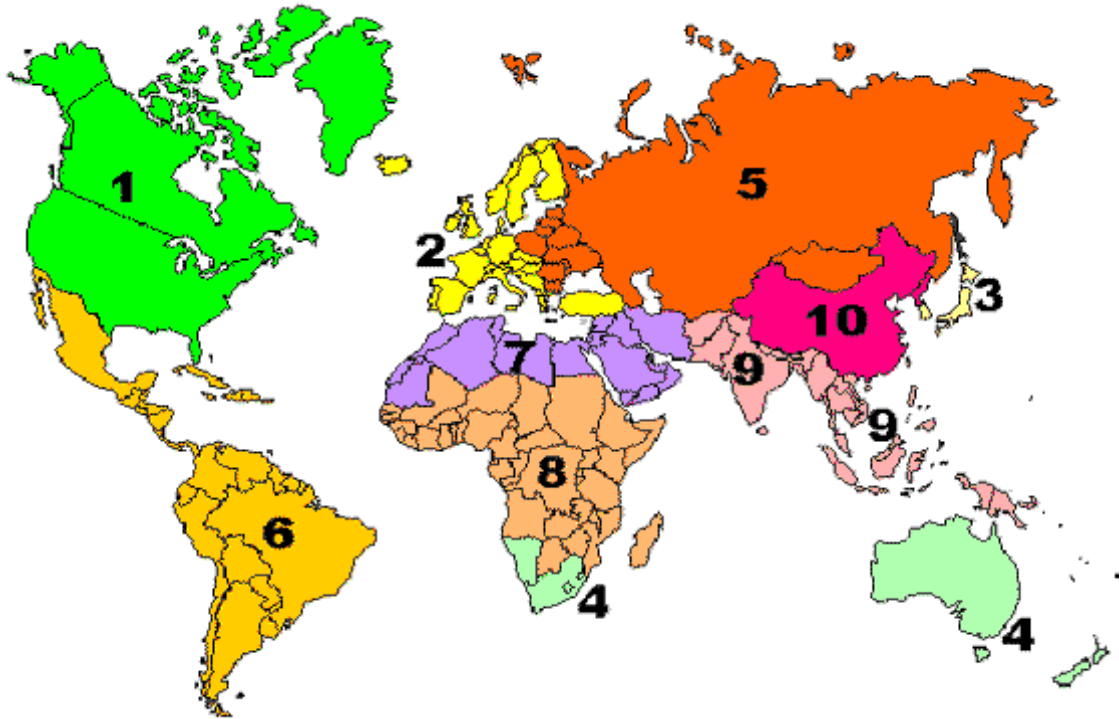


Are These The 10 “Kings” of Rev. 17?

The Club of Rome is a secular humanist organization, a self-styled “global think tank” made up of some of the world’s elite scientists, financial barons, world leaders and other very influential people. (see www.green-agenda.com/globalrevolution.html) It apparently created, at the least was the first to popularize, the theories of global warming and peak oil. You may be familiar with its 1972 book, *The Limits To Growth*, which reportedly sold 30 million copies and formed much of the thinking of today’s environmentalism movement. In 1993, the Club of Rome published a follow-up called *The First Global Revolution*. This statement appears in it:

"It would seem that humans need a common motivation, namely a common adversary, to organize and act together in the vacuum; such a motivation must be found to bring the divided nations together to face an outside enemy, either a real one or else one invented for the purposeThe common enemy of humanity is man....Democracy is no longer well suited for the tasks ahead...In searching for a new enemy to unite us, we came up with the idea that pollution, the threat of global warming, water shortages, famine etc., would fit the bill."
(emphases mine — WJM)

Read that again. To make us do what they want, they say what is needed is a “common adversary...a new enemy to unite us...either a real one or else one invented for the purpose...such as global warming, water shortages, famine, etc....” As I’ve said before, you don’t need to read conspiracy books to know about these things, just read what the perpetrators say themselves.

Another Club of Rome document, *Mankind at the Turning Point*, was accepted as the official Second Report to the Club of Rome in 1974. It also states their desire to create a unified “organic” (or “interdependent”) world system: a.k.a., one world. Here is a quote from the official Club of Rome website. *“Further Reports to the Club of Rome...In parallel with these activities, various projects and reports to the Club of Rome were made public and achieved world recognition. One of these was the second Report to the Club of Rome, ‘Mankind at the Turning Point’ by Mihailo Mesarovic and Eduard Pestel. The book was published in 1974 and was extremely interesting from a methodological point of view, having divided the world into 10 regions. Although the report did not gain the fame of ‘The Limits to Growth’, the disaggregated nature of its model proved very useful, and **a number of countries used the model for decision making purposes.**”* (emphasis mine — WJM)

In 1973 the Club of Rome issued a report titled the *Regionalized and Adaptive Model of the Global World System*. In this report a map is shown which again divides the world into 10 political/economic regions. It appears on page one.
