- ¹ My son, keep my words
- and treasure up my commandments with you;
- keep my commandments and live;
 - keep my teaching as the apple of your eye;
- bind them on your fingers;
 - write them on the tablet of your heart.
- ⁴ Say to Wisdom, "You are my sister," and call Insight your intimate friend,
- to keep you from the forbidden woman,

from the adulteress with her smooth words.

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THE SCENE IS SET(6-9)	
⁶ For at the window of my house I have looked out through my lattice,	
 and I have seen among the simple, I have perceived among the youths, 	
a young man lacking sense, passing along the street near her corner, taking the road to her house in the twilight, in the evening,	
at the time of night and darkness.	
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FOLLY IS DESCRIBED (10-13)	
¹⁰ And behold, the woman meets him, dressed as a prostitute, wily of heart.	· ·
¹¹ She is <i>loud</i> and <i>wayward</i> ; her <i>feet do not stay</i> at home;	
now in the street, now in the market, and at every corner <i>she lies in wait</i> .	
13 She <i>seizes</i> him and <i>kisses</i> him, and with <i>bold face</i> she says to him,	
and with boild face site says to min,	
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FOLLY SPEAKS POWERFUL WORDS (14-2	O)
14 "I had to offer sacrifices,	
 and today I have paid my vows; so now I have come out to meet you, to seek you eagerly, and I have found you. 	
¹⁶ I have spread my couch with coverings,	
colored linens from Egyptian linen; 17 I have perfumed my bed with myrrh,	

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aloes, and cinnamon.

18 Come, let us take our fill of love till morning; let us delight ourselves with love. 19 For my husband is not at home; he has gone on a long journey; 20 he took a bag of money with him; at full moon he will come home."

²¹ With much seductive <i>speech</i> she <i>persuades</i> him;	
with her smooth talk she compels him. 22 All at once he follows her,	
as an ox goes to the slaughter,	
or as a <i>stag</i> is caught fast 23 till an <i>arrow</i> pierces its liver;	
as a bird rushes into a <i>snare</i> ; he does not know that it will cost him his life.	-
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THE LESSON TO BE LEADNED (24.27)	
THE LESSON TO BE LEARNED (24-27) 24 And now, O sons, listen to me,	-
and be attentive to the words of <i>my</i> mouth.	
 Let not your heart turn aside to her ways; do not stray into her paths, for many a victim has she laid low, and all her slain are a mighty throng. 	
²⁷ Her house is the way to Sheol, going down to the chambers of death.	
g-mg down to the chambers of dedun.	
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- Keep in mind that this is not misogyny, but rather a warning for his son towards a particular kind of ruinous woman
- It could equally be written to a daughter (not the primary purpose of this book) in regards to "creeper" men (2Tim 3:6)
- This is a warning to a particular kind of sin
- This is also a archetype to the way that sin and temptation works
- Applicable to both temporal and eternal consequences
- The only protective course is The Wisdom of God

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
