"Unto me, who am less than the least of all saints."


"If anyone else thinks he has reason for confidence in the flesh, I have more: circumcised on the eighth day, of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless."

"Indeed, I count everything as loss because of the surpassing worth of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord. σκύβαλα skybalon

4657 skýbalon (from 2965 /kýōn, "dog" and 906 /bállō, "throw") – properly, waste thrown to dogs, like filthy scraps of garbage (table-scraps, dung, muck, sweepings); (figuratively) refuse, what is good-for-nothing except to be discarded (used only in Phil 3:8).



Let us seek humility "Depend on it, the nearer men draw to heaven, the more humble do they become."




εὐαγγελίζω euaggelizó

2097 euaggelizō (from 2095 /eú, "good, well" and angellō, "announce, herald") – properly, proclaim "the good message" (good news). In the NT, 2097 (euaggelizō) refers to sharing the full Gospel of Christ – literally, "gospelizing" that announces the complete message of "the good news" (the Lord's glad tidings).



"Why it is the great duty of ministers to preach Christ to the people?


Because this is the only way to save and to win souls to Jesus Christ.







3. What Paul says of the great subject of his preaching


Consider what he is NOT to preach:



Let us look at this task and calling of the minister, first of all negatively. He is not simply to preach about current events.

Is it his business to express his view as to what the **Government** should have done last week or what it should not have done?


But again, it is not the business of the Preacher to preach patriotism.



Neither is it the business of preaching simply to preach and to inculcate a **general public morality** or some general ethic.

The business of Christianity is not to produce 'perfect little gentlemen'. The philosophers can do so and have done so.


But Paul was called to preach 'the unsearchable riches of Christ'.




3. What Paul says of the great subject of his preaching


"...preach the unsearchable riches of Christ..."

"He always went to the root of the matter, and showed men their great family disease, their desperate state as sinners, and the great Physician needed by a sinsick world."





"Has God not given us Christ? In Him there are "unsearchable riches" (Eph 3:8). He is such a golden mine of wisdom and grace, that all the saints and angels can never dig to the bottom. As Seneca said to his friend Polybius, "Never complain of your hard fortune as long as Caesar is your friend." So, I say to you, "Never complain as long as Christ is your friend." He is a valuable pearl, a sparkling diamond. The infinite luster of His merits makes us shine in God's eyes.



"In Him there is both fullness and sweetness. Lift up your thoughts to the highest and stretch them to the heavens. Let them expand to their full height and breadth, yet they will fall infinitely short of those inexhaustible treasures which are locked in Jesus Christ. So, is there not enough here to give the soul contentment? A Christian that lacks necessities, but has Christ, has the "one thing [that] is necessary" (Luke 10:42).

What are "the unsearchable riches" of Christ?

- The unsearchable riches in Christ's person
- The work which Christ accomplished for us (on earth)
- The work which Christ at this moment fills, as He lives for us at the right hand of God
- The names and titles which are applied to Christ in the Scriptures
- The characteristic qualities, attributes, dispositions and intentions of Christ's mind towards man
