How important is obedience?

The Issue is Always Obedience

In the 11th century, King Henry III of Bavaria grew tired of court life and the pressures of being a monarch. He made application to Prior Richard at a local monastery, asking to be accepted as a contemplative and spend the rest of his life in the monastery. 'Your Majesty,' said Prior Richard, 'do you understand that the pledge here is one of obedience? That will be hard because you have been a king.' 'I understand,' said Henry. 'The rest of my life I will be obedient to you, as Christ leads you.' 'Then I will tell you what to do,' said Prior Richard. 'Go back to your throne and serve faithfully in the place where God has put you.' When King Henry died, a statement was written: 'The king learned to rule by being obedient.' (IPT 155)

Blind Spots and Blank Places in the Best of Us

Jonathan Edwards and his wife owned household and farming slaves (up to 6 total), at least one, to the very end of his life.

It warns us to not idolize or idealize any man except Jesus. We will be disillusioned if we do at some point.

It cautions us that if he had blind spots on one issue, he may have other blind spots and we need to read with more care so that we aren't believing everything he says without discernment.

It should make us marvel that God uses any of us in light of our besetting sins.

It teaches that sanctification has blank places like knowledge has blind spots. We can be making good progress in five areas and doing badly in one sixth area. The Spirit isn't exercising power in that area as He could. We can see well in five areas and be blind in a sixth area.

It makes us pray for light on my life and my day. What are my blind spots? What are the church of today's blind spots? Whatever level of sanctification we may obtain in this life will still leave places that need to be addressed. (John Piper, *Jonathan Edwards and Slavery 'Ask Pastor John'*)
