Genesis 32:24-32 The Angel of Jehovah (8)

Introduction

- I. At Bethel, 20 years earlier, Jacob is alone with God, sees himself, and receives the promise that God will go with him, and fulfill all His word.
- II. Now, as he returns to the promised land he is forced again to see himself, when finally he does, he receives the same reassuring blessing from God.

"Wrestling with Jacob"

- I. The details of the wrestling match
 - A. Where and when?
 - 1. On the border of the promised land when it seems that Jacob is on the verge of seeing all God's promises to him fulfilled.
 - 2. Then he receives the frightening news, Esau is coming, and Jacob is afraid.
 - a. In his fear, he comes up with strategies to appease his brother.
 - b. Then, left alone, he cannot sleep.

B. Who?

- 1. Jacob -- the heel-holder and supplanter (Genesis 25:26).
- 2. This Man that comes out of the darkness who is the Angel of Jehovah, Christ preincarnate
 - a. He is called God (vv. 28, 30)
 - b. Hosea confirms his identity (Hosea 12:3-5)
 - c. His Divine abilities prove who he is.
- C. This wrestling match is real.
- II. The purpose of the Angel's coming to wrestle with Jacob
 - A. First, we must see that the Angel is the aggressor, that he comes to Jacob and controls the entire fight, and finishes it with a blow to Jacob's hip, by a touch of his finger.
 - B. The purpose is that Jacob may see his weakness as he fights in his own strength.
 - 1. The Angel asks, What is thy name? And Jacob is forced to recognize his own character and weakness.
 - 2. And then he clings to the Angel, to Christ and the promises of blessing in Him.
 - 3. Prayer that has power with God, is prayer in which we are humbled and cling only to the cross and righteousness of Christ.
- III. The blessing that the Angel gives to Jacob
 - A. The blessing
 - 1. He does not tell Jacob His name (Judges 13:17-18)
 - 2. But gives him the patriarchal/messianic blessing, which means Christ and salvation for Jacob.
 - B. The injury -- which is also a blessing
 - 1. He is suddenly an old man, who halts upon his thigh.
 - 2. But, like Paul, this thorn in the flesh reminds him forever after not to trust self, but to find strength in personal weakness and from grace.
