, we are forgiven, Saved from wrath and bound for heaven; Jesus is the sinner’s only Way.</p> <p><b>Note:</b> We learned this poem as a song in Week 5.</p>
