- C. Matthew 6:25-26 directs us
 - 1. not to omit prudence: Gen. 42:33-36; 1 Tim. 5:8
 - 2. not to omit diligence: Prov. 13:4; 1 Peter 2:10
 - 3. to resist anxious care: Ps. 37:3-5; 1 Peter. 5:7

GOD'S CALL TO REJOICE I. When? II. How? III. Why?

I. WHEN ARE BELIEVERS TO REJOICE?

A. Always: at all times – occasions – circumstances

1. Consider God's commands in Ps. 32:11; Ps. 95:2; 100:2

- 2. Others Scripture on the believer's joy: Gal. 5:22; Romans 14:17; Acts 13:52
- B. To rejoice always: isn't that unreasonable? Impossible?

II. HOW ARE BELIEVERS TO REJOICE?

A. Not like how the unbelievers rejoice: Is. 57:20-21

- 1. Their joy is an unsatisfying emotional happiness rooted in the earthly
- 2. Truth is you can never be joyful unless you are a believer in Jesus

- B. Believers are to rejoice in moderation (vs. 5a)
 - 1. 'Moderation' characterizes every aspect of the believer's life
 - 2. This 'moderation' also applies to the expression of their joy
- C. Believers are to be consistent before all men in expressing their joy (5a)

III. WHY ARE BELIEVERS CALLED TO REJOICE?

- A. Because The Lord is at hand
 - Either: He will return and He will not tarry (Hebrews 10:32-39)

 Jesus endured by believing God's promise about the joy set before Him (Heb. 12:2)
 - a. Paul's manner of thinking is similar: Romans 8:18-19
 - 2. Or: He is *near and has all things in His hand* a. the comfort of God's sovereignty: Ps. 103:9; 76:10; Dan. 4:35

Closing Observation: Who only are able to rejoice like this?

God moves in a mysterious was His wonders to perform; He plants His footsteps in the sea, and rides upon the storm. Deep in unfathomable mines of never failing skill, He treasures up His bright designs, and works His sovereign will.
