- L. Everyone has intrinsic value and matters to God!
 - The disregard for human life
 - In Roman society
 - 2) By the religious leadership
 - 3) In today's world
 - b. Why is man significant?—Psalm 8:2-7
 - 1) God has made man a little lower than the angels—v. 5a
 - 2) God has crowned us with glory and honor—v. 5
 - 3) God has given us dominion over he works of His hands—vv. 6-7
 - 4) God has ordained us to be His worshipers—v. 2

2. God passionately pursues lost people as illustrated by Jonah

- a. The people of Nineveh were Israel's enemies—Amos 5:27; Hosea 11:5-6
- b. God pursues Jonah, retrieves him, and sends him to Nineveh.
- c. The Ninevites repent—God's compassion for them
- d. Jonah's angry at the compassionate heart of God—4:1-4
- e. God uncover Jonah's complacent heart: More concerned with creature comfort than with reaching the lost.
