Justice: God's Concern, Our Obligation

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- Biblical Justice—a larger umbrella
 - Three prominent elements
 - Impartial treatment
 - Special concern for the needy and powerless
 - Use of generosity and influence to help the needy and powerless
 - Criminal/punitive justice
 - "Social" justice
 - ► A historical movement (ca. 1865-1920)
 - A contemporary catch-all
 - What should be an uncontroversial conclusion: Out of Christ-like love of neighbor, Christians should have an active concern for the needy and powerless and should oppose oppression and injustice of every kind.

Telltale Statements | A Sampling

- Social Gospel: "To help the poor and oppressed is to advance the Kingdom of God."
- Biblical Gospel: "To help the poor and oppressed out of Christ-like love is our obligation as we call people to enter the Kingdom of God through repentance and belief."
- Social Gospel: "Out of Christ-like love, the church should be about eliminating inequalities in society."
- Biblical Gospel: "Out of Christ-like love, the church should stand against oppression and injustice—however they are manifested—so that people are treated equally as imagebearers of God.
 - Not all inequalities are the result of iniquity

Telltale Statements | A Sampling

- Social Gospel: "The primary mission of the church is to show the love of Christ to the world by serving those in need and defending the marginalized."
- Biblical Gospel: "The primary mission of the church to make disciples while the primary ethic of the church-onmission is Christ-like love of neighbor and opposition to injustice wherever it is found."
- Social Gospel: "The fundamental problem with society is unjust institutions and oppressive systems."
- Biblical Gospel: "The fundamental problem with society is human sinfulness and rejection of Christ's lordship which manifests itself in every human-populated institution and system in a variety of ways."

Bottom Line...

- With a properly positioned concrete wall—an accurate understanding of the Gospel and the mission of the church—no one should be worried about sliding down a slippery slope.
 - What people should be worried about is neglecting clear biblical mandates in the name of theological risk-aversion.

Challenges and Application

- Where might I need to repent of ignoring the needy and powerless?
 - Fear of man
 - Minimization
 - Lack of Compassion
- How can I use my influence to advocate for mercy and justice?
 - Home? Work? Church? Community?
