Review:

- Last week we began a consideration of autonomy
- We looked at the word and its etymology
- We considered King Saul one of a great many Biblical characters who acted autonomously
 - His qualifying attributes to be King were
 - Youth, handsome, wealthy, from a good family and physically imposing
 - We choose our own leaders by much the same criteria
 - His predisposition was to reconstruct God's commands and act as a law unto himself
 - Saul's effective reign over Israel was 7 days

The Take Away

- The sin of autonomy is a heinous sin
 - 2 Cor. 10: 5 taking every thought captive to the obedience of Christ
 - When we step outside of the umbrella of God's expressed will for us, we flirt with trouble
 - O Dr. Robert Palmer & Albert Camus
 - O Rom. 8: 29 "to be conformed to the image of His Son."
- It is in our nature and in the nature of governments to co-opt power and act autonomously
 - o James Madison "If men were angels . . . "
- The sin of autonomy was not unique to Saul
 - o In fact it was the very first sin
 - Genesis 3: 6 "... the tree was to be desired to make one wise, she took of the fruit..."
 - Autonomy is a gateway sin
- The story of Saul, in spite of his autonomy, is a great picture of God's ultimate plan:
 - Deuteronomy 17: 5 "You may indeed set a king over you .
 .."
 - God's ultimate intention was for that King to be born in a humble state
 - Without beauty
 - Whatever king reigned over Israel was a fabulously imperfect shadow of the real King
 - o The Bad News
 - The Good News

Other Relevant Quotes What's the Big Idea? – Autonomy part 2

1 Sam. 13: 13, 14 – And Samuel said to Saul, "You have done foolishly. You have not kept the command of the Lord your God, with which he commanded you. For then the Lord would have established your kingdom over Israel forever. But now your kingdom shall not continue. The Lord has sought out a man after his own heart, and the Lord has commanded him to be prince over his people, because you have not kept what the Lord commanded you."

2 Corinthians 10: 5 – destroy arguments and every lofty opinion raised against the knowledge of God, and take every thought captive to obey Christ.

Albert Camus – "A man's worst difficulties begin when he is able to do as he likes."
