Why Study Job?

- 1. Job is for those who live real life, experience real suffering and have real questions and proud triumphalists.
- 2. Job forces us to deal with life realistically and painfully disabusing us of bad theology and triumphalism!

Note on Job's friends: They held to the prosperity gospel, or "retribution theology."

- 3. Job does not give us answers to the problem of evil and suffering, it gives us an anchor.
- 4. Job gives us a perspective on God that is the anchor for our faith.
- 5. Job gives us a model of endurance in suffering.

James 5:11

- 6. Job gives us insight into the question, "Why serve God?"
- 7. Job models growth in wisdom and grace.
- 8. Jesus Christ is the ultimate Righteous Sufferer, and Job, read against the backdrop of Christ and the Gospel, keeps our suffering in perspective.
