Call to Worship

We are called to worship God and respond by exhorting our souls to bless the Lord because of the manifold expressions of His constant love to us.

Psalms 100, 103:1-5 ESV

- ^{100:1} Make a joyful noise to the LORD, all the earth! [leader]
- ² Serve the LORD with gladness! Come into his presence with singing!
- ³ Know that the LORD, he is God!

 It is he who made us, and we are his;

 we are his people, and the sheep of his pasture.
- ⁴ Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name!
- ⁵ For the LORD is good; his steadfast love endures forever, and his faithfulness to all generations.

103:1 Bless the LORD, O my soul, and all that is within me, bless his holy name!

Prayer of Adoration and Invocation

* Hymn of Praise

In this hymn we speak once again to our own souls, exhorting ourselves to bless the Lord, and then reminding ourselves of His nature and goodness towards us and all His creation.

* Reading from the Law

The Sabbath was a sign to Israel of the rest to which God had called them as His holy people. The heart of this holiness was faith: a determination to trust God's Word rather than their own wisdom and effort. Ironically, obedience to the Law, which they could never achieve through their own work and effort, was only achieved through the trust that allowed them to rest from their effort and depend upon God.

Exodus 16:2-4, 14-30 ESV

And the whole congregation of the people of Israel grumbled against Moses and Aaron in the wilderness, ³ and the people of Israel said to them, "Would that we had died by the hand of the LORD in the land of Egypt, when we sat by the meat pots and ate bread to the full, for you have brought us out into this wilderness to kill this whole assembly with hunger." ⁴Then the LORD said to Moses, "Behold, I am about to rain bread from heaven for you, and the people shall go out and gather a day's portion every day, that I may test them, whether they will walk in my law or not.

¹⁴ And when the dew had gone up, there was on the face of the wilderness a fine, flake-like thing, fine as frost on the ground. ¹⁵ When the people of Israel saw it, they said to one another, "What is it?" For they did not know what it was. And Moses said to them, "It is the bread that the LORD has given you to eat. ¹⁶ This is what the LORD has commanded: 'Gather of it, each one of you, as much as he can eat. You shall each take an omer, according to the number of the persons that each of you has in his tent." ¹⁷ And the people of Israel did so. They gathered, some more, some less. ¹⁸ But when they measured it with an omer, whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no lack. Each of them gathered as much as he could eat. ¹⁹ And Moses said to them, "Let no one leave any of it over till the morning." ²⁰ But they did not listen to Moses. Some left part of it till the morning, and it bred worms and stank. And Moses was angry with them. ²¹ Morning by morning they gathered it, each as much as he could eat; but when the sun grew hot, it melted.

 22 On the sixth day they gathered twice as much bread, two omers each. And when all the leaders of the congregation came and told Moses, 23 he said to them, "This is what the LORD has commanded: 'Tomorrow is a day of solemn rest, a holy Sabbath to the LORD; bake what you will bake and boil what you will boil, and all that is left over lay aside to be kept till the morning.'" 24 So they laid it aside till the morning, as Moses commanded them, and it did not stink, and there were no worms in it. 25 Moses said, "Eat it today, for today is a Sabbath to the LORD; today you will not find it

in the field. ²⁶ Six days you shall gather it, but on the seventh day, which is a Sabbath, there will be none."

 27 On the seventh day some of the people went out to gather, but they found none. 28 And the LORD said to Moses, "How long will you refuse to keep my commandments and my laws? 29 See! The LORD has given you the Sabbath; therefore on the sixth day he gives you bread for two days. Remain each of you in his place; let no one go out of his place on the seventh day." 30 So the people rested on the seventh day.

Silent Confession of Sin

Corporate Confession of Sin

Notice that the psalmist here not only cries to the Lord for mercy, but also turns to Him as his "refuge" and "portion," and asks Him to free him from his prison, recalling the bondage of God's people in Egypt, and our bondage to the self-reliance which epitomizes the futility and vanity of sin.

Assurance of Pardoning Grace

Jesus is the only one who can give us true rest from the curse of the Fall upon our work, converting it to a slavery to endlessly frustrating toil and a struggle for life. His salvation does not mean an abolishment of work or responsibility ("Take my yoke upon you..."), but a transformation of work for God into a delight like unto His own on the Sabbath Day, when our work is done in the power of God for the glory of God.

Matthew 11:28-30 ESV

Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. ²⁹ Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. ³⁰ For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light.

Leader: This is the gospel. Congregation: Hallelujah!

Distribution of Elements

Because we believe that wine was used in the Last Supper and is thus more in accord with the fullness of symbolism intended by God in the Lord's Supper, we offer and encourage wine for those who take part in Communion. For those with conscientious convictions against the use of wine, however, we offer grape juice, which is contained in the inner circle of the communion trays. The cups containing wine are in the outer circles.

Offering Meditation

We give out of the resources that God has apportioned to us, not according to what others can or have given. This is the "equity" that God has ordained in the matter of giving to build His church.

2 Corinthians 8:9-15 ESV

For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich. ¹⁰ And in this matter I give my judgment: this benefits you, who a year ago started not only to do this work but also to desire to do it. ¹¹ So now finish doing it as well, so that your readiness in desiring it may be matched by your completing it out of what you have. ¹² For if the readiness is there, it is acceptable according to what a person has, not according to what he does not have. ¹³ For I do not mean that others

should be eased and you burdened, but that as a matter of fairness ¹⁴ your abundance at the present time should supply their need, so that their abundance may supply your need, that there may be fairness. ¹⁵ As it is written, "Whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no lack."
