SO CLOSE AND YET SO FAR | HEBREWS 6:4-12

It is incredibly dangerous to receive God's revelation but fall short of regeneration.

Context: After encouraging the audience to press on to maturity at the beginning of Hebrews 6, the writer issues an incredibly serious (and difficult) warning, followed by some powerful assurance.

Two major possibilities for this warning:	
1)	Genuine Christians can fall away
2)	People close to Christianity but never really saved can
How th	is warning passage flows:
1.	Warning: Don't fall away from (4-6).
2.	Metaphor: There are two (7-8).
3.	Assurance: God is just and there is hope for (9-12).

Final notes:

- Possibility of mixed assembly
- Danger of intense religious experience without salvation
- Examples of falling short of saving faith
- The seriousness of apostacy
- Other NT teaching on the perseverance of the believer
