XIX Final Requests

- A. Request for Prayer vs 25
 - 1. His first parting desire
 - a. the need for prayer for the leadership
 - b. Ro 15:30; 2 Co 1:11; Eph 6:18-20; Phil 1:19; Col 4:2-4; Phi 22
 - 2. Brethren,
 - a. adelphos a brother (literally or figuratively) near or remote.
 - b. used repeatedly showing affection 1:4; 2:1,9,17; 3:7; 4:1,10; 5:1,12,14
 - c. In the emphatic position which would include all of them
 - 3. Us
- a. includes his co-laborers
- b. All three had prayed for them "We give thanks" 1:2
- 4. Pray
 - a. present tense meaning continually
 - b. Consistent with other requests for prayer 2 Co 11:29
- 5. Pray for
 - a. Safety -

 - ii. unreasonable and evil men refers to outrageously wicked, hostile to Paul and sought to harm him
 - b. Wisdom for service
 - i. Ro 15:31b and that my service for Jerusalem may be acceptable to the saints,
 - ii. Service
 - not referring to preaching and teaching of doctrine
 - **diakonia** attendance (as a servant); aid, (official) service (ad-)minister(-ing, -tration, -try), office, relief, service(-ing).
 - the collection of money from the Gentile churches for the poor of the Jerusalem Church Acts 11:27030; 1 Co 16:1-3; 2 Co 8-9
 - c. Future plans and priorities be consistent with the will of God

- i. Ro 15:32 that I may come to you with joy by the will of God, and may be refreshed together with you.
- ii. Jas 4:13-15 Come now, you who say, "Today or tomorrow we will go to such and such a city, spend a year there, buy and sell, and make a profit" whereas you do not know what will happen tomorrow. For what is your life? It is even a vapor that appears for a little time and then vanishes away. Instead you ought to say, "If the Lord wills, we shall live and do this or that."
- d. Effectiveness in Preaching the Word of God
 - i. Eph 6:19 and for me, that utterance may be given to me, that I may open my mouth boldly to make known the mystery of the gospel,
 - ii. Col 4:3-4 meanwhile praying also for us, that God would open to us a door for the word, to speak the mystery of Christ, for which I am also in chains, that I may make it manifest, as I ought to speak.
 - iii. 2Th 3:1 Finally, brethren, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may run swiftly and be glorified, just as it is with you,
- e. Spiritual Strength for Ministerial Integrity
 - i. 1Co 9:27 But I discipline my body and bring it into subjection, lest, when I have preached to others, I myself should become disqualified.
 - ii. Heb 13:18 Pray for us; for we are confident that we have a good conscience, in all things desiring to live honorably.
- B. Request for Affection vs 26
 - 1. Display loving affection for one another Jo 13:35
 - 2. Greet all the brethren with a holy kiss
 - a. a common conclusion to Paul's letters Ro 16:16; 1 Co 16:20; 2 Co 13:12; cf. 1 Pet 5:14
 - b. all the brethren none are to be left out
 - c. Greeting a superior with a kiss on the foot, knee, elbow, or hand in the culture was common
 - d. Friends kissed one another on the cheek Judas' betrayal Mt 26:49
 - e. became a symbol among believers of genuine love and affection
 - i. more than ritual gesture hand shake of today
 - ii. Used whenever believers met
 - f. the custom was abandoned when abuses became a problem in the thirteenth century replaced by hand shake or embrace
- C. Request for Submission vs 27
 - 1. I charge you
 - a. **horkizo** to put on oath, make swear; to solemnly enjoin:--adjure, charge.

- b. A call to the elders by solemn oath to make sure that all heard the letter
- 2. by the Lord making this oath solemn
- 3. that this epistle be **read** to
 - a. connotes the reading of the epistle in the public worship service
 - b. public reading was essential to spiritual accountability 2 Th 3:14; 1 Tim 4:13
 - i. Initially, there was only one copy
 - ii. Many were illiterate
 - iii. The letter was to be read as God's Word
 - a revelation from heaven
 - it was true, authoritative, requiring belief and obedience
 - c. Concerned with the people response to Paul not coming in person,
 - i. they may have neglected the epistle
 - ii. He especially wanted them to be encouraged in their time of trial with the eschatological passages 1 Th 4:13-5:11
- D. Benediction to the Thessalonians vs 28
 - 1. The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you. Amen.
 - a. Paul always starts and ends with grace Ro 1:7; 16:20; 1 Co 1:3; 16:23; Gal 1:3; 6:18 2Th 1:2; 3:18
 - b. Grace is at the heart of Christian theology Jo 1:14,17; Ro 3:24; Eph. 1:7; 2:5; Tit 3:7
 - c. Grace summarizes all that God provides in Christ Ro 4:16; 1 Co 15:10; 2 Co 9:8; 2 Th 1:11-12; 2 Pet 3:18
 - 2. Paul's closing remarks are the desire of all Pastors
 - a. that their people would pray for them
 - b. That their people would have and demonstrate real love and affection to one another
 - c. That their people would hear, read, study, and apply God's word

Application:

Men are trying to accomplish the mission given by God, through man-centered methods, programs, and strategies. They minimize the importance of faith, prayer, aligning with God's will. This is a divine mission. It can only be truly accomplished as we seriously and faithfully pray to be empowered by God.
