The Message of Easter

1 Corinthians 15:20-22

I. Introduction

Buried Treasures in Lake Tapps

John Locke, the 18th-century British philosopher, said, "[Christ's] resurrection is truly of great importance in Christianity, so great that His being or not being the Messiah stands or falls with it."

II. The Message of Easter, 1 Cor. 15:20-22.

A. A Message of Folly, v. 20a.

At the time of the writing of this epistle, the church in Corinth had been infiltrated by self-designated "super-apostles" (cf. 2 Cor. 11:1-15). Not only did they mock Paul, but they also mocked many things in the kingdom of God... including the doctrine of the resurrection...

This is where many in the US are today...

Even in Paul's day the resurrection met with unbelief...

Mt. 22:23

Acts 17:32a

1 Cor. 15:12

1 Cor. 1:18a

1 Cor. 2:14

And so again, we ought not to be surprised that there might be some this day who doubt. The first Easter brought many doubters! Why should our day be any different? Yet the Message of Easter also is...

B. A Message of Certainty, v. 20b.

In light of the context, this is a bold statement. The "Super-Apostles" at Corinth had shot down much of what Paul already had said on prior occasions. How is it then that Paul could speak with such certainty? Paul has two lines of reasoning for this claim in this chapter: One based on Logic, the other based on History...

1. The Logical Proof of the Resurrection, 1 Cor. 15:13, 17-19.

- a. You can't claim to be a Christian and reject the resurrection of Christ. If Christ has not risen from the dead, then according to Paul we are still in our sins... all who have died before us are in hell... and everyone in this church is a fool!...
- b. An Explanation: The Redemptive Context
 - 1. In the beginning, God deigned to enter into a relationship with man... called a covenant.
 - 2. This Covenant brought with it a grave responsibility (Gen. 2:16-17).
 - 3. Mankind failed with the expectation of death (Rom. 6:23).
 - 4. But herein is the amazing message of the Bible...

2. The Historical Proof of the Resurrection, 1 Cor. 15:3-8.

- a. Scientific proof verses Historical proof...
- b. Paul is appealing to the Historical Method here. When he says that the resurrection of Christ was witnessed by over "500 people"- most of whom were alive at the writing of this epistle- he is giving the Corinthians the fuel to prove the validity of his claim!
- c. The point is that you don't make a claim like this in a letter that was going to be copied and circulated among thousands and expect people to believe it unless what you are saying is true! For Paul to claim that something was true, and then use that truth-claim as the foundation for his teaching, is to commit philosophical suicide if his premise is not true...

A lawyer, by the name of Edward Clarke, in a letter to the Rev. E. L. Macassey wrote, "As a lawyer I have made a prolonged study of the evidences for the events of the first Easter day. For me, the evidence is conclusive, and over and over again in the high court I have secured the verdict on evidence not nearly so compelling. Inference follows on evidence, and a truthful witness is always artless and disdains effect; the gospel evidence for the resurrection is of this class, and as a lawyer I accept it unreservedly as the testimony of truthful men to facts they were able to substantiate." (*The Times Law Reports*, Vol. 12, p. 595)

B. F. Westcott, one of the ablest of New Testament textual scholars in his day, wrote, "Taking all the evidence together, it is not too much to say that there is no single historical incident better or more variously supported than the resurrection." (*The Gospel of the Resurrection*, p. 137)

The historian, Thomas Arnold of Oxford, speaking about the evidence for the death and resurrection of Christ wrote, "Thousands and tens of thousands of persons have gone through it piece by piece as carefully as every judge summing tip on an important case. I have myself done it many times over, not to persuade others but to satisfy myself... I know of no one fact in the history of mankind which is better proved by fuller evidence than the great sign that God has given as that Christ died and rose again from the dead." (*Christian Thought*, Vol. 6, p. 289)

C. A Message of Hope, vv. 20c-22.

- 1. Our Propensity to "Fake it till we Make it"
- 2. The Glorious Message of Easter: It is NOT simply that Christ rose from the dead. RATHER, it is that He rose "as the first fruits!" This means that Christ was the first of many more to come!...

Where We Live

1. God is a God of love and Easter is God's first step in reclaiming this world!
