

Hope Amid the Storm Acts 27:13-26

Introduction

“All we can do now is pray.” That’s often an unused last resort.

The ship’s crew had tried everything else; hope was gone.

Such despair should never overtake you in Christ.

I. You will lose hope when your methods fail.

- A. Your hope is limited to the limitations of your god.
 - 1. Many serve a god that is not omnipotent.
 - 2. Don’t limit the Lord in your own thinking.
- B. Don’t be limited by human abilities or creativity.
 - 1. You can only do so much.
 - 2. Know the God who has revealed Himself to us.
- C. You need an unlimited God to have a secure hope.
 - 1. Any limitation of your god will leave the possibility of failure.
 - 2. Know the glory of the Lord God to have secure hope.

II. Hope is restored to you by the One Who does not fail.

- A. God has revealed His omnipotence to you.
 - 1. Christ showed His power over disease, death, demons, nature.
 - 2. His power should give you courage.
- B. God has also given you His promises and His will.
 - 1. Be satisfied with His promises.
 - 2. Remember His goodness: mercy, grace, love.
- C. Be confident in God’s promises because of His omnipotence.
 - 1. God’s moral perfection combines these for your good.
 - 2. See the big picture that dwarfs the storm.

III. Belong to the unfailing One and serve Him.

- A. See the difference between having a god and belonging to God.
 - 1. God calls you into a covenant relationship with himself.
 - 2. He obligates Himself to you & you to Him.
- B. Belong to the true God by faith in Jesus Christ.
 - 1. This is more than a confession of His existence; it is confidence!
 - 2. It is available to you. Come to Him in repentance and faith.
- C. Serve the true God as your unfailing Lord.
 - 1. You will do this if you really belong to Him.
 - 2. He is your Master whose yoke is easy.

Conclusion

Prayer is not your last resort; it’s the place of hope and courage.

Recognize how big your God is & rely on Him.

Your power does not succeed; God’s mercy never fails.
