- \rightarrow What is forbidden by the 2nd Commandment?
 - -Idolatry: devotion to a person or thing that belongs to God alone
- →What about pictures of Jesus?
 - -Historical Survey
 - 1) Early Church [Irenaeus; Eusebius of Caesarea; Epiphanius, bishop of Salamis]
 - 2) Medieval Church [Serenus, bishop of Marseille and Pope Gregory (late 6th century); iconoclasts and iconodules: Leo III (725); Hieria (753); Nicaea (787); reversal (815); Theodora (843)]
 - 3) Reformation Church [Calvin; Luther; Heidelberg Catechism; Westminster Standards
 - 4) Modern Church [Second Vatican Counsel (1963)]
 - -Factors to Ponder
 - 1) Central Obligation: dissociate worship from all pictures of Jesus; see Him in the Word
 - 2) The Intended Likeness of the Picture
 - 3) The Intended Use of the Picture
 - -Concluding Counsels
- 1) Our corporate practice as the gathered church must respect the consciences of weaker brothers and sisters (Romans 14:3, 21; 1 Corinthians 8:13).
- 2) Our private practice in the home must be neither carelessly flaunted nor carnally judged (Romans 14:3).
- 3) Where there is disagreement, let humility and love prevail in resolving the issue.
- 4) Christ must be the only image that we worship (Colossians 1:15: 2:9).
