Call to Worship

This call to worship, drawn from the picture of heavenly worship witnessed by John and recorded in the book of Revelation, informs our worship, focusing it properly as based upon the atoning death of Christ, the Lamb of God, who, in the words of John the Baptizer (as recorded in his gospel by the Apostle John), "takes away the sin of the world (John 1:29)."

Revelation 5 ESV

LEADER: We proclaim to Christ our King:

"Worthy are you to take the scroll and to open its seals, for you were slain, and by your blood you ransomed people for God from every tribe and language and people and nation, and you have made them to be a kingdom and priests to our God, and they shall reign on the earth."

WOMEN: Worthy is the Lamb who was slain, to receive power and wealth and wisdom and might and honor and glory and blessing!

CONGREGATION: To Him who sits upon the throne and to the Lamb be blessing and honor and glory and might forever and ever!

ALL: Amen!

We Acknowledge Our Sin

* Reading from the Law

In the Old Covenant, sin required an offering of an animal that was killed after the sinner laid his hands on the head, and the blood sprinkled on the altar by the priest, signifying that the animal had died in the place of the sinner to make atonement for him. All this pointed to Christ, the final and real offering for the sins of His people.

Leviticus 1:1-5 ESV

The LORD called Moses and spoke to him from the tent of meeting, saying, ² "Speak to the people of Israel and say to them, When any one of you brings an offering to the LORD, you shall bring your offering of livestock from the herd or from the flock.

³ "If his offering is a burnt offering from the herd, he shall offer a male without blemish. He shall bring it to the entrance of the tent of meeting, that he may be accepted before the LORD. ⁴ He shall lay his hand on the head of the burnt offering, and it shall be accepted for him to make atonement for him. ⁵ Then he shall kill the bull before the LORD, and Aaron's sons the priests shall bring the blood and throw the blood against the sides of the altar that is at the entrance of the tent of meeting.

Assurance of Pardoning Grace

We who once were far away have been brought near through the blood of Christ, so that now we are the Temple, the place of His presence.

Ephesians 2:11-22 ESV

Therefore remember that at one time you Gentiles in the flesh, called "the uncircumcision" by what is called the circumcision, which is made in the flesh by hands— 12 remember that you were at that time

separated from Christ, alienated from the commonwealth of Israel and strangers to the covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world. 13 But now in Christ lesus you who once were far off have been brought near by the blood of Christ. 14 For he himself is our peace, who has made us both one and has broken down in his flesh the dividing wall of hostility 15 by abolishing the law of commandments expressed in ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, ¹⁶ and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby killing the hostility. ¹⁷ And he came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near. ¹⁸ For through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. ¹⁹ So then you are no longer strangers and aliens, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, 20 built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ lesus himself being the cornerstone, ²¹ in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. 22 In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit.

Leader: This is the gospel. Congregation: Hallelujah!

Distribution of Elements

Because we believe that wine was used in the Last Supper and is thus more in accord with the fullness of symbolism intended by God in the Lord's Supper, we offer and encourage wine for those who take part in Communion. For those with conscientious convictions against the use of wine, however, we offer grape juice, which is contained in the inner circle of the communion trays. The cups containing wine are in the outer circles.

Our offerings of worship to God are, as we see in this passage, "by the mercies of God," most particularly the offering of Himself to God as a sacrifice of atonement, as we have already seen in our service. Our offerings today are but a token of the presentation of ourselves, in imitation of Christ, as "living sacrifices" to Him as part of a life of worship.
