-Title: <u>Hebrew</u>: Qoheleth, from qahal (assembly); A qoheleth is a preacher, someone who addresses an assembly. <u>Greek</u>: ekklesia (assembly), ekklesiastes (preacher, speaker before an assembly) <u>Latin/</u> <u>English</u>: Ecclesiastes

-Author: Solomon (1:1, 16 with 1 Kings 3, 4; 2:4-6 with 1 Kings 5-7; 7:1-14, 10:1-20, 12:9 with the Proverbs)

-Date: sometime before 931 BC
