- II. Compelled to Contend
  - A. Jude's Background vs 1a
    - 1. Jude
      - a. Heb. Judah
      - b. a common name
        - i. 2 of the disciples, Iscariot and son of James Lk 6:16; Jo 6:71; Ac 1:13
        - ii. Ananias met Saul at the house of Judas of Damascus Ac 9:11
        - iii. Judas Barsabbas helped carry the letter from the Jerusalem Council to Antioch Ac 15:22-23
        - iv. Judas of Galilee founded the Zealots Ac 5:37
    - 2. a bondservant of Jesus Christ.
      - a. indicates the death, resurrection, and ascension of Christ transformed him
      - b. *doulos* a slave (literal or figurative, involuntary or voluntary; frequently, in a qualified sense of subjection or subserviency):--bond(-man), servant.
        - i. one who has trusted Christ as Lord, understanding He is Master Mt
        - 24:46; Lk 2:29; Ac 4:29; Ga 1:10; Col 1:7; **2 Ti 2:24**; Rev 19:5
        - ii. His saving relationship became more important than his familial Mk 3:31-35
        - iii. A contrast to the false teachers who denied the Lord vs 4; 2 Pe 2:1
    - 3. and brother of James,
      - a. The half bother of the Lord Mt 13:55-56; Mk 6:3; Ga 1:19
        - i. the leader of the Jerusalem church Ac 12:2; 15:13
        - ii. Salutation similar to his brothers Jas 1:1
      - b. did not consider himself an apostle—vs 17, close relationship with Jesus and James gave prominence and authority in the early Church
  - B. Jude's Audience vs 1b-2 obviously true believers
    - 1. Called vs 1b
      - a. To those who are called,
        - i. *kletos* related to *kaleo* to call;
        - ii. main word in the sentence w/ 2 perfect participles in apposition to it equating
      - b. not speaking of a general invitation to sinners Is 45:22; 55:6; **Ez 33:11**; Mt 11:28; 22:14; 23:37; Lk 14:16-24; Jo 7:37; Rev 22:17
        - i. a call that usually goes unanswered, rejected
        - ii. Mt 12:14; Lk 4:16-19,28-30; Ac 4:13-18; 5:17-18,26-28,33-40; 7:54-58; **2Co 2:15-16**
      - c. conveys the idea of being personally chosen or selected
        - i. God awakens the human will and imparts spiritual life
        - ii. Enables once dead sinners to embrace the Gospel by faith Jo 5:21; 6:44,65; Ac 16:14; **Eph 2:5**
    - 2. Loved
      - a. KJV and NKJV have "*sanctified* by God the Father," *hagiazo* to make holy, purify or consecrate; to venerate:--hallow, be holy, sanctify.
      - b. both the Nestle and Wescott and Hort Greek texts have *agapao* 
        - i. perfect passive participle speaks of a past complete act having results that continue in the present and the future **Eph 1:4-5**

- ii. God loves believers based on His sovereign pleasure not on anything that we could have done **Ro 9:11-13**; 10:20; 1 Co 1:26-29; Jas 2:5
- iii. God chose to place that love on us before the foundation of the world Ac 13:48; 2 Th 2:13; 2 Ti 1:9
- iv. That love required the death of His Son, paying the penalty for our sins Is 53:5-6; Mk10:45; Jo 3:16; 1 Pe 2:24

## 3. Kept

- a. preserved Perfect passive participle (see above) of *tereo* to guard (from loss or injury, keeping the eye upon, to maintain
- b. in Jesus Christ
  - i. Dative case indicates "in" or "by" 1Pe 1:5
  - ii. in line with Jesus' teaching in **Jo 10:27-28**; 6:37-44; 17:11,15

## 4. Blessed

- a. Greeting
  - i. Mercy, peace, Common Jewish greeting
    - whenever believers sin, they will always need and find an ample supply of mercy at the throne of grace **Heb 4:16**
    - peace that stems from knowing that sins are forgiven
  - ii. and love added to remind his readers of Christ's (God's) love for them
  - Jo 16:27; 17:23; Ro 5:5,8; 8:32,39; Eph 2:4; 2Th 2:16
  - ii. Only place in the NT that has all three
- b. be multiplied to you.
  - i. *plethuno* to increase (transitively or intransitively):--abound, multiply.
  - ii. Jude's prayer is that they would continually enjoy the Lord's blessing even in difficult times 1 Pe 1:2; 2 Pe 1:2

## C. Jude's Exhortation

- 1. Beloved, demonstrating his pastoral care for the audience
- 2. while I was very diligent to write to you concerning our common salvation,
  - a. **spoude** "speed", despatch, eagerness, earnestness:--business, (earnest) care(fulness), diligence, forwardness, haste.
    - i. connotes the idea that Jude hurried in vain
    - ii. Couldn't complete original thoughts due to the urgency of the problem
  - b. common salvation one set of beliefs, Eph 1:7; 4:4
- 3. I found it necessary to write to you
  - a. anagke constraint; distress, must needs, (of) necessity(-sary), need, needful.
  - b. Jude was feeling a heavy burden due to the false teachers
- 4. exhorting you to contend earnestly for the faith
  - a. *parakaleo* to call near, invite, invoke (by imploration, hortation or consolation):--beseech, call for, (be of good) comfort, desire, (give) exhort(-ation), intreat, pray.
  - b. epagonizomai to struggle for:--earnestly contend foreign
    - i. compound verb where we get agonize
    - ii. Pres. Inf stresses the need to continually and vigorously defend or stand for "the faith" 1Ti 1:18; 6:12; 2Ti 1:13; 4:7
  - c. the faith the objective truth of the gospel; everything pertaining to our common salvation Ac 2:42; 1 Co 15:1-4;
  - d. which was once for all delivered to the saints.
    - i. *hapax* one (or a single) time (numerically or conclusively):--once.
    - ii. Refers to something accomplished, no need of repetition Ro 16:26; 2 Ti 3:16-17
