From Church Persecutor to Church Planter: The Conversion of the Apostle Paul

Acts 9:1-9

Introduction

There is no greater demonstration of God's grace and power than in the transformation of Saul to Paul.

- I. Saul the Pharisee: Law-Keeper, Law-Enforcer (vv1-2);
- II. Divine Intervention (vv3-4);
- III. Divine Revelation and Confrontation (vv5-7);
- IV. Divine Transformation and Conversion (vv8-9).

I. Saul the Pharisee: Law-keeper, Law-Enforcer (vv1-2)

Philippians 3:4-8

Saul was a zealous Pharisee, exceptionally rigid and legalistic.

An aggressive fighter, contentious contender, a relentless competitor, Saul rigorously pursued positional advancement in Judaism.

Galatians 1:13-14

Acts 6:9-10

"letters" i.e., 'extradition papers.'

"the Way" 'the Way of salvation'; 'the Way of life'; popular name at the time for Christianity.

"men or women" Saul wanted to annihilate Christianity entirely – every man, every woman.

Saul was zealous for the Law, he was fully convinced that Christians were blasphemers of God.

Acts 26:11

Living contrary to God's will with a heart filled with toxic levels of hatred and hostility is a hard way to live:

"It is hard for you to kick against the goads." Acts 26:14

II. Divine Intervention (vv3-4)

God's Sovereignty in Salvation

III. Divine Revelation and Confrontation (vv5-7)

Divine Revelation

"I am Jesus"

This time it was Paul's turn to see the vision of Christ.

Acts 22:14-15

Acts 22:9

Simply put, it was not their conversion. It was Paul's.

Paul indicates elsewhere that he actually saw the risen Christ on this occasion (1 Cor. 9:1; 15:8; Gal. 1:16; Acts 9:27).

Divine Confrontation

"I am Jesus, whom you are persecuting."

How is that possible?

Because the Spirit of the living Christ lives in every true believer. When you strike one of them, you strike Him directly.

"From now on let no one cause me trouble, for I bear on my body the marks of Jesus." Galatians 6:17

"we share abundantly in Christ's sufferings." 2 Corinthians 1:5

Colossians 1:24

IV. Divine Transformation & Conversion (vv8-9)

Dumbstruck, much like Zechariah in Luke 1, no doubt this was meant for a time of serious personal reflection.

God finds occasions when it is necessary to get the undivided attention and close the mouths of the guilty.

Job 5:13-16

The men "stood speechless," (v7); "he saw nothing. So they led him by the hand" (v8); "for three days he was without sight" (v9).

A Sign of True Conversion

"And I said, 'What shall I do, Lord?'" Acts 22:10

"rise and enter the city, and you will be told what you are to do." v6

A complete change of mind leads to a complete change of heart that leads to a complete change of life.

Paul acknowledges the Lordship of Jesus Christ and submits to His will. This is true repentance.

Paul tore down the kingdom of his own will and religious ways and never returned to rebuild it!

Galatians 2:18-20

"For Christ is the end of the law for righteousness to everyone who believes." Romans 10:4

"end" Gk telos; 'goal' or 'terminus.'

There is now in Christ no more place for the law in man's approach to God.

Christ became for Paul the end of law-keeping as means of justification.

"So then, the law was our guardian until Christ came, in order that we might be justified by faith." Galatians 3:24

Paul was not commended by Jesus for his fastidious law-keeping. He was granted mercy for persecuting the Christ who is the fulfillment of the law.

Amazingly, Paul met grace not judgment.

1 Timothy 1:12-17
